Earl Browder was elected president of the newly-formed Communist Political Association yesterday afternoon by the unanimous vote of cheering, applauding delegates.

Eleven vice-presidents headed by William Z. Foster were also elected, together with a national committee of 40 regular and 20 alternate members. John Williamson was chosen

secretary of the new association and Charles Krumbein elected treasurer.

The elections came toward the close of a day's session which had been featured by a special report on the 26th anniversary of the Communist movement by Robert Minor and which was concluded with a summary of the convention proceedings made by Earl Browder. In this summary the new President of the CPA replied to the "editorial judgment of our convention" appearing in the Herald Tribane.
