Bulletin Board

Convention Office

Drugstore

The nearest drugstore is at the corner of North Main

and East College (off Tappan Square). Newspapers are available there.

Financial Committee Office

For those who wish to discuss branch finances or contributions to the Expansion Fund, the Financial Committee Office is in the second-floor lounge, southwest wing, South Hall. Hours will be posted on the lounge door.

Grocery Store

There is a grocery store on Main Street about two blocks south of the intersection with East College.

Laundry

There are coin-operated washers and dryers in each dorm. Soap may be purchased in town. Ironing rooms are also available.

Limousine to Airport

The limousine to the airport leaves at the following times: Saturdays, 10:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m.; Sundays, 12:00 noon, 2:00 p.m., 4:15 p.m., and 6:15 p.m. The fare is \$5 per person. Please notify Jon Britton in advance if you will need a ride to the airport at a time other than those listed. With the limousine service's cooperation, it may be possible to arrange additional runs.

Lost and Found

The lost and found is located in the conference office, room 221 in South Hall. Found items can also be turned in to the secretaries' table at the skating rink or at the information desk at South Hall. For meal cards and items of no value check at the information desk.

Medical

The Oberlin Clinic and Allen Memorial Hospital are both located on Route 10, Lorain Road, just west of Kettering Hall. The hospital (775-1211) is open 24 hours for emergencies. The clinic (775-1651) is open Monday through Friday, 8 a.m.-5 p.m., and Saturday until noon.

Parking

Parking is available across the street from East Hall,

at the Robertson parking lot, behind the skating rink, in front of South Hall, and on streets where signs indicate legal parking. Cars will be towed if parked in small lots near dorms or in the fire lane next to Dascomb.

Post Office

The post office is located on Main Street (Ohio Route 58) about two blocks south of the intersection with East College.

Pets

Pets are not allowed in the dormitories.

Refunds

Refunds will be given at the end of the week at hours to be announced. Meal refunds can only be given for full days, that is, dinner through lunch.

Telephone Service


Within-campus calls: Dial last 4 digits only.

Long distance: Incoming calls can be made direct to the dormitory. Outgoing calls must be made from pay phone unless charges are reversed or credit card is used, in which case dorm phone may be used by dialing "Operator."
