TA powerful international memorial meeting was held in New York on Saturday to honor the life and carry forward the struggle of Tom Henehan, who was killed in a political murder last week, a martyr of the Fourth international. From beginning to end, the meeting brought forward the international struggle of the working class against decaying world capitalism. Messages were read from Trotskyists all over

The audience of 250 heard Comrade Michael Banda, general secretary of the Workers Revolutionary Party of Great Britain, bringing a message on behalf of the International Committee of the Fourth International, with which the Workers League is in political solidarity.

"We are internationalists in every sense of the word," said Comrade Banda, "We don't make any apologies for it and we would gladly die for it in the way that Comrade Tom did.

"There's nothing platonic about our internationalism: Our internationalism is aimed at one thing and one thing only, the taking of power, the resolution of the crisis of leadership, the establishment throughout the world of a system based on the planned utilization of all the resources of mankind, where man can consciously control his destiny and the productive forces of the world. That was the basis of the life and struggle of Comrade Tom."

## **New York** Memorial Meeting Comrade Tom Henehan Oct. 22, 1977

Two hundred and fifty workers and youth attended a memorial meeting in New York for Comrade Tom Henehan, leader of the Workers League and the Young Socialists, who was gunned down in a political murder at a Brooklyn dance held by the Young Socialists one week ago.

Attending the meeting were Tom's comrades and friends from New York, other East Coast cities and from Canada, as well as Tom's entire family, his mother and six brothers and sisters, who traveled from Kalamazoo, Michigan to be present.

The meeting resolved to honor Tom's memory by pledging to continue his fight for the daily revolutionary newspaper.

The theme of all the contributions was one of great inspiration and confidence that the revolutionary work undertaken by Tom had to be carried forward as never before.

Telegrams and statements from those unable to be present were read to the audience. They included messages from Tom's comrades, the Australian and German Trotskyists. Greetings were brought personally to the meeting by Michael Banda, general secre-tary of the Workers Revolutionary Party of Britain, on behalf of the International Committee of the Fourth International and all of its sections.

Workers League and Young Socialists branches in other parts of the country also sent messages, along with Ray Collins, Secretary - Treasurer of Washington Post. Pressmen, Local 6; Georgia Ellis of the UAW local 1663 Essex Wire strikers in Elwood, Indiana; and a group of auto workers in Detroit from UAW locals 3, 51 and 212. Mrs. Juanita Tyler, the mother of imprisoned frameup victim Gary Tyler, also sent a message.

The meeting sent its warmest best wishes for a full and speedy recovery to Comrade Jacques Vielot, who had been wounded at the same time as Comrade Tom was murdered.

The speakers included some of those who had worked most closely, with

Adele Sinclair, editor of the Young Socialist, told the meeting that "just as Tom didn't hesitate to go to the all of shother com-rade, we can't hesitate pur-selves. We know that eversone now is trying to convince us that this murder was not a political murder, that it was just some lumpen elements in the neighborhood who went and killed him. But we know that that's not the case at all.

"We know the political forces that are behind this murder and we're going to get them. We're going to get them by building the Young Socialists and the Workers League. Because for every single Tom that they strike down, we're going to bring a hundred more forward and they're going to be much more powerful than any attempt that the ruling class makes to stop our Party.

"We stand with the youth not only in the United States but in every single country in the world. We stand with the revolutionary youth who defeated imperialism in Vietnam and Angola and in Lebanon right now. These are the youth that we stand with and that Tom stood with. We're not going to give an inch in this fight."

Paul Tanner, national secretary of the Young Socialists, also spoke:

"We must stress again and again that in all of Tom's work among young people, the critical ele-ment was his fight among them for an understanding of politics - for the principles of Trotskyism. Tom understood the need to turn to the youth as the most revolutionary element of the working class and to use their energy for the building of a revolutionary party.

"Tom continuously fought for the principles of internationalism among young people, pointing outover and over again that young people weren't just individuals in the United States but they were fighting with their brothers and sisters throughout the entire world in their strug-gle against imperialism and against the capitalist system. The determination that Tom showed in this fight and his willingness to sacrifice himself in single young person he ever met."

Ed Winn, from Trans-port Workers Local 100,

speaking in a personal capacity, told the meeting: "I hadn't known Tom yery long but in that brief moment that we did know each other. Fom had a great effect upon my life and on the lives of transit workers in the area that I worked. He fought, he

lived, he died a great fighter in the Trotskyist movement and there can be no greater inspiration for all of us — the working class youth and older workers - than to follow his example.

Comrade Winn ended his speech by reading a passage from Trotsky's speech, I Stake My Life, given on February 9, 1937: "The struggle in the offing transcends by far the importance of individuals, factions and parties. It is the struggle for the future of all mankind. It will be severe, it will be lengthy. Whoever seeks physical comfort or spiritual calm, let him step aside. In time of reaction, it is more convenient to lean on the bureaucracy than on the truth. But all those for whom the word socialism is not a hollow sound but the content of their moral life — forward!

"Neither threats, nor persecutions, nor violations can stop us! Be it even over our bleaching bones, the truth will triumph! We will blaze the trail for it. It will conquer! Under all the severe blows of fate, I shall be happy as in the best days of my youth! Because, my friends, the highest human happiness is not the exploitation of the present but the preparation of the future."

Mrs. Mary Elise Henehan, Tom's mother, also spoke to the meeting:

"I really didn't come prepared to speak but my heart tells me otherwise. I want to thank you all so very much for being here on behalf of myself and my son Paul, and my sons and daughters Ann, Ellen, Brendan, Matthew, Mary and Tom's Joanne: I want

to thank you all for loving Tom as we do. I want to thank you for sharing his life. I want to thank you for fighting his fight. I want to thank you for helping us all to say goodbye."

The speech of Comrade David North, national secretary of the Workers League, is reprinted in full below.

The final speaker was Michael Banda, general secretary of the Workers Revolutionary Party, representing the International Committee of the Fourth International.

The meeting was concluded with a collection which raised nearly \$5000 to launch the Tom Henehan Memorial Fundfor the building of the daily revolutionary newspaper. This was followed by the singing of the Internationals.

# TOM HENEHAN Young Socialist Victim Of a Political Murder

The Central Committee of the Workers Revolutionary Party (British section of the International Committee of the Fourth International) denounces the murder of Comrade Tom Henehan and the wounding of Comrade Jacques Vielot in Brooklyn, New York, on the night of Saturday October 15, as an attempt to terrorize and behead the revolutionary movement of the working class. In every sense this is a political murder.

We send our deepest condolences to the comrades and relations of this courageous fighter for Trotskyism whose life and struggle will be an outstanding example to revolutionary youth everywhere.

Comrade Tom was a professional revolutionary and a printer by frade, a cadre trained in the spirit of the implacable struggle to unmask the falsifiers of Leninism and Trotskyism and to build the world party of socialist revolution.

His devotion to Marxist theory and program was equalled by his determination to engage in the practical struggle to build the Young Socialists and the Workers League and its twiceweekly newspaper, the Bulletin.

He will be remembered with pride and affection by all the Young Socialists from 22 countries who met him at, the International Youth Conference in London, November 1975.

Fighting for revolutionary socialism in the USA — the powerhouse of world imperialism — in particular, is both tough and dangerous. It requires exceptional qualities of theoretical skill, political endurance and vigilant courage

No bourgeoisie in the world hates and fears the specter of communism more desperately than the American bourgeoisie.
