To All Campaign Directors and YSHB Organizers:

On July 7 the Communist Party, for the first time since 1940, announced that it was running a Communist presidential ticket. Charlene Mitchell and Mike Zagarell were selected as candidates for President and Vice President respectively.

The Communist Party does not view this announcement of their own ticket as a break from Democratic Party or third capitalist party politics. On the contrary, they have indicated that they will seek to use their candidacy to promote "progressive" movements in capitalist political formations.

Last May when the CP first indicated that it would be announcing its own ticket, Henry Winston, National Chairman of the CP, issued a statement which said: "Communist candidates in the Presidential race and in Congressional and other campaigns are expected to strengthen all progressive and independent forces, including those still working within the old parties and those building a third ticket movement in the elections, and will make the total campaign more relevant to the needs of the people." (The Worker, May 7, 1968)

At the same convention where the CP candidates were nominated a resolution was passed reiterating this position. The resolution, in part, stated:

- "1. All progressives should encourage the struggle around issues within the two party system and support those who place the fight for peace and against racism and poverty above adherence to traditional party machines.
- 2. All progressives should help build and consolidate existing third party formations to the end that there will be guaranteed in the 1968 elections a viable presidential ticket as an alternative to the two major party candidates. This outlook makes indispensable a cooperative position towards groupings and individuals within the two-party system now considering possible third ticket action.

Recognizing the significance of currents within the McCarthy movement for breaking with the Democratic party if Humphrey is nominated, we must note the grave danger of a compromise between sections of the McCarthy movement and the Humphrey forces in the Democratic Party and the attempt to hold back a third alternative in the name of maintaining the unity of the Democratic Alternative coalition.

While we have three elements in the overall objective of our electoral policy, our clear emphasis is the building of a mass third party."

In a statement by Charlene Mitchell, CP candidate for President, she indicated that, "Wherever Peace and Freedom or Freedom and Peace Parties appear on the ballot and run a national ticket we Communists view this as a very important step and we will encourage people to vote this ticket." (The Worker, July 14, 1968)

Unlike the CP, the Socialist Workers Party candidates are using their campaign to promote a complete break from capitalist politics by the labor movement, the black masses, and the student movement. The SWP campaign advances and helps build towards the formation of a labor party based on and responsible to the trade unions and an independent black party based on and responsible to the black community.

Furthermore, the SWP presidential campaign helps to promote and build mass actions against the Vietnam war and against racist oppression. For the SWP candidates the elections are not a time to urge people to end mass street actions in order to do precinct and wardheeling work for capitalist politicians.

We see the CP campaign as an obstacle to the development of independent working class and independent black political action, and will take advantage of every opportunity to expose their program and the role of their campaign.

The enclosed article that appeared in the <u>Daily World</u> (July 24, 1968) describes the dates and places of national speaking tours for Charlene Mitchell and Mike Zagarell. Campaign Committees and YSHB groups in these areas are urged to find out the exact dates when Mitchell or Zagarell will be in your area and attempt to set up debates between them and local SWP candidates or spokesmen. Many local political affairs clubs, liberal organizations, student governments would be interested in sponsoring a direct confrontation between CP and SWP candidates.

Material for local leaflets, articles in campus and Afro-American newspapers, campaigners, etc. can be used from this report and Harry Ring's article in The Militant (July 19, 1968). Further reports will be sent out as we receive new information.
