To All Campaign Directors and Young Socialists for Halstead and Boutelle Organizers

Dear Friends,

Enclosed is an up-to-date progress report on the campaign. Please post it on the bulletin board in your headquarters so that all campaign supporters can see it.

We ran out of the first run of 25,000 "Letter to GIs" brochures in five weeks and now have in stock a second printing of 50,000.

The brochure is very useful in raising contributions for the campaign. When Fred Halstead spoke at Columbia University-Barnard College, a very successful collection was taken by using the brochure. After Fred spoke a YSHBer read excerpts from the brochure. He then explained that we are giving the brochure to GIs free of charge, that they cost the campaign committee over two cents each, and that each person in the audience could help financially to get more of the brochures to GIs.

Enclosed is a chart that indicates how much it costs to send brochures airmail to various countries. This concrete information should be of assistance in obtaining contributions both from individuals and at meetings.

Reports from around the country indicate that we have been able to arrange a few student government-sponsored meetings for Halstead and Boutelle as a result of contacting Choice 68 coordinators. Clippings on these and all other meetings should be sent to the Choice 68 national office, Room 1924 Time & Life Building, Rockefeller Center, New York, N.Y. 10020. Local and regional

campaign newsletters with coverage of Choice 68 and other local mailings on Choice 68 should also be sent to the Choice 68 national office.

In addition all local campaign press releases should be sent to: The Militant; the Guardian, 197 E. 4th St., New York, N.Y., 10009; Liberation News Service, 3 Thomas Circle N.W., Washington, D.C., 20005; and the College Press Service, c/o Phil Semas, 1779 Church St. N.W., Washington, D.C. 20036.

Local campaign committees and YSHB groups are urged to add the list of other Halstead-Boutelle campaign committees to their mailing lists. Committees can get useful ideas from each other by seeing other local brochures, campaigners, methods of raising funds, etc. A complete list of local campaign committees is enclosed.

Some areas have been sending in lists of endorsers without the signed cards. In order to use the names of endorsers on leaflets, etc. we must have the signed endorser cards in the national campaign committee office.

Although high schools are not officially part of the Choice 68 campus poll, we can urge that high schools have mock elections and referenda on the war during that week in April. The fact that the poll comes during the week of antiwar activities means that high school referenda on the war and on the presidency could be an especially appealing antiwar activity.

CHANGES FROM LAST SUMMARY DATED JANUARY 23, 1968

Pennsylvania is now in the DONE category along with Michigan. Kentucky and New Jersey will also be finished up soon. Petitioning is going on in Kentucky now. A New Jersey petitioning mobilization is scheduled for March 23. The petition sheets for Iowa will soon be ready.

There are minor filing date changes for Vermont, Colorado, and Washington based on official election calendars. The dates previous ly listed for Maine, Indiana, Kentucky, Louisiana, Wisconsin, Iowa, Minnesota, Montana, No. Dakota, Connecticut, and New Jersey have been confirmed by the official calendars.

A new feature of this ballot status summary is the inclusion of the number of presidential electors that have been lined up in the various states.

Kansas was dropped from the summary because of the early filing date and substantial number of signatures required. Also, it was felt that Indiana should have priority.
