Nationwide Campus Vote on April 24

- Campaign for Halstead and Immediate Withdrawal -

Fred Halstead heads a list of 14 actual or prospective presidential candidates selected by the student directors of a nationwide campus vote to be held on April 24. The full list of candidates, whose names are arranged in alphabetical order, will be found in the sample ballot on page 2.

As you can see from the sample ballot, at the same time students can vote on three referendum issues ——two of them relating to the Vietnam war and one to the "urban crisis."

On the alternatives offered regarding the war in Vietnam, Fred Halstead and Paul Boutelle are calling for a vote for "Immediate withdrawal of American Forces" and "Permanent cessation of bombing."

dum, instead of being limited to a probe of attitudes on government spending, the Socialist Workers candidates are urging a write-in for "Black Control of the Black Community." This will give students an opportunity to express an opinion on the black power movement and the struggle of black people to win control over their own lives.

Time magazine is underwriting the cost of administrating the college poll. However, according to the student members of the board which runs the project, Time has made no attempt to influence their decisions.

- High School Students -

All college students (including junior college) can vote in CHOICE 68. This includes graduate students as well as undergraduates, those both over and under 21, and foreign students.



on the same day. Conservative campus administrators may persuaded by the fact that, lesides Time magazine backing, even LBJ was forced to say that "this kind of vote was highly significant, and he wished them success."

All campaign supporters should encourage the students on their campus to take advantage of this unprecedented opportunity to express their views on the war and the presidency. The poll raises the question why shouldn't all 18 year-olds have the right to vote? Why shouldn't those who are forced to kill and be killed in LBJ's war have the right to discuss and vote for the programs and candidates they favor?

IS YOUR CAMPUS IN CHOICE 68?

Although 5 million of the couny's 7 million college students will have a chance to vote in CHOICE 68, over 1,000 campuses with almost 2 million students have not yet joined. They can still participate, but they must do so immediately in order to ensure that students on these campuses get the fullest amount of information of the candidates and the issues.

Unfortunately, space limitation prevents us from printing the entire list of campuses that have already joined CHOICE 68. However, almost every school has been written to be the national office of CHOICE 68 asking them to participate (exceptions tend to be black schools or junior colleges). This makes your job easy. Ask the student body president or head of the student council whether your school has joined. If he is unaware of the project ask at the political science and social science departments.



Here are some ideas for campaigning for Chold 66. Don't feel limited by them however. And let us know what you are doing and what new ideas for campaigning you have.

- l. Form a campus Young Socialists for Halstead and Boutelle in order to participate in CHOICE 68. Be sure to let us know of its existence.
- 2. Make sure campus antiwar groups know about the referendum on the Vietnam war.
- 3. Get the Campus Coordinator to invite speakers from the Bocialist corkers campaign headquarters nearest you or challenge leaders of campus groups for other candidates to debate you.
- 4. Get the Socialist Workers CHCICE 68 posters and brochures out on the campus.
- 5. Set up on campus a campaign table on a regular basis with literature, posters, brochures and buttons.
- 6. Election eve (April 23) or as timinar permits schedule a debate between a representative of AcCarthy and a Socialist Workers spokesman on "What Choice in '68? Two Views."
 - 7. Get tames from the national campaign committee of speeches and interviews by Halstead and Boutelle for playing on the campus radio station.
 - 8. Get a group of campaign supporters and other interested individuals to distribute the "Letter to GIs" to GIs at plane, rail, and bus terminals.
 - 9. Get names and contributions for an ad in the campus newspaper just before or on April 24 urging a vote for Halstead, immediate withdrawal from Vietnam, permanent cessation of bombing, and black control of the black community.
 - 10. Fill your campus newspaper with articles and letters to the editor on CHCICE 68 and the Halstead-Boutelle campaign.
 - 11. Make sure foreign students are involved in CHOICE 68. This is their only chance to express their opin-ions on U.S. politics.

NEW CAMPAIGN AIDS FOR CHOICE 68

For more effective campaigning, three special items are being distributed for the CHOICE 68 campaign. There is a large (17" x 22") poster with a sample ballot X'ed for Fred Halstead, immediate withdrawal, permanent cessation of bombing, with "Black Control of the Black Community" written in.

And a miniposter (8½" x 11") identical to the large one.

And a new brochure entitled: "The Real Choice in '68." This is a comparison of statements on the war in Vietnam and the black uprisings by different presidential candidates.

You may also notice that we have added to the list of campaign literature: "GIs and the Fight Against War." This was written by Mary-Alice Waters, National Secretary of the Young Socialist Alliance, and has an introduction by Fred Halstead. It is an effective complement to the new 71 brochure.

10 DAYS OF ANTIWAR PROTEST

The timing of the national college vote and referendum couldn't have been better. The vote on CHOICE 68 will take place April 24. This is two days before the international student strike against the Vietnam war called for April 26 by the Student Mobilization Committee to End the War in Vietnam and the National Black Antiwar-Antidraft Union. In addition, April 27 has been set for demonstrations against the war in every major city in the world.

The poll comes in the middle of a ten-day period, April 21-30, that has been designated for campus action against the war by both the Student Mobilization Committee and Students for a Democratic Society.

CHOICE 68 will provide the student antiwar movement in the U.S. with an unusual opportunity to register massive opposition to Johnson's policy of aggression in Vietnam.

Campaigners should help get local antiwar committees involved in CHOICE 68. No matter what attitude is taken toward the presidential elections everyone against the war should unite in calling for the largest possible vote for immediate withdrawal of U.S. forces from Vietnam.

However, you can point out to individuals that only the Halstead-Boutelle ticket takes an unequivocal antiwar position - for getting ou of Vietnam, for bringing the GIs home now.

RAISING MONEY FOR THE CAMPAIGN

This is the biggest socialist election campaign in 30 years. The opportunities for talking for and acting on socialist ideas are virtually unlimited. One limitation, however, is money. Or better put: the scarcity of money.

If campaign supporters keep conscious of this lack they can tie-in fund-raising activity with regular campaigning:

Keep a can or box on the campaign table marked: "Donations for Socialist Campaign."

Ask the audience for contributions when campaign spokesmen come to the campus. When done at every meeting this can amount to a substantial sum. (U. of Wisconsin: \$60)

Secure travel expenses and an honorarium for the speaker. Student governments, through the help of CHOICE 68, are sponsoring many of our speakers.

Have a reception or a party with or without the candidates. Charge admission. (Boston: \$135)

Approach liberal professors and other potential contributors with the GI brochure. Point out how many can be distributed overseas with X amount of dollars.

Keeping this need in mind, individual campaign supporters and campus Young Socialists for Halstead and Boutelle groups should consider making a regular contribution on a weekly basis. Regular contributions, however modest, can add up when done on a nationwide scale.
