

In December, 1966, the American Federation of Teachers held a Racism in Education Conference in Washington, D.C. On May 11 - 13, 1967 a similar Racism in Education Conference, sponsored by the Michigan Federation of Teachers and the Detroit Federation of Teachers, was held in Detroit. About 2600 black and white teachers and interested persons from southern Michigan and nearby areas attended.

Speakers included Floyd McKissick, John O. Killens, Vincent Harding, James McPherson, Arna Bontemps, Ashley Montagu. Kits were given out; they included bibliographies on Afro-American history and culture, studies on racial attitudes of very young children, etc. Displays emphasized Afro-American history.

The mood of the Conference was black nationalist and the basic racism in America was repeatedly exposed. Very excited discussions took place over the questions of black power, black control of schools, using "Negro" versus Afro-American.

Below are quotes from a letter recently sent to Detroit teachers who indicated at a union meeting that they were interested in further activities to combat racism in the schools:

"As a follow-up to the Racism in Education Conference the Detroit Federation of Teachers has established a standing COMMITTEE AGAINST RACISM IN EDUCATION. We plan to implement an action program designed toward the improvement of quality education.

"This fall the Committee will assist classroom teachers by developing and distributing bibliographies, supplementary materials and sample lesson plans on Afro-American history; insuring the availability of textbooks and the planning of regional and city wide programs of interest and help to teachers in providing quality education."

An attempt is being made to get a Committee representative in each school who will publicize materials and announcements from the Committee, assist in surveys of materials and course offer ings and forward teachers' suggestions and requests. A questionnaire will soon be circulated throughout the schools (prepared by the Committee) in order to determine whether Afro-American history is being taught in classrooms.

- THE NEW CAUCUS supports those programs and policies advanced by the American Federation of Teachers for the improvement of salaries andworking conditions for all American teachers.
  - supports the expansion of collective bargaining rights for teachers.
  - supports the right of teachers to strike. When necessary. to achieve their legitimate demands.
  - believes that membership in the American Federation of Teachers should be open to all teachers regardless of race, religion or political belief.
  - urges support for programs and policies designed to guarantee full and equal educational opportunity for all.
  - urges that the American Federation of Teachers require all of its locals with the right of collective bargaining to negotiate contracts including courses in the school curricula on: Afrò-American History, American Labor History, and History of the Civil and Human Rights struggles throughout the world.
  - urges the American Federation of Teachers to call upon all federal, state and local governments to provide fund and implement programs that will guarantee free health care to all children.
  - urges the American Federation of Teachers to call upon federal, state and local governments to provide and fund programs which will eradicate the social and economic injustices which have set off the civil insurrections across the nation and insure maximum participation by those who suffer these injustices in the planning and conduct of such programs.
  - believes the American Federation of Teachers has the responsibility to assume a leadership role in the AFL-CIO in order to press for the necessary revitalization of the American labor movement.

## **Detroiter Leads Dissent**

## Teachers Union Split

WASHINGTON — A split in the American Federation of Teachers (AFT) here — with a Detroit man leading the dissenters — may reflect growing turmoil in the AFL-CIO Detroit Federation of Teachers (DFT).

Edward Simpkins, full-time vice-president of the DFT, is chairman of a newly organized caucus, announced as the AFT convention closed here yesterday, which is opposed to the current AFT leadership. This leadership includes Charles Cogen, AFT president, and Mrs. Mary Ellen Riordan, DFT president, who is a powerful voice in the dominant Progressive Caucus, which elected Cogen and other AFT officers.

Asked whether his split with Mrs. Riordan on national union policy reflected a difference at the local level. Simpkins said:

"We are as united in the DFT as we have been.

SIMPKINS SAID the New Caucus — its formal name — was formed because union members who tried to voice an opinion "were stifled and oppressed" both in Progressive Caucus meetings and on the floor of the convention.

One basic area of difference was on the question of whether the convention should condemn the war in Vietnam. It was a question that caused a three-hour parliamentary wrangle, marked by flaring tempers, on the floor of the convention.

Simpkins sided with the minority, demanding the AFT take a stand against the war while Mrs. Riordan was on the majority side — that the AFT should express no opinion.

ANOTHER DETROIT delegate, David Herreshoff, a Wayne State University faculty member, was a leader in pushing for condemnation of the war. Herreshoff also is a supporter of Simpkins in the New Caucus.

The New Caucus is deeply concerned with the rights of Negro teachers and pupils and wants to "modify the racist views of many teachers."

"A teacher can be black without being a black-thinking teacher," Simpkins said. "We want black-thinking teachers."

Simpkins said the New Caucus is not a Black Power

Simpkins sided with the migroup, although some of its ority, demanding the AFT ideas might agree with those ke a stand against the war of Black Power advocates.

THE NEW CAUCUS also is critical of the "growth and strength of conservative leadership and policies within the labor movement which have led to an increasing gap between white and black trade unionists."

Simpkins said this leadership included Mrs. Riordan, Cogen and Dave Selden, a former Detroiter and AFT vicepresident.

The New Caucus, Simpkins said, now has 150 members out of the 800 delegates attending the convention. The Progressive Caucus has about 450 members.

In the internal politics of the AFT, the caucuses are formal organizations supporting various candidates and issues and delegates pay dues to join.

THREE YEARS ago the Progressive Caucus, with Mrs. Riordan playing a leading role, upset the conservative National Caucus candidate and elected Cogen. Since then it has become the dominant caucus.

"The Progressive Caucus has become the conservative caucus," Simpkins said. "The New Caucus will grow and replace the Progressive Caucus as the organization of union liberals."

HE SAID the caucus membership now comes from 20 locals with most coming from New York, California, Illinois and Michigan,

Simpkins said about half of the 48 members of the DFT delegation to the convention had joined the New Caucus but he did not know how many of these also maintained their membership in the Progressive Caucus.

The Detroit NEW CAUCUS (which includes teachers from all over southeastern Michigan) has begun organizing for the AFT convention of 1969. Two committees have been set up: Steering Committee and Newsletter Committee.

Simpkins reported receiving many messages of interest in the NEW CAUCUS and it is hoped that relations with teachers across the country can be cemented through the Newsletter.
