Dear Comrades,

Enclosed are two flyers published by the Puerto Rican Solidarity Day Committee and a letter asking for the Party's cosponsorship.

This committee was formed on the initiative of the Puerto Rican Socialist Party to organize a rally in Madison Square Garden on Sunday, October 27. The central demand of the action is independence for Puerto Rico.

The PSP's first step was to establish a national board whose members are indicated on the enclosed literature. This board met in New York about two months ago and decided the general character of the action and held a news conference to announce it.

According to Alfredo Lopez, a prominent PSPer who has been assigned to head up this project, the letter asking for cosponsorship went to about 40 organizations, most of them to groups and individuals in the radical movement.

Although it's clear that there is heavy CP influence in this action, it offers an opportunity to meet and work with young Puerto Ricans inside and around the PSP. In New York and Boston comrades have been assigned to participate in the support committees for the action.

In other cities, especially where the PSP has branches, support committees may be underway and comrades are urged to check this out and get involved. Because of the PSP's close ties with CASA and the Crusade for Justice these groups may initiate committees in Colorado and California. Reports on this activity should be sent to Doug Jenness.

Dear brothers and sisters of the Socialist Workers Party,

On October 27th our committee will be sponsoring an action of tremendous importance: a demonstration in solidarity with the independence of Puerto Rico. This action, which will be held in Madison Square Garden in New York, is important because it will be the largest demonstration around this issue in the history of the United States.

We are enclosing a brochure on the demonstration. We are sure that when you read this over you will agree with us that this demonstration's importance is magnified by the current situation in Puerto Rico and the rest of the world.

The independence movement in Puerto Rico is calling this period "the turning point for Puerto Rico." Massive industrial construction and the investment of billions of dollars by United States business is rapidly destroying the island physically. In fact, as the government experts have said in a recent document, the only solution for Puerto Rico's population will soon be massive migrations to the United States and forced sterilization. There will soon be no place to live.

At the same time, the issue of Puerto Rico gives the progressive people of this country the ability to strike a blow against the continuation and intensification of the same policy they opposed during the anti-war movement. The issue gives the left of this country an opportunity to attain a powerful unity in the opposition to this policy.

We are asking your organization to officially co-sponsor this campaign. Co-sponsorship indicates that you are going on record in support of the statement in the Call, you are pledging whatever resources are available (including newspapers and bulletins) to build the action and you are making a commitment to mobilize in the form of ticket sales (whose \$3 price is designed only to cover the costs of rental of the Garden).

We would like your immediate answer since the campaign must get underway and, after receiving that answer, our staff will be in touch to discuss exact details. Many national organizations have already committed themselves to co-sponsorship. We are certain that you will join them and the people of this country in demanding: Independence for Puerto Rico...a Bi-Centennial Without Colonies. In that spirit, we welcome you to the campaign.

A Call for Solidarity with Puerto Rico

We, residents of the United States, declare our support for the December 1973, history-making United Nations' resolution recognizing "the inalienable, right of the people of Puerto Riço to self-determination and independence" & demand a Bi-Gentennial, Without Golonies.

PUERTO RICO IS A CLASSICAL COLONY OF THE UNITED STATES. This has been true since the 1898 invasion by United States troops, which violated the autonomous political status, ceded to Puerto Rico by Spain a year earlier. Although Puerto Rico today supposedly has its own government and constitution, in fact the U.S. Congress has jurisdiction over eighty-five vital areas of Puerto Rican political and economic life... In 1917, Puerto Ricans were deprived of their rights of a nation and forced to become U.S. citizens, in time to be drafted into the World War I army.

THIS POLITICAL CONTROL IS DEEPENED BY ECO-NOMIC DEPENDENCE. North American corporations control 85% of all industry in Puerto Rico. These corporations, exempt from taxes and benefitting from the low wage-scale, extract huge profits. A dramatic example of this economic colonialism is the escalating investment in the petro-chemical industry on the island over the last 15 years.

... For the Puerto Rican people this means that industrial development is based on the needs of North American industry. Puerto Ricans produce what they cannot consume and consume what they do not produce. In fact, Puerto Rico is the fourth largest market for U.S.-produced goods in the world!

U.S. control of Puerto Rico has created a life and death crisis for this nation of four million people, with a history of more than four hundred years. U.S. domination stifles any real economic development on the island, bringing starvation wages and a cost of living even higher than in the U.S., and causing chronic unemployment for 30% of the workers. Forced to look for work, over one and one-half million Puerto Ricans migrated to the United States. Those who leave face brutal racist oppression on the mainland, live in the worst slums or migrant camps, and find only the lowest paying jobs available.

The corrupt government of Puerto Rico, unwilling and unable to resolve the people's problems, and losing popular support, has become more repressive. Five political prisoners, members of the Nationalist Party of Puerto Rico, have been in U.S. jails for more than twenty years. Today there are mounting political arrests, constant police brutality, and threats on the lives of political activists. Right-wing groups, with proven financial ties to the CIA, have been linked to several bombings of Claridad a pro-independence newspaper, and attacks on the offices of both the Puerto Rican Socialist Party (PSP) and the Puerto Rican Independence Party (PIP).

THESE REALITIES HAVE NOT GONE UNCHALLENGED. From the very beginning at the time of the Spanish invasion, Puerto Rico has had a long history of anti-colonial struggle, with traditions of courage and resistance. Today, the Puerto Rican independence movement is growing by leaps and bounds. Labor strikes this past year—on a national level—have halted all trucking, municipal transportation, school services, sanitation collection, electrical and power utilities operations. The student movement, the most militant sector of the independence movement since the early sixties, has closed down the University twice this year—once in support of labor struggles.

This resistance brought the colonial condition of the Puerto Rican people to the attention of the nations of the world. Last year, after listening to Ruben Berrios and Juan Mari Bras, the leaders of the Puerto Rican Independence Party and the Puerto Rican Socialist Party, in a precedent-setting moment the United Nations approved the resolution which declared that Puerto-Rico has the right to independence and instructed the United States and the corporations under its jurisdiction to refrain from any measures—economic or social—which might serve as an obstacle to decolonization. Current U.S. plans for building a superport petroleum complex and massive strip mining for copper in the central mountain range clearly show that the United States intends to ignore this resolution.

The United States government continues to deny the existence of the massive independence movement. The mass media maintains a conspiracy of silence about it, promoting the myth that Puerto Rico is the "showcase of democracy."

In 1976, the United States will celebrate its 200th anniversary as a nation. It is a farce to speak of celebrating the 1776 revolution against colonialism while denying freedom to another people. The millions of Americans who rejected U.S. domination in Vietnam must join in demanding an end to U.S. domination of the courageous Puerto Rican people.

THE MOMENT OF UNITY IS HERE. It is up to us, people living in the U.S., to make the government stop its illegal and immoral activity in Puerto Rico, to pull out its troops and stop its repressive intervention—to get out of the Puerto Rican people's lives.

On May 1, 1974 the Puerto Rican Socialist Party called for a massive demonstration of support for the struggle of the Puerto Rican people for their independence in New York on October 27, 1974.

WE CALL ON THE PEOPLE OF THE UNITED STATES TO SHOW CONCRETE SUPPORT FOR THE STRUGGLE OF THE PUERTO RICAN PEOPLE IN THIS MASSIVE NATIONAL MOBILIZATION.

Dear Comrades,

We are in possession of your letter of July 4 and of the material to which that letter refers. We have considered your request that the proposal for a special world congress should be placed on the agenda of the next meeting of the United Secretariat. We concur with that request.

Given the gravity of the situation, we think that an emergence meeting of the United Secretariat is required in the month of August, although the last United Secretariat session had decided to hold the next Un. Sec. meeting only in September. The earliest possible date to have a quorum of Un. Secr. members assembled seems to be August 25-26. We therefore tentatively call the Un. Secr. meeting on these dates, but are willing to consider an earlier date if you should request so and make definite proposals in that respect.

WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

To U.S. Corporations and the U.S. Government:

- A cheap labor force which can be exploited because the unemployment rate is 30% and workers are legally unprotected.
- A tax-exempt bonanza for U.S. companies with weak anti-pollution laws and no profit restrictions.
- A captive market for U.S. goods, because the U.S. Congress controls all trade and currency.
- A lucrative U.S. tourist industry which brings with it drugs, prostitution and organized crime.
- A steady source of cheap migrant labor for the farms, factories and service industries in the United States.
