NO comrade, your eyes aren't deceiving you. This is Roger Protz writing in Keep Left. The editorial board has offered me this column, with complete freedom to put my own point of view. The pages of 'New Advance' are closed to me, as a journalist and a Young Socialist. I have therefore turned to another Young Socialist paper with a national circulation; a paper with only a part-time staff and no machinery helpind its a paper.

and no machinery behind it: a puper foot-slogging loyalty of its readers.

I have clashed in the past with Ho comers press of Key Left policies thr. That doesn't stop me writing for had them. A lively paper is one that is open to all shades of opinion.

Nevertheless, this is a sad time for me. 'New Advance' had many faults, but you don't live with a paper for eight months without feeling some affection for it. As I made quite clear when my future was under discussion at Transport House, I wanted to go on working for the Party, to produce the best possible paper for the YS

I was dismissed from Transport House because of the 'unsatisfactory nature of my oral and written statements concerning my action at the YS Conference.' In other words, I was sacked because I refused to retract what I said in my statement at the conference.

This then is the great democratic Transport House machine, where free speech and brotherly-love

But enough about me. I'm a very small drop in the Labour Party ocean. It's the Young Socialist movement that has been kicked in the teeth, not me. The future of the movement is at stake.

If the heavy hand of Transport

House is going to continue to throttle what firstle life 'Advance' had, what hope can the Young Socialists have for the future?

Are the demands of the YS really so outrageous-freedom to discuss policy at all levels, control of the official YS journal, representation on the NEC and Annual Conference?

Are these the demands of dis-rupters? No! They are the demands of young people, dedi-cated socialists, who love the Labour Party but who are dismayed at its present chaotic state. We are young people prepared to fight for a society free from the evils of capitalism and class-warfare, a fight which must be channelled constitutionally through the Labour Party.

The ageing Party urgently needs a militant youth movement, tens of thousands strong. Such a movement can only be built if the Young Socialists themselves are allowed to run it, free from the 'guidance of greying bureaucrats.

We want freedom to build a large youth movement, dedicated to socialism and to return the Party to its former greatness.

Roger Protz was sacked from the Transport House Press Department on April 26. Protz is a 22-year-old journalist and secretary of East Ham South YS. He joined Transport House in August 1960 after completing his National Service. Questioned by a Keep Left reporter, he said: 'It is vital that our movement should have a strong monthly paper. "New Advance" will not fill that role until we control it. As far as Keep Left is concerned, I stand by what I said in my statement: "I dislike some of the things you say, but I will defend your right to say them."



At its meeting on Friday, 28 April the 115-strong East Ham South branch voted on a resolution to sponsor Keep Left. Only one hand was raised against. East Ham is just one of the many branches to decide to support the paper since the YS Conference.

N C BACKS PROTZ

THE first meeting of the National Committee of Young Socialists has demanded that Roger Protz be reinstated as Editor of New Advance. The Committee passed a resolution submitted by Liz Thompson, North-West Regional member, which declared:

'This National Committee of the Young Socialists dis-asso-ciates itself with the action of the NEC in sacking Roger Protz, editor of New Advance. We demand that Roger Protz be reinstated immediately.'

The meeting was held in London on April 29/30, 1961, and was attended by all 11 members. The Committed elected Alan Mullarkey as Chairman and Janet Dugdale as Vice-Chairman.

NEW ADVANCE

The resolution passed by the annual conference demanding democratic control of New Advance was discussed.

It was decided to elect a subcommittee of the NC to act as an editorial board. This arrangement should only be temporary and the next annual conference should elect

the board.

It was also decided to advertise for an editor of New Advance and that the NC should interview all candidates and recommend one to the National Executive Committee of the Labour Party.

These decisions, however, cannot be put into operation until ratified by the NEC.

The two resolutions on Keep Left discussed at the conference were noted and no action was proposed on them.

GAITSKELL

The resolution moved by Bury YS at the conference and carried, which supported the Scarborough nationalization. decisions on nationalization, defence and called for Gaitskell to resign, was discussed. It was decided to refer this to the NEC with a recommendation that this body should meet the NC to draw up a campaign on the lines of the

Amongst resolutions carried by the annual conference, supported by the Committee and forwarded to the NEC for their consideration were those in opposition to the H-bomb and for political discussion at regional and federation level.

MOVEMENT!

Wigan Branch Sets the Pace By Liz Thompson

BUILDING a strong socialist youth movement is a complicated and hard task. But it is a rewarding one. The problems are many; finding premises, avoiding a rough house, getting an understanding between the youth and the adults within the Labour Party, getting the politics to the non-political youth, overcoming 'superior' attitudes toward the non-political, and getting a stable team within the branch.

The problem of premises varies from district to district. But there is one thing to steer clear of—that is holding meetings in someone's Book a room, or use the local Labour Party offices until better premises are found. You must constantly be turning outward if you are going to build.

The importance of understanding between adults in the party and the young socialists cannot be under-estimated. The Right-wing seek to confine the vast energy of youth. They bottle up a live youth movement, taking the stopper off the bottle for elections, a rally and a school here and there.

Adults Afraid

But some of the other adults in the party, who really do want a strong youth movement, tend to be afraid of youth They see us as damage, and causing all sorts of

havoc.
'We can't have just any type of youth in the branch', is one of the favourite pieces of advice. They praise us for being rebels but then seem ashamed when rebellious acts happen.

In a branch in the North-West recently, damage was done. Bitter feeling existed on both sides. The party wanted to shut down the branch and re-organize it on political lines. Here were 35 young people who said they had done the damage for laughs.

The adults wanted to re-organize

on a political basis at one fell swoop. But getting politics to youth is planned work. One cannot give politics in the course of one evening. It is a process.

No Kid Gloves

This doesn't mean to say that young people who cause disorder need to be treated with kid gloves. Any tendency to treat all adults as the 'enemy' and to look upon the Labour Party as 'them' must be countered.

The Young Socialists must be the ones to capture this moving, living and uninhibited youth. harness their strength to the cause for socialism

A Team

Just a word to the superior. what can be done with such wiki Build a team within the branch of those who are coming to politics for the first time together with those who are political. Such

a team can only assist one another.

I have found that once young people coming to politics for the first time begin to move politically, then they do so at a swift rate.

Great strides can be taken, if we constantly refresh our ideas and don't allow them to become part of the furniture.

History shows that all working class movements had to be fought for. We now have to fight to build a great Young Socialist movement.

Anti-Bomb Marches Go International

still the voices rang out and the banners were held high. This was Aldermaston Four, the biggest annual event in the British political

Ambitiously the Campaign or-ganisers had decided on a twoprong march. Aldermaston, the gaunt death-giving factory, was to be one rallying point, and Wethersfield, NATO war base, to be the other.

Quickly demonstrators assembled. By coach, rail, car and on foot they poured into the fields earmarked for the assembly points.

The overwhelming number of demonstrators were in the teen-age group. YCND sections from district after district raised their banners. But this year the political youth groups were seen in strength.

Quit NATO

Young Socialists had come prepared. Banners and placards declared firmly for unilateralism and a withdrawal from the NATO military alliance. The Keep Left banner which led the Young Socialist contingent on the Aldermaston march called boldly 'Labour Must Quit NATO, Close Rocket Bases, Stop Making H-Bombs'. A firm stand on the Scarborough decisions was the keynote of these marchers.

The Young Communist League was also prominent in the marches. Trade unions, too, were demonstrating their solidarity in the fight against the bomb. Banners pre-viously reserved only for May Day and strikes now took the road to Trafaigar Square. Labour Parties had their members striding along with the youth of the Party.

German Delegation

International contingents gave colour and weight to the demonstration. USA, France, Israel, Ghana: country after country were present. Late on Friday night the marchers were joined by a German delegation some 400 strong. These were young metal workers who had travelled many hours to join the protest. This was a big change to previous years. The international section was not only stronger, but it was young trade unionists who were giving it the strength.

100,000 Greet them

The march through London, though in pouring rain, gathered strength and when, thanks to excellent organisation, the two marches came together at White-hall, some 32,000 entered Trafalgar Square. Here over 100,000 waited to greet them.

As the marchers gathered they heard the message of solidarity and greetings from the Young Socialist Conference which had met that

This was the fourth march. Still the great need is to bring the emphasis on the participation and struggle within the Labour move-ment. We must win those young people who demonstrated into the ranks of the Young Socialists and give their beliefs a political back-

French Workers Demand End to Bloody War

FOR over seven years the Algerians have fought for freedom. This has been one of the bitterest conflicts in the long history of colonial struggle for independence. French imperialism mobilized in its notorious paratroop regiments and Foreign Legion the fascist dregs of Europe. Brutal torture of the most hideous kind was the stock in trade of these 'supermen'. But they could not halt the fight for

This long, drawn-out war was gradually making France bankrupt. The French imperialists were divided amongst themselves. One section felt the war was too costly and that peace should be negotiated and the other, mainly the colons of Algeria, insisted that the war should continue.

In May 1958 General Charles de Gaulle assumed dictatorial powers in a last-ditch effort to stabilize the French economy. This brought him into open conflict with the

Labour Movement

Although de Gaulle has triumphed over the mutiny of the French army generals in Algéria he has done so with the realization that had it not been for the Labour movement intervening energetically against the pro-Fascists in Algeria he might well have been defeated.

This is cold comfort for de Gaulle. He represents French capitalism which is now in great difficulties. Those who have mutinied did not stand alone. They obviously have friends in high places, even inside de Gaulle's The general has administration.

paid a heavy price for defeating them.

He faces growing demands from the trade unions and working-class organizations for improvements in living standards. and more the French working class are refusing to pay the bill for the war in Algeria. De Gaulle knows very well that it will not be long before he has to turn against those on the Left who helped him to defeat the mutinous generals.

The Real Face

Like President Kennedy of the United States he is a staunch supporter of capitalism. As he is forced more and more to oppose the working class, so he will in his own way open avenues for re-grouping the extreme Right-wing Fascist forces.

For the time being he will try to keep them in reserve and at the same time reduce living standards as much as possible.

Stormy days are ahead for France. After the Belgian general strike the French working class can be expected to press forward their just demands in the next period. It is then that we shall see the real face of General de

One Hour Token Strike by Car Workers

Car workers from the Renault factory in the Boulogne Billancourt district of Paris staged a one-hour token strike on April 24 to protest against the fascist coup in Algiers. Their banners demanded: 'Peace in Algeria', 'Stop Fascism', and 'Jail the Felon Generals'.



Angry Parisians Demonstrate

In another part of the capital tens of thousands of angry Parisian workers gathered in a railway station and demonstrated against the French generals power-grab. They, too, had led a token strike. The strength and militancy of French workers must be giving de Gaulle many sleepless

THE Monroe Doctrine's most important provision is 'hands off the American republics', meaning in effect that no non-American country, like Britain or the Soviet Union, can do political business of the highest importance with states or the offer. importance with states on or off the American continent without the approval of 'Uncle Sam'.

Yes, until the Cuban Revolution burst upon the Western hemisphere like the revelations of Christ among the ancient Jews, the USA had been directing, exploiting and punishing its unhappy neighbours with ease, smugness and typical capitalist ruthlessness.

Sponsoring

By secretly sponsoring, through the notorious Alan Dulles, those rapacious, well equipped hordes of reactionary, mercenary and Batista loving counter-revolutionaries to overcome the legitimate regime of Dr. Castro, President Kennedy, the 'liberal' saviour of the 'Free World', is committing infanticide.

How come? Simply by the fact that the regime Kennedy wants to murder is the child of American economic imperialism, the reaction of a rich in resources, but impoverished country, that for too long has known itself to be a subject nation with 10 per cent unemployment

due to the policies of its masters. It now seeks a place of respect and independence in the world.

True, Fidel Castro has made what appears to many Western eyes to be 'mistakes'. He has seized much property indiscriminately and his outspoken language is often appalling.

President Eisenhower did not give the young fledgling friendly advice to set a steady course, but ostracized him from the start, prompted by the lobbying of the dispossessed monopolistic sugar company that dominated Cuban agriculture. Kennedy now shows no change of heart, declaring that since Cuba takes Russian oil, weapons and economic aid, Castro is a communist.

Socialist

But the point is that Cuba is forced to do these things because these necessities are not forthcoming from 'Uncle Sam'

Castro, the experts admit, is no communist, but a good enthusiastic socialist. What the Americans fear is not that Dr. Castro's government may turn out to be communist, but that it is socialist in the least degree, that for instance, its ideals are that of the British Labour movement. In fact, the American attitude is one of intolerant hatred of socialism in any form whatsoever.

Workers of the World Rally on May Day

ALL over the world the working class demonstrates on May Day. How did May Day come about? It was first set aside as a day for universal working class demonstrations by the First Congress of the Second International, meeting in Paris in 1889. May 1 was chosen mainly because of events in 1886.

On May 1, 1886, Chicago workers had come out on strike for the eight-hour day. During an armed police attack on the picket lines somebody threw a bomb which killed seven policemen. The culprit, who was never discovered, was believed to be an employers' agent.

This incident was used as the pretext for unleashing a reign of terror on the labour movement. Eight anarchists were arrested and charged with First Degree murder.

Executions

The trial was a farce. The radical political opinions of the accused were the only 'proof' of their guilt. A handpicked jury sentenced them to death after a big press campaign.

Only a world-wide protest saved four of the men from execution.

The first May demonstration was held in London, Sunday May 4, 1890 when about 100,000 joined the procession and 250,000 people gathered in Hyde Park. Despite bans on processions there were widespread strikes and demonstrations throughout Europe.

The struggles of the Belgian workers, the Japanese youth, and young Africans over the last year show the way forward. Only the successful outcome of these struggles can safeguard the great achievements of Soviet science by overthrowing capitalism and building socialism throughout the world.

STATE PLANNING WINS— EVERY TIME!

IN 1917 the Soviet Union was a nation of illiterate peasants, a small working class, no scientific or technological skill, and with very little exploration of her mineral resources. In 1961 a Soviet cosmonaut was projected 180 miles into space, to circle the globe and return to a pre-seleted landing spot—all in 89 minutes 6 seconds.

How was it possible to advance so far in 44 years? It required a a planned economy; the planned direction of resources, research, manufacture, and the tremendous educational projects which have created a literate and cultured working class.

The emphasis on the develorment of science and technology, and all these features of Soviet society, are the direct result of the October revolution.

'A STUNT'

The capitalistic press eve tried to play down this wonderful achievement. Sir Harry Massie, chairman of the British National Space Committee, said in the Express, 'There is no justification for an expensive man-in-space programme, from the scientific point of view.' Sir Marcus Oliphant called it 'a stunt'. 'The flight was only brought about by sacrificing all scientific and technological advancements in other industries.' This is obviously nonsense. Gagarin's flight was only achieved by the co-operation and mutual research of all major industries.

The accuracy with which his flight was controlled—a difference

of one foot when the spaceship 'Vostik' began to descend would have meant an eventual difference of 30 miles to his landing spot, or a few miles too fast and it would have burned to a cinder—was only made possible by every component of the rocket and control gear being of the highest standard.

being of the highest standard.

All this called for new and exacting industries. In the electronic and servo field new transmitting and receiving techniques were needed, and the existing forms of remote electronic control had to be mastered and perfected.

FUEL RESEARCH

New demands were made on the fuel technologist. A fuel was required that was low in weight, had safe handling properties, and which would be capable of delivering the 200,000 pounds per square inch thrust necessary to lift the $4\frac{1}{2}$ ton 'Vostok', together with its 150 ton mother rocket, into orbit.

All this was a result of the social relations established by the October Revolution. To the workers, scientists and technologists of the Soviet Union we send our sincerest congratulations.
