'The Times' stated that the discipline was almost 'frightening'. What really 'frightens' 'The Times' is that we showed at the conference that we intend to campaign in a serious, responsible and organised way, to win the support of millions of workers in Britain for our socialist policies.

During Sunday morning's session fraternal delegates from the trade unions, Old Age Pensioners' Associations and socialist youth movements in other countries stated that they were looking to the Young Socialists in Britain to spearhead the struggle for a new leadership in the international workers' movement—a movement that would fight for socialism in opposition to the present leaders, who deceive, betray and demoralise the working class.

The young workers in the pictures on this page and many of the members of the YS branch live on the Cranhill estate, which is one of many that have sprung up around Glasgow during the past 20

These young people may not have known the slums of Glasgow as their mothers and fathers did, but they face a dull and dreary life on an estate which has very few facilities.

There is no shopping centre even now, 20 years after the first building was erected. Rising bus fares and rising rents make the situation worse.

It is against this background of frustration and boredom amongst the youth that the Glasgow Young Socialists first started a campaign on the estate before the anti-Tory rally on September 27 last year, and began a branch of 50 members.

During the election campaign Cranhill members went out canvassing to explain Young Socialist policies to the many workers living on the estate suffering from high rents.

They told the tenants that the YS was for the nationalization of the building industry so that no immense profits were made from rents which workers had to pay each week.

Their activities received some hostility from the local right-wing officials of the Labour Party.

A lot of trouble blew up over the use of a meeting room after the YS held a successful dance. Petty complaints were made about the hands on a clock being moved.

What really worried the Labour Party officials was that a large number of the Cranhill YS members paid a visit to another branch which was considered 'respectable' by the local party.

This six-strong branch demanded that one of the Cranhill members leave the meeting. He refused, insisting that there should be a discussion on the Morecambe conference and the backdating of the pensions increase.

But the so-called 'respectables' did not stay for discussion. Instead they left the meeting.

At the lobby on February 4 to demand the backdating of the pensions increase, Cranhill members met their MP who glibly told them: 'Why come to London to see me? I can see you in Glasgow any time.'

Plans have been made for a joint meeting with the Ward Labour Party where he will speak and the Young Socialists aim to raise the question of the backdating of the pensions increase.

Following the lobby Cranhill started its campaign to get young people to the Morecambe conference, and organised a dance after the annual general meeting of the Glasgow Federation of Young Socialists.

There are a number of factories in the area where

wages for long hours.

Young girls told YS members that they receive about £3 10s. at 15. After six months they get a rise to just over £4 and a further 10s. increase at 16.

An answer

At one factory young married women are reported to take home £7 a week. Girls work a 40-hour week with a 45-minute mid-day break and 10 minutes in the morning.

These young workers are

looking for an answer to the problems which face them daily at work and after work on a bleak housing estate.

Many of them have joined the Young Socialists because they realise that the only way to fight for better conditions in the Cranhills of this world is to organise in a socialist movement.

Cranhill YS sent a large group of delegates and visitors to the Morecambe conference, where these young workers took part in voting for the policies of the Young Socialists.

When they return to Cranhill there is little doubt that these eager members of the Young Socialists will continue to expand their branch to young workers throughout their area.

5th Conference of Young Socialists

Demands emergency conference of the Labour Party

BY THE EDITOR

N the largest, most impressive socialist youth congress for 25 years, 510 delegates and over 500 visitors took part in the Fifth Annual Conference of the Young Socialists in the Winter Gardens, Morecambe, on February 27 and 28.

This tremendous step in organising a conference independently of Transport House and its right-wing officials heralded a new stage in the fight to build a mass Young Socialist movement.

Answering the slanderous lies of the right-wing Labourites and the Stalinists of the Communist Party, these young people, many of them very new to socialist politics, showed exemplary discipline

During the eight-hour conference, delegates voted for socialist policies, revealing themselves to be the most advanced leadership of the labour movement. They made the important demand for the calling of an emergency Labour Party conference immediately.

Many Young Socialists have, in fact, become most experienced leaders in the fight to defeat the right wing of the Labour Party and their policies and those of the socalled 'left-wingers'.

Some young people spoke before a political meeting for the first time in their lives to an audience which included visitors from old age pensioners' associations, trade unions and Labour

Experienced representatives of the capitalist press, who in the past have probably seen many political conferences and who were unable to criticise, deliberately played down the role of the momentous congress.

For them, this was something entirely new.

In the past the press has done its best to portray socialist youth as irresponsible hooligans. Keep Left has always condemned this attitude.

At Morecambe, these hardened cynics were unable to hide from the world the fact that the Young Socialists have established themselves as a disciplined leadership in the labour movement.

Before the conference, considerable pressure was put on the Mayor, the town council and hoteliers by the right wing of the Labour Party in a vicious and scurrilous attempt to get the conference stopped.


But the conference was held. It was a tremendous success. And, at the reception held by the Mayor of Morecambe, Councillor J. F. McHale, in the Winter Gardens ballroom on the Saturday evening, Morecambe's first citizen said:

'I don't agree with your policies, but I want to welcome you to Morecambe and express my gratitude and that of the town for the way in which you have behaved yourselves.'

In a letter to the Morecambe paper, 'The Visitor', hotelier, Mrs. L. McCalden, says:

'We were invaded this last week-end by a thousand young people who held their conference in our town.

'As a hotelier I welcomed them. Rumours persisted that

they would tear the town apart and extra police would be needed and they would have a rare time. Fear grew in the hearts of the people who were extending hospitality.

'My house was full of gay, well-behaved young people. They were well organised in every way. I cannot speak too highly in their favour.'

The decisions of the Morecambe conference present a big challenge to the Young Socialists and its young leadership of 12 National Committee members.

This leadership, all of whom have only been in politics for four years, has been forged in the fight against the right wing, and their supporters, the centrists.

With its official paper Keep Left, we are sure that the Young Socialists will forge ahead to lead big struggles against capitalism in future, in the fight for socialism.



The YS and the Labour Government

(Moved by Dave Ashby, chairman of the Young Socialists National Committee, and passed unanimously)

The calling of an emergency Labour Party Conference must be the demand of every trade union, YS branch and Constituency Labour Party if the movement is to be saved from a disaster of the magnitude of that engineered by MacDonald in 1931. Already divisions appear within the Labour Cabinet on economic policy and many unions will be forced by the demands of their members to oppose the Government's wage freeze as prices rocket. Are we to allow the Labour Government to go down in a morass of divisions and disillusionments? The Young Socialists say no!

No wage freeze, no sackings, stop rising costs! Backdate pension increases now. Say no to the banks! Nationalize aircraft, engineering, steel and chemicals, land and the building and building materials industry, the banks and insurance, with workers' control! End colonialism, withdraw all support for imperialism in Vietnam and Malaysia!

A call to the labour movement to demand an emergency Labour Party Conference was made by Dave Ashby, chairman of the National Committee in opening the conference. He was moving the resolution 'The YS and the Labour govern-

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'There is only one way to prevent the return of the Tories. The Labour Party Conference must be called immediately to decide on a policy against the rising cost of living, against the wage freeze dressed up as 'incomes

The course of the present Labour government was following the implications of 1931,

'We have to remind ourselves what happened in 1931. Pressure was put on the Labour government by big business to cut the dole in order to secure a loan from the United States of America.'

He said that the labour movement could not tolerate a situation where Callaghan, Chancellor of the Exchequer, will introduce a budget entirely against the interests of the working class.

The Labour government had in fact continued the policies of the Tories. Callaghan had presented a defence budget to the workers and a three-year package deal in engineering, wage restraint and rising prices.

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We had to take a firm stand against the Labour government strengthening the immigration bill which would encourage fascism in Britain.

'Our responsibilities in fighting for socialist policies and directing the struggles of the working class to build an alternative leadership are enormous,' Ashby added.
'We call for a Labour

government to put forward socialist policies, and to keep the Tories out for ever.'

Housing (passed unanimously)

Conference demands that the Tories be made to pay by:

(1) Immediate repeal of existing Tory legislation, including the 1957 Tory Rent Act, which allows landlords to increase profits at the expense of living conditions and permits land speculators to accumulate large profits while forcing up the price of land;

(2) Immediate introduction of rent control and increased powers to local authorities for the requisition of property;

(3) The nationalization of building land, the building industry and all

T the same time as the right-wing government of Harold Wilson is crashing to ruins, the policies adopted at the Fifth Conference of the Young Socialists at Morecambe unmistakeably signposted the way for a new and lasting victory for the labour movement.

The outcome of Morecambe was not simply the result of the struggles of the Young Socialists, important as they are. What is happening amongst the youth in Britain is taking place on a wide scale throughout the world. Almost immediately after their British Young Socialist comrades terminated their conference, thousands of Spanish youth demonstrated in the streets of the main cities of Spain against the hated fascist dictator, Franco. At the time of going to press several have been shot and we have no doubt that others are now being tortured and forced to confess to false charges.

As United States imperialist aggression builds up its armed forces against the practically defenceless people of Vietnam, thousands of young people bombard the United States Embassy in Moscow. Here they were treated with the utmost brutality by the armed forces and police detachments of the Soviet bureaucracy. In the United States, the citadel of imperialism, thousands of young Negroes joined hands with the civil rights movement in their heroic struggle against the racial extremists

In Vietnam itself, it is a well known fact that the vast majority of Vietcong forces consist of young teenagers, spurred on by an unquenchable desire to throw the American imperialists out of their country, and to begin to organise its resources in the interests of the people who live there.

All over the world, young people are on the march and it is the effect of their combined struggles which lies in the background of the Morecambe conference.

Those delegates who worked so hard for the conference may not be aware of the international implications of their activity but it is extremely important that they realise how significant this is. The Young Socialists must be internationalist in their outlook and always see their struggles as part of the international struggle of youth against the common oppressors.

In the Soviet Union, it is true that the struggle of the Soviet youth is different from that of the youth in the imperialist countries. They have to carry out the political revolutionary overthrow of the corrupt and crumbling bureaucracy. After this they will be able to continue to develop real socialist planning based upon the economic conquests of the October Revolution. In the countries of the capitalist world, young people will strive to overthrow the forces of capitalism by means of the socialist revolution.

It is only natural in these circumstances that the enemies of youth should gang up in order to pour out their slander and misrepresentation of what young people are doing. These are the forces of a dying social order.

We believe that the time is not far short when it will be possible to have not only a conference of Young Socialists at Morecambe but an international conference representative of all that is best in the youth movements which are now preparing in one form or another for the triumph of the world socialist revolution.

Racialism and immigration

DAVE GREENBERG of North Kensington Young Socialists was the mover of the resolution on racialism which was seconded formally from the floor of the conference.

Greenberg related how in his area Roy Smith, a member of the Young Socialists, was nearly murdered after a demonstration and dance held by the YS.

The area was notorious for race riots and the murder of Kelso Cochrane. Mosley stood for election in 1959 and got 3,000

strengthening of the Immigration Act is a most disgusting action by the Labour government,' said Greenberg.

MAUREEN HEALY, later elected as national committee member for the East Midlands said: 'The strengthening of the Immigration Act is a deliberate attempt to divide workers. We must fight to unite the whole working class, white and coloured workers.'

This conference deplores the action of the Labour government in carrying even further the racialist provisions of the Tory Immigration Act. The defeats of the Labour candidates at Smethwick and Eton & Slough, and the result of the Leyton by-election, show that Labour's immigration policy assists the Tories by splitting and confusing the working class.

The Young Socialists must campaign against racialism by recruiting all young workers, regardless of national origin, into the YS on the basis

of common class interests.

Conference therefore supports the call of the London Young Socialists for a demonstration through North Kensington against racialism on March 13.

Conference also endorses the call of the London Young Socialists to hold a collection throughout the labour movement to give Roy Smith a holiday when he has recovered.

Nationalization & wage freeze

Socialist youth are determined to fight for socialist policies, said PADDY O'REGAN of Paddington South, moving the resolution on nationalization and wage re-straint, which was seconded by Oxford Cowley YS.

'George Brown signed his in-famous Declaration of Intent which means wage freezing.

'The package deal is really Labour Party policy on wages.

'It really strikes at workers' wages and conditions. It ties the hands of workers in the engineering industry and prepares for the introduction of automation. which will bring with it unemployment.

'The only answer is a campaign for the nationalization of these industries. It is up to the YS to lead this campaign.

We insist that unless a policy of nationalization of all the major industries under workers' control is carried out, then attacks on workers' organisations and trade union rights will continue. In many industries the working class will face the constant threat of unemploy ment, redundancy and short-time working; in others the employers will demand shift working and compulsory overtime.

We condemn the leadership of the Labour Party for consistently refusing during the period of Tory rule to organise any campaigns which put forward the socialist policy of nationalization as the only solution to the problems facing workers in capitalist society.

To encourage all members of the Young Socialists Movement to be active in their trade unions and Labour Party Wards and Constituencies. To demand and fight for the reinstatement of all Young Socialists expelled from the Labour Party, and the reopening of all branches and federations closed down by the Labour Party leadership.

Membership of the Young Socialists is open to all young people who agree with its policy and programme.

Each branch shall elect annually a committee consisting of a Chairman, Secretary, Membership Secretary and Treasurer and no more than six other members.

The Branch Committee must arrange for regular education classes to be held at which some important aspects of the history of socialism can be discussed more deeply than will be possible in the fortnightly business meeting.

Federations shall consist of ten or less branches in any area. Each branch shall elect six delegates to attend full meetings of the Federation. Full meetings shall be held at least quarterly.

A national conference of the membership represented by delegates from local branches shall be convened at least once a year. The National Conference shall lay down policy and be the highest body of the Young Socialists. It shall elect a National Committee charged to carry out this

policy.

One Young Socialist shall be elected on the National Committee for each region.

Every member of the Young Socialists shall pay a weekly contribution of 3d. to the national funds.

The newspaper Keep Left shall be the official organ of the Young Socialists. The editor of Keep Left elected at the paper's Annual Conference be an associate member of the National Committee of Young Socialists.

Police violence

T. MACINTYRE of Cranhill, Glasgow, moved the resolution on police violence.

'The fight against the police is the fight against the policies of the Labour government who pay and control the actions of the police force. This is a fight against the monopolies

who control the Labour govern-ment,' he said.



CONSTITUTION OF THE

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Young Socialists in Britain made their position on Vietnam quite clear on the weekend before the Moscow demonstration at their conference in Morecambe (as reported elsewhere in Keep Left).

The full horror of this 14year war against U.S. imperialism is brought home by the harrowing experience of 13year-old Ho Van Bot, a South Vietnamese schoolboy and survivor of a napalm bombing on a South Vietnam village (reported in the February issue of 'Vietnam Bulletin').

On July 8 last year U.S. planes rained napalm bombs on the village of Linh-Phung, scoring a direct hit on the school where Ho Van Bot was sitting with his schoolfriends, some of them active resistance fighters against the troops of the puppet South Vietnam regime and their American 'advisers'.

Ho Van Bot told his story to

a conference in Hanoi.

'It was 3 o'clock and we were doing arithmetic when a reconnaissance plane flew over. Shortly afterwards artillery from Giong Trom started shelling our villagepeople said they had counted about 200 shots. Following our usual practice we ran to the deep trench shelters built around the school. But almost immediately three planes came over and poured down napalm bombs, about 50 in all.

'The bombs fell on many places, two of them hit our school. Napalm jelly splashed all around and stuck whereever it fell, burning everything. It even fell in to the shelters where we were hiding.

'Many of my friends were frightened and leapt out of the shelters, and some fell dead on the spot. Then I too ran out of the shelter with fire burning all over my face, my arms and legs and

'Looking around me I saw pieces of skin falling off my friends like rags. When I looked at myself, I was alight. The flames looked blue, the heat was terrible and seemed to come from my bones and my flesh, it was impossible to get rid of

'Wherever I put my hand, fire caught my flesh. Soon my whole body was like a torch, and like this I started to run for home.

'While we were running for our homes, the enemy planes came back and strafed us. I was lucky enough not to be hit, but many of my friends were and some were killed on the spot. We had to run at top speed to escape the bullets. . .

"... Nearly all the 160 pupils at my school were burnt and wounded by the napalm bombs. Of those seriously burnt like me, only 62 sur-

'Thirty-two were killed on the spot in the school yard, on their way home or at the My-long ferry. Others died in hospital, and my teacher too was killed.

'The people of the village took all of us victims of the napalm bombing to a motor launch to take us to hospital in the Ben Tre provincial capital.

'We reached the My-Long ferry at seven the next morning, and there the U.S .-Khanh troops tried to stop

'But the people who were taking us and people from all



around put up such a struggle, that in the end, about mid-day, they let the boat go on. Unfortunately, by the time the boat reached the city, some of my friends had died from their injuries.

'I had not felt the pain while I was alight, but by the time got to the hospital, although the flame had been put out, the pain was terrible, and I felt very hot; liquid oozed from my wounds for 25 days.

'While I was in the hospital, I saw the last moments of several of my friends. While Vo Thi Thiet, a 13-year-old girl, was dying she was saying to her mother: "Open my eyes so that I can see you, mummy. I can't see anything. Open my eyes, I still can't see anything.'

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'I have had the great honour of being brought to this conference, and I have told you how the Linh Phung school was bombed with napalm. I repeat to all my "uncles" and "aunts" of North Vietnam and to all the delegates here the words of my friend Trieu van Hieu, "You must avenge me".'

LET'S face it, are the goods motor cycle manufacturers are offering these days as good as the glossy catalogues would lead us to believe?

They may look superb, brightly shining in the show-rooms, and performance figures given by magazine road tests do not leave much to be desired, but before you walk through the showroom door and hand over your hard-earned cash, just stop and think: how long is your shiny new model going to last?

Do not be blinded by super performance figures, the initial thrill of speed and acceleration soon wears off.

Have a look at the finish of could be? I don't think so in many cases.

Last May I bought a new sports machine. It was great £300 for a 500 or 650 c.c. motor until I got down to examining cycle you have a right to expect it in detail.

And what about lasting quality? Four years ago I bought a 1938 motor cycle and the chrome was still bright and serviceable.

Bright - looking, cadmium-plated nuts and bolts are another thing. Put a spanner on them two or three timesthe next time you look they are going rusty.

What of the spares services? Why is it that spares for some machines are relatively easy to obtain, yet getting your hands on spares for other machines is like getting your hands on gold, and cost twice as much.
