CITRINE AIDS GRE REACTIONARIES

PARTY, FOURTH INTERNATIONAL.

PREPARATIONS FOR A SAVAGE WHITE TERROR ARE AFOOT IN GREECE. RELYING ON THE FALSE PROMISES OF EDEN, CHURCHILL AND PLASTIRAS, THAT THERE WOULD BE NO REPRISALS AND A GENERAL AMNESTY, THE E.L.A.S. LEADERSHIP HANDED BACK THE HOSTAGES.

That was the signal for an atrocity campaign, leading to an open and naked regime of terror against the workers. Already, terror trials are being staged against the workers. Five of E.A.M. supporters have been sentenced. Unable to find evidence of murder against them, the charges were switched to that of bearing arms against the State. On this charge every one of the hundreds of thousands of workers and peasants supporting E.L.A.S. can be convicted. The notorious pro-Monarchist, Leeper, British Ambassador in Greece, makes no bones about it. He asserts in the latest White Paper issued by the Foreign Office:

"There will, however, be acts of harshness and probably cases of injustice towards the other side. Human nature here, which is southern and excitable, will enact some revenge for what it has

Couched in smooth diplomatic terms of humbug and hypocrisy, the portent of these words is clear: THERE WILL BE SAVAGE WHITE TERROR AGAINST THE GREEK WORKERS. In advance Leeper wants to excuse it. "Don't judge it too harshly".

But Leeper alone, could not convince the British working class. A representative of the British Labour movement must add his weight to this atrocity campaign which will result in the massacre of thousands of Greek workers and peasants. So, Sir Walter Citrine is sent by the Tories to the scene. He told the correspondents:

"I am filled with horror at what I have seen. The evidence is irrefutable. I have never seen a more terrible sight than those corpses of persons with their hands tied behind their backs."

When Trotsky Led the Red Army

In Eastern Germany millions of workers and peasants are fleeing in terror at the approach of the Red Army. This is because Stalin threatens the German masses with vengeance and retribution, while the Russian press chauvinistically raves at everything German.

This is entirely the reverse of the internationalism and socialism of Lenin and Trotsky.

When Trotsky was leader of the Red Army, the Soviet Union appealed to the German workers fraternal solidarity with the Russian workers in the cause of socialism. This led, in Ludendorff's words: "to the rank and file of the German army becoming infected with Bolshevism." Thus the German revolution of 1918 was pre-

Originally there were 200 of them, all of whom seemed willing to attend the military government school, but after they had been examined repeatedly, only 89 were left. They are all former members of the Nazi Party, because they were forced to be to keep their jobs under Hitler.

Now, asked whom they would choose for a leader, they answered with unanimity, "Dr. Bruning is our man."

NAZIS KEPT IN SOCIALISTS KEPT OUT

In Frace and other occupied countries the "democratic" capitalists very quickly came to terms with the Nazis. Now, in Italy and Germany we see the same thing. The ruling class of Germany and Italy who introduced Fascism, look to the protection of Allied bayonets against their own working class.

The British ruling class - in order to poison the minds of the British workers, has made great play of the idea that the whole of the German people are fascists and responsible for Hitler. They have pointed to the V weapons as the indication of the savagery of the German people. Yet, the manufacturer of the V weapons is honoured and protected, and his tool placed in control

The police thugs who have been trained by the Nazis to beat, torture and terrorise the German workers are to be retained by the Allies for the purpose of insuring "law and order".

In Italy it has been brought to the stage of a public scandal. The Allies attempted to retain the structure of the old regime intact. But it was impossible to do so because of the resistance of the Italian masses. Nevertheless, in spite of this, wherever possible the Allies have retained the same fascist bureaucracy and police, and have protected those who introduced Fascism—the capitalists and landlords.

ON THE NEATH FRONT The Campaign Has Begun!

THE WORKERS IN THE HEART OF THE ANTHRACITE COAL MINING VALLEYS ARE HEARING FOR THE FIRST TIME, IN MANY CASES, THE VOICE OF REVOLUTIONARY COMMUNISM — TROTSKYISM.

In spite of difficulties of distance — this constituency stretches up four valleys for a distance of 12-14 miles winter snow and rain, our sellers have been on the job pushing the "Socialist Appeal".

We have received a magnificant response and there is a growing demand for our pamphlets. The "A.B.C. of Trotskyism" — the testimony of Comrade Cannon in the American labour trial-is very much in demand. 150 copies have been sold and the workers have expressed the opinion that this is what they have been waiting for: an easy exposition of the whole socialist case.

At the Seven Sisters Pit workers have said to our sellers: "Where have you been all this time. We have been waiting to hear what you have to say." Everywhere we have gone there has been a friendly response and several workers have voluntarily come up to us to say: "You will get more votes than you think." There is a general feeling of disgust and disillusionment with the Labour leadership and the desire for a new fighting flead.

Three weeks ago, the so-called "Communist" Party had a letter in the local press slandering our Party and stating that we were anti-working class. Taking up the cudgels we have challenged the Stalinist "Communist" Party through the press, to a public debate to back up their slanderous assertions against us.

At a meeting in Resolven, Idris Cox. South Wales Organiser of the "Communist" Party demagogically attacked the Tory mismanagement of Cardiff and elsewhere. Our comrades pointed out that the Communist Party was largely to blame since they had called on the workers to support the Tory candidate for Cardiff, Major Grigg. From the floor of the hall our supporters challenged the "Communist" Party to a debate with us. Idris Cox refused. We have no doubt that they will not face us on a public platform before the workers.

On the resumption of the adjourned hearing of the case against 127 Naval Yard, Walker, Boilermakers it was decided to treat the platers, riveters, welders and caulkers separately as test cases for their respective trades.

The first 3 names called were caulkers. All three workers were too deaf to give fluent evidence, much to the amusement of the bench, the prosecuting solicitors and a section of the press. At first glance it would appear that in failing to invite the miners' leaders to participate on the Central Board, the coal owners have overlooked an excellent and time honoured method of deceiving the workers. But there is method in their madness. They know only too well that the miners' leaders, reflecting the tremendous pressure of the disgusted rank and file, are pledged to the policy of nationalisation. The Foot plan decisively rejects this policy. The choice now placed before Lawther and his colleagues is therefore, for them, a most unhappy one. Either they must lead the miners in a determined struggle against the coalowners and their plans, or - they must abandon the pretence of nationalisation, reveal their true colours to the miners, and plead for a couple of seats on the Central Board!

So far, except for the frank statement of Edwards quoted above, the miners' leaders have issued no official statement. When they do, we are quite certain that, whilst paying lip

Dear Comrade.

Just a few lines to thank you for your kindness in despatching to me the "Socialist Appeals". They certainly raise our hopes to a sharp reality here, and it certainly arouses plenty of discussion. With the aid of the pamphlets you sent me I am digesting every detail and so use your literature as a stolid background for argument and mutual debate.

Well, comrade, the felling here is pretty high. Quite a number of the men in the district who are stationed here are very often marched and trans-ported to the Arsenal to participate in the work, such as dock labouring, scaling, and painting, etc.

Just recently 8 men were ordered into a barge and were compelled to scrape the sides of a huge tank and remove the old rust. The officer commanding the detail, gave orders that the men were only to descend into the compartment for 15 minutes as the petrol fumes which had accumulated in the air were highly dangerous. The reason he mentioned this was chiefly because men working previously had complained of stomach trouble owing to the cramped up position one had to adopt. In fact, three of my mates only spent 10 minutes in this foul atmosphere. It was impossible to work under such conditions.

Why the German People Flee from the Red Army

The victories of the Red Army are shaking world relations. The mightiest army ever built in Europe is faced with collapse and disintegration under the hammer blows of the Red Army. Such a reversal of fortunes from calamitous defeats to overwhelming victories, has seldom occurred in history. EAM representatives in the Cabinet even accepted the proposal for disarmament of their forces while the Fascist Royalist Mountain Brigade and the Security Battalions were to remain unarmed. It was only the indignation and pressure of the masses who refused to place themselves at the mercy of their bitter enemies, which compelled them to withdraw from the agreement.

It was the class instinct of the workers who had learned in the bitter days of struggle against the Nazis, the lesson taught by Marx and Lenin that arms represent power, which made them resolve not to surrender their arms. Stalin offers only dismemberment, mass deportations, national

humiliation and subjugation.

If the Red Army was operating the policy of Lenin and Trotsky the entry of the Red Army into Germany would be the signal for socialist revolution throughout Europe. If Stalin carried the message of a Socialist Soviet Germany united to a Soviet Russia the German masses would have overthrown Hitler and set up a Soviet Germany. They would have welcomed the Red Army as an army of liberation from fascism and capitalism.

What the position might have been was seen by many incidents which have taken place during the war. The German soldiers had to be threatened with punishment and death in a special order by the German General Staff for feeding Ukranian women and children from the field kitchens. In Bulgaria when the Red Army marched into Sofia, under the impulse of the revolutionary ferment among the Bulgarian workers, German soldiers fraternised with Bulgarian and Russian troops giving the Red front salute.

Far from welcoming these manifestations of internationalism, Stalin hushed them up and prevented them from coming to the ear

of the Russian workers and soldiers.

When faced with far greater difficulties and dangers, with far less resources Lenin remained through and through internationalist. He relied always on the support of the German workers and soldiers. The class criterion was the decisive one in analysing the policy of countries and of peoples. For him there were always two classes, two nations — the exploited and the exploiters.

In 1921 when Trotsky was War Commisar and the Belshevik Party was an internationalist party under the leadership of Lenin,

Tuchachevsky wrote:

"THE SOCIALIST REVOLUTION HAS REVOLUTIONISED STRATEGY. OUR RED ARMY WILL NEVER FIGHT AN ADVERSARY CONFINED TO REVOLUTIONARY OUTBREAKS IN THE REAR OF THE ENEMIES ARMIES SINCE ONE OF ITS ESSENTIAL POINTS IS DRAWN FROM THE LOCAL POPULATION; THEY WILL ALSO COME FROM THE MANPOWER OF THE CAPITALIST ARMIES. The fact stands out that within a few days of the revolution-for that was what the instinctive movement of the Greek masses meant—the workers and peasants armed and organised in ELAS-EAM were in control of the whole of Greece including the major part of Athens. In Salonika and other cities the workers had established control over housing, factories, rationing, Lenin never tired of emphasising that power, that the State, can be reduced to "armed bodies of men." That what determines which class has the Power is which class controls the armed bodies of men. The next task of the mine-owners Central Board would be to solve the coal crisis. Before analysing the method by which they propose to tackle it, let us briefly indicate the exact nature of that crisis.

WHY A COAL CRISIS?

Britian's coal industry, notoriously backward and inefficient, is now incapable of sustaining the present volume of industrial production.

The total production of coal in 1943 was 193.7 million tons-the total consumption in the same year was 198.3 million tons: a deficit of nearly five against these attempts to terrorise million tons. In sharp contrast to the rest of industry where, under the artificial stimulus of war, the productivity of labour has greatly increased, will fight to preserve what rights are the output per manshift in the mines has declined from 1.13 tons in 1939 to 1.00 tons in 1944, and is now on a lower level than in 1914!

This backward and inefficient character of British coal capitalism s graphically revealed by a comparison with coal production in the United States. There, with 100,000 ess miners, American mines produced 300 million more tons of coal!

This is due, not to the "laziness' of the British miner-only idiots and coal-owners could suggest that-but entirely to the greater mechanisation and more modern mining technique employed in America.

Today, on top of this inherent backwardness-a legacy derived from the whole haphazard development of the industry-the war has placed additional burdens and the whole archaic structure threatens to collapse. restore health to the diseased body of British mining, a thorough modernisation of the industry is required. The war has seen the disappearance of a large proportion of Britain's pre-war markets and the post-war prospects offer little hope of their being easilyif ever-recovered. Why then, under these circumstances, should the coal capitalists be expected to invest money in costly modern equipment merely in order to increase the output of a commodity for which there is no market? This would be too much to expect of any ordinary capitalist, but to expect it from the tight monopoly which Foot aims to create, is to expect a miracle.

Under this system—in the old days it was called by its right name, "rationalisation"— hundreds of pits will be closed down, the number of miners in others will be drastically reduced, the net result being thousands of "surplus miners" thrown onto the streets. This combination of monopoly, mechanisation, and unemployment will then be used by the coal-owners as a weapon with which to ruthlessly beat down the wages and standard of life of the miners.

To sum up, the Foot Plan is no solution to the crisis.
