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# War Tension Increases Over **Berlin Conflict**



> But the American military is tar more concerned with its own prestige than with the plight of the Berlin masses. Col. Frank L. Howley, U.S. Commandant, had the gall to give the German people a lesson in democracy. He said: "We ask that you cheerfully stand up to these privations and that you bear in mind that freedom and democracy have always been purchased only by struggle and suffering."

Declarations like these sound like a mockery to German ears. The American military command is ruling by the club and bayonet, like the armed conquerors of ancient days. It is reappointing ex-Nazis to the various government posts and trying to rehabilitate the hated capitalism which brought on the ruination of the country in the first place.

That the Berlin situation is taking an ominous turn is made clear by the fact that negotiations have been taken away from the military administrators and placed directly into the hands of the governments. The notes of the American, British and French State Departments protesting the blockade by the Soviet Union all speak of "the extremely serious international situation." > The Congress organizers, who preferred giving him the floor rather than risking new incidents tried to drown the debate by giving the floor to 4 speakers from their side, then closing debate and taking a snap vote. The vote was vaguely announced as 30 for, 20 against, with more than 50 delegates not voting because of the speed of the whole procedure. This aroused a violent protest from the French colonial delegates, who by this time, had constituted themselves as a bloc. The hall was in an uproar. One delegate castigated the Bureau: "You say that you are for our liberation, but here you refuse us the floor."

> The Congress leaders, Pivert and Brockway, proceeded to denounce the "Trotskyists sabotaging the Congress." These centrist maneuverers thought it possible to utilize the colonial revolts. Now faced with this setback, they saw their only safety in a bureaucratic attitude.

> But, the resentment was se great, that the Congress was in danger of breaking up. The Buread thereupon asked for a 10 minute recess. This actually lasted more than an hour. All maneuby French imperialism and by British imperialism."

## MANUEVERING FAILS

Brockway, in a desperate attempt to save face, proposed to the essence of the demands of the colonial delegates. The reporter Frenay submitted his resignation. The entire Social Democratic operation had been aborted. The policy of the "Third Force" had been eliminated. The text, while far from our conceptions, was unacceptable to the Social Democrats. The secretary of the Socialist Party of France, Guy Mollet, who was scheduled to come to the Congress, took care to absent himself. The socialist leaders, Brockway and Pivert, having burned their fingers, did not take the floor at any time to defend the policy of the text presented by them. The Congress has produced some memorable results. It has put in contact delegates from the colonial peoples who until now knew little or nothing about each other. The exchange of views, the contacts created will have, in time, very important results for the coordination of the colonial struggles

against imperialism. Another aspect of the Congress that deserves mention is the conduct of the French so-called socialists. Rousset of the RDR spoke in favor of a "democratic and revolutionary French Union" which would assure to the Viet Nam a strengthening of "our" positions - those of capitalist as the deputy Senghor, spoke against independence of the colonial peoples. # Farewell to Inger Swabeck

I will first relate Inger's biography. She was born in Horsens, Denmark, May 30, 1895. Her maiden name was Inger Lindhardtsen. She came to the United States, to stay here in Chicago, in the spring of

They had to break up their home, dispose of their furniture and come to New York to work under conditions of unbelievable hardship and poverty, to try to hold the fragile nucleus of the party together.

## More Beautiful Than Ever

I last saw Inger two years ago, after a long separation. She and Arne had been released from more beautiful than ever. With grey hair framing her fair young face, she seemed to be blooming with a second youth. Her life work was crowned with victory. Her husband, who had worn himself sick under the long stress of his tasks in New York, had been restored to health under her

tender care. Her son had grown to manhood and had taken his own place in the army of labor and

the army of the socialist revolution. I will never forget the pride that glowed in her face when she told me: "Edgar is on his own now. He is grown up. He is making his own living, has joined the union, and joined the party

all by himself." It was just then, when everything seemed best, that the worst troubles of dear Inger's life assailed her. Physical illness took a cruel toll of her body; and on top of that, the dark sickness of the mind, which no medicine could cure, came over her. She fought a long time against that, but it was a losing fight. All her courage, and all her husband's tender care, and her son's solicitude - not all that was sufficient to contend with that dread enemy.

And when Inger finally yielded to it, she remained true to herself and to her real nature. which was dominated above all by her concern for others, by her love for others.

I think we can most truly describe her as we all thought of her, as we remember her, if we recall the words of the great apostle, Paul: "Though I speak with the tongues of men and of angels, and have not love, I am become as sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal."

#### Gift of Love

We remember her, we, and all who knew her, all those whose paths of life touched hers - we remember her as one who "had love." Hers was the precious gift of love. Her whole life was spent in the service of others. Even in her last act she gave testimony to her love. She feared that the sickness of her mind would grow worse, not better. She feared a greater evil, a greater calamity. for her family; and she wanted to choose for them the lesser evil. That is the real meaning of her last act of renunciation and sacrifice.

If we remember her that way we will remember her truly as she really was. And we will speak the truth if we say that her last action in taking her own life was no sin, but on the contrary, a final demonstration of the basic principle of her life, of her love and concern for others.

It is not for us to enquire into the wisdom of her act, or to judge, or to criticize. It is only for us to try to understand. It is for us only, as we stand here with the grief-stricken family of this blameless woman, the blameless husband, and the blameless son and the grieving sister it is only for us to say to them that we, their friends and comrades, do understand. We stand here with our arms around them in sympathy and solidarity. And we entreat them: Dear friends. do not refuse to be comforted. Be rather comforted and consoled by the memory of all that Inger gave to you to all of us. We are all better for that, and our lives are brighter.

But even here, as we say farewell to Inger, we must not forget our duty. We must not forget that we are soldiers in the war for the liberation of humanity. We must remember, too, that Inger in her own way, in her own fashion, was also a soldier of the revolution. For that her grave, as the poet Heine said, should be marked not with a cross but with a sword. We must all try to do a little more now to make up for her loss and to


## Reformist "Solutions"

If humanity is still beset by the havoc and terror unleashed by the explosion of the productive forces, if mankind has not yet solved its tasks, the fault does not lie with the workers. They have launched attack after attack on the old system of production. They have long furnished the most eloquent proofs of devotion, sacrifice, abnegation and initiative. The responsibility does rest on the treacherous leadership of the working class, and solely on them.

To blame was—and is—the Social Democracy. It was the Social Democrats who in 1914 deserted to the service of the bourgeoisie; and in 1918 they assured the ruin of the German revolution; and ever since, they have proved themselves to be, in the words of Leon Blum, the "loyal managers" of capitalism. Equally to blame is Stalinism. # Labor's Path in 1948

The top CIO leaders have just issued a virtual declaration of political bankruptcy. Following a closed caucus of 75 leaders of the ClO's Political Action Committee in Philadelphia on July 11, its national chairman, Jack Kroll, sadly opined that the CIO members may "just sit on their hands and wait" this November and "this may well result in a Republican victory.'

This pathetic confession comes from the crew of self-admitted "labor statesmen" who have been issuing thunderous decrees against all and sundry who wanted to build a new political party of labor. These men sternly advised that a new party would "split the progressive vote" and thus make possible a Republican victory. Now, lo and behold, one of the chief architects of CIO policy confesses that the official CIO course "may well result in a Republican victory.'

This out-and-out bankruptcy of the official trade union leadership is not confined to Kroll. Philip Murray and the national CIO office. It runs all the way from the senile mossbacks of the AFL Executive Council right down to such phony progressives as Walter Reuther and his friends.

Reuther, you may recall, declared just a short time ago that he was for a new party — after the 1948 elections! The sincerity of even this declaration can be judged by his activities since that time. His Michigan henchman, August Scholle, president of the Michigan State CIO, has been plunking day and night for the Democratic party. The recent Grand Rapids convention of the Michigan CIO backed, under Reuther's inspiration, the Democratic machine. And just a few days ago, Reuther himself issued a resounding statement in favor of Justice Douglas — four days before Douglas himself said 'No, thank you," to the Democratic Party.

These political pygmies with their sideshow antics don't rate a cent's worth of confidence from the workers. They have led the labor movement into a blind alley and now they all but admit it. If labor's ranks wait for the present crew of misleaders to lead them out of the political wilderness, their grandchildren will still have to listen to the same old phonograph record: "Now is not the time," and "Don't split the progressive vote.'

New problems demand new men! And labor's present impasse on the political front can only be resolved by the ranks putting up for leadership class-conscious militants who will break with the stultifying, self-defeating capitalist politics of the present labor bureaucrats and strike out on the path of a new political party of labor.

Meanwhile, in the absence of a labor slate in 1948, the best thing union militants can do is to pile up a big vote for the SWP candidates, Farrell Dobbs and Grace Carlson, and thus help forge the independent force of labor.

# Catholic Censorship

The Militant has been carrying a series of articles describing the reactionary political activities of the Roman Catholic hierarchy and the totalitarian political, social and economic program it is trying to fasten on the world.

The most recent flagrant example of the growing encroachment upon democratic rights and institutions in America by the Catholic hierarchy is the removal of the country's oldest political journal, the Nation, from the public school libraries of New York City and Newark, N. J.

This suppression is based upon a series of articles by Paul Blanshard on the Catholic hierarchy's attempts to undermine political liberties, public education, scientific advancement and progressive social laws.

The pretext for this outrageous violation of free speech and free press is the claim that Blanshard attacked the Catholic "religion." But since when is a person in this country forbidden to attack or support any particular religious or non-religious beliefs he sees fit? As a matter of truth, Blanshard did not attack the theological tenets of the Catholic Church. He had a perfect right to do so if he wanted to, but he didn't. He described and truthfully—the Church's political, social and economic activities.

Freedom of religion means that no man shall be denied any rights under the law or suffer any discrimination or victimization because of his religious or non-religious beliefs. It does not make those beliefs immune from criticism.

What makes the case of the Nation ban especially ominous is not merely that the Catholic Church has been able to deprive Protestant and other children of the right to read criticisms of the Church's reactionary activities, but that this ban has been invoked not in some little obscure village, but in the greatest metropolitan center of the country.

It is no secret that the Catholic hierarchy has a stranglehold on education in countries like Spain, Portugal, Italy and Argentina. How far those aims are being advanced in this overwhelmingly non-Catholic country, with its tradition of separation of Church and State, can be seen by this instance of the Catholic Church's power to reach into the public schools of great cities and put the blight of censorship on them.

It is time to tell the Catholic hierarchy in no uncertain terms that the American people will not tolerate the pernicious and insidious activities of the Vatican's agents against democratic rights and institutions in the United States.

If the Democratic and Republican stooges of monopoly capitalism are opposed to totalitarianism, why do they foist a Chiang Kai-shek and his corrupt military clique in China? Why do they set up Quisling dictators in South America? Why did the House of Representatives vote to include fascist Spain for him, when it served their ends. in the Marshall Plan?

#### **Truth About Stalinism and Socialism**

The monopolies, with the government's help, have long ago stamped out any semblance of free enterprise in America. Every phase of our economy is today in the iron grip of the giant or they don't produce at all.

Capitalism has kept the American people on a merry-goround of depression, war, inflation and again war. The workers are learning from their own experiences that the capitalist profit system must be scrapped. But they are disoriented by the lying propaganda of the capitalists and their labor lieutenants, that the only alternative to capitalism is Stalinist totalitarianism. this country and their monopoly control of government. But the Russian revolution only opened the road to socialism. It did not create the socialist society at one stroke. However the workers of western Europe were defeated in their attempts to take this road. Instead, the ruling capitalists of Europe and America organized counter-revolutionary military expeditions against the Russian workers.

Lenin and Trotsky summoned the peoples of the oppressed and the exploited of the earth. earth to put an end to the first world war. They called on the working people to scrap monopoly capitalist rule throughout on new foundations. A world in which the age-long dreams of world. They demanded freedom for all colonial peoples.

And crime of crimes! Lenin and Trotsky were so indelicate as to publish all the secret treaties they found in the Czar's confidential files. These documents exposed the conspiracy of the imperialist powers to divide up the world, like Al Capone and Bugs Moran split up the bootleg liquor market in Chicago

For four bitter years the Russian working people were Less than three years after the second forced to defend themselves against foreign military intervention, as well as against the sabotage of their deposed native capitalists and landowners.

They emerged victorious, but cut off from the rest of the world. The Russian workers were hungry and battle-worn, yearning for respite and peace. The heaviest blow of all to them was the death of their leader, Lenin.

#### How Stalin Betrayed the Russian Workers

Stalin exploited these conditions to defame and exile Trotsky, to impose upon the Russian workers a false policy of nationalism, and to drag them into the trap of his police rule.

The American capitalists are thus directly responsible for weakening the resistance of the Russian working class and enabling the Stalinist dictatorship to stamp out workers' democracy in the Soviet Union.

It wasn't until Stalin had consolidated his totalitarian rule that the American State Department granted diplomatic recognimurderous police state upon the Greek people? Why do they aid tion to the Soviet Union. American capitalism hated the truly democratic government of Lenin and Trotsky. Today President Truman is seeking the Negro vote. So he has made a resounding declaration in favor of rights for Negroes. But at the same time his Secretary of Defense, James Forrestal, declares that segregation in the armed forces will continue. Washington itself, the very capital of the United States, is a Jim Crow city. In Washington some of the most vicious anti Negro practices of the deep South are shamelessly maintained, in full view of the President, the Congress and the Supremo

Nobody is fooled by President Truman's program for civi ights, least of all the Negro people. All through American his-Once these parasites are off our backs, war will be only a tory they have fought for their rights. They have formed States. organizations, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, in Minnesota, I have been able to participate in this struggle for over ten years. The Socialist Workers Party welcomes with pride the spirit of resistance of the Negro Deep South. people of which the defiant attitude of A.
