National Candidates of SWP Brand Move "Unprincipled"

Our repeated prediction that Henry Wallace and his new party would buckle and retreat under fire is being fulfilled even more quickly than we had expected. Wallace and his lieutenants are backing scores of candis dates of the corrupt Democratic Party that "Boomerang Hank" has been denouncing from coast to coast.

On Sept. 30-four weeks before the election-C. B. Baldwin, Wallace's campaign manager, demonstratively announced that the so-called Progressive Party is withdrawing candidates or withholding opposition in more than twenty key Congressional and Senatorial contests to aid "liberal" Truman Democrats.

Just how frantically the Wallace party is trying to cling to the Democratic coat-tails is shown by the further fact, as Baldwin emphasized, that the Wallaceites are supporting not less than 41 of the 47 incumbents of Congress who scored 75% or better on the pro-Truman CIO voting chart.

Headlong Retreat of Wallace

That this withdrawal of Wallace candidates is intended to strengthen the decrepit Democratic Party at some of its weakest points was likewise made clear by Baldwin. He pointed out that Wallace party backing is now going to 25 of the 35 Democratic incumbents who were elected by less than 55% of the vote in 1946.

Baldwin asserted further that the Wallace forces would have publicly endorsed even more Democrats "if it were not for the pressure and threats of withdrawal of financial support exerted on many Democrats if they accepted our endorsement.

This whole move comes as a cynical violation of Wallace's earlier campaign assurances that he was building a genuinely independent and progressive party against the two old-line capitalist

We can imagine the feelings of hundreds of thousands of sincere Wallace supporters at this latest announcement. They have peen giving of their time, energy and money in the belief they were helping to build a truly independent party. Now they find their leaders supporting the same bi-partisan politicians who are betraying the American people.

Not a single one of these Wallace-supported "liberal" Democrats even fulfills Wallace's own repeated definition of a liberal. The first criterion, according to Wallace, is that they shall be "for peace" and oppose the Truman-Marshall war program. Every one of the Democratic "liberals" now being strengthened by Wallace backing supports the Truman Doctrine, the huge military budget and peacetime conscription.

Among these are Chester Bowles, running for Connecticut Governor, of whom Wallace only two weeks ago said, "Bowles doesn't think that peace is important" and, "I don't know how good he'd be for peace." Another, Representative Helen Gahagan Douglas, of California, spurned the Wallaceite encorsement with the statement that "I strongly support the Marshall Plan."


An Unprincipled Policy

This opportunistic and unprincipled move by the Wallaceite leaders is exactly what is to be expected from a splinter capitalist party composed of disgruntled Democratic "liberals," middle-class confusionists and Stalinist adventurers. Wallace had previously shown his colors when he said that if war came he would "naturally"

The millionaire demagogue Wallace and his party cannot fill the political vacuum created by the lack of an independent mass party of the working-class, a labor party based on the unions. The American workers need their own party, under their own control, running their own candidates and in uncompromising opposition to all the capitalist parties. The Registration Lag

Although the voting-age population has increased by several millions since 1944, the registration figures have declined badly in a number of key states. Registration in the largest city, New York, last week fell 234,585 short of 1944's figure of 3,556,377. It was even 68,678 less than in 1940. According to the city's population trend, 800,000 more eligible voters should have registered this year than eight years ago.

Republican leaders claim the decline is due to "apathy" in "normally Democratic" districts. The Democrats reply by noting the drop in "normally Republican" areas. All join in a chorus of abuse against the "indifference" of the voters. This chorus, we may be sure, will be echoed by the labor lieutenants of the capitalist parties in the CIO and AFL.

The "labor statesmen" will issue their usual slander of the rank and file as "lazy" and "stupid" because they did not flock once more to register in order to vote for candidates of the old-line parties that have deceived them and betrayed their trust for so long.

These millions of so-called "apathetic" voters are not at all indifferent to the grave issues facing this country. They are simply indifferent to the outcome of the election insofar as the only choice, as they see it, is Wall Street's Dewey or Wall Street's Truman on the muddlehead demagogue Wallace.

Blame is indeed due for the "apathy" of the workers. But this blame must fall wholely and directly on the union leaders, the Murrays, Greens, Reuthers, Lewises, Dubinskys, Potofskys, Tobins, who have blocked the building of labor's own party.

That holds not only in the field of foreign

policy. In domestic policy . . . there is no fundamental conflict of doctrine - no ideological conflict remotely comparable with that which separates parties, say in France, or even in Britain."

Truman On Civil Rights civil rights, in a speech devoted principally

Truman stumped down South to bulwark his chances there against Gov. Thurmond's Dixiecrats. For four days, Truman roamed the fair state of Texas, a Jim-Crow stronghold and scene of some of the worst lynching atrocities in recent years.

The President talked about the weather, communism, the Republicans, the power interests and whatever other topics swam across his stream of consciousness. He boasted how he had "stopped" John L. Lewis and the mine workers in the federal courts.

But he was mum as an oyster on civil rights. On Negro rights, on anti-lynching and anti-poll tax legislation he was a graven image of silence. Not even a direct and public challenge from Gov. Thurmond could incite so much as a mouse-squeek from Truman on the one issue that transcends all others in the South and that has convulsed and riven the Democratic Party.

It was easy for Truman in Philadelphia to boast he would not "compromise" on his promised civil rights campaign. But it's another story down South. That's where the real test came of whether Truman is campaigning for votes or for principles.

Farther north, in Oklahoma City, Truman did hint-merely hint-at the question of

Case of Ilse Koch

An outraged Senatorial committee is going to probe and investigate the justice dispensed by the U. S. Military Government in Germany. And why are Wall Street's Congressmen indignant and angered? It seems that the Brass entrusted with commuting sentences of imprisoned Nazis, commuted one too many at a time Congressmen do not appreciate: namely, the time voters go

The cause of it all is none other than Ilse Koch, widow of a commandant at Buchenwald concentration camp, who is not the type you will generally find teaching a Sunday School class; in fact she is known for short as "The Beast."

At Nuremburg Court last summer, the American prosecution described how she had inmates beaten to death and how her devotion to Nazi culture lead her to making lampshades and wall plaques out of tattooed skin from murdered prisoners as well as covering the family album in the same material.

She was scheduled to be dropped from a beam with a rope around her neck. But an accident occurred, most mortifying to all concerned expect Frau Koch. "The Beast" by some hook or crook, obviously done to cheat justice, turns up for sentence decidedly pregnant, though how she got that way in prison under the vigilant eyes of the American generals, judges, prosecutors and guards is a mystery that is still unsolved and which maybe not even a Senatorial probing and investigating committee can unravel.

Naturally she can't be hanged in that condition. The generals, judges, prosecutors and guards have been outwitted and all they can do is admit defeat and let "The Beast" off with a lifetime sentence. So she goes into deep freeze with other Nazis who might suffer harm and annoyance from the German citizenry if turned loose too

It is while lightening the sentences of the latest batch of top-drawer Nazis in connection with Setting up the new puppet government in Western Germany that the Brass discover "The Beast" has been wronged and injured.

The Koch family album bound in tattooed human skin can no longer be viewed among the prosecution's exhibits, as it has been misplaced or pilfered. That leaves as the most damaging evidence nothing but the unanimous testimony of former Buchenwald prisoners. Since "The Beast" flatly denies this testimony and claims that the wall plaques and lampshades of human skin found in her apartment don't belong to her how can she be guilty?

The red-headed Nazi widow is really only a nymphomaniac, which means her love life is intensive, extensive and not what you'd call normal. She is sadistic too. The military governors combing through the details of her case commute her sentence at once to four years so she can be paroled next year, thus fixing up the wrong done her by the Nuremburg Court.

This gives much comfort to the Nazis one and all since it shows how well the American Military Government understands and appreciates their type and how ready it is to forgive and forget in expectation of services to be rendered. But in Washington it pains Wall Street's Congressmen no little as the news hits the headlines right on the eve of election. How are they going to explain a complex subject like this to the mothers and young American girls eligible to vote, not to mention the veterans told they were sent overseas to stamp out Hitlerism?

So they waste no time launching a probe and investigation, and their first important action is to inform the press what heights of indignation they have reached.

I am holding my breath waiting for the results of the probe since learning in the Oct. 2 Business Week that "During the past year there has been a big shift in our attitude toward the Germans. We now regard them as allies in the conflict with Russia." Seeing how this Nazi violet has become the symbol of Wall Street's policy toward Germany, it looks like she's pretty safe.
