Algic Trial Paris Utilities Hits Labor Paralyzed By New Strikes

Paris transport facilities and public services were paralyzed by a general strike beginning at dawn on Dec. 29. This was the answer to the attempts of Camille Chautemps' People's Front Government to break the new wave of sit-in strikes sweeping over France.

Faced with rising prices which have wiped out the gains made by the great strikes of June, 1936, and new decree laws virtually abolishing the 40-hour week won at that time, the French workers are rising to the struggle.

7. Finally, it would be a mistake to ignore the labor movement, and especially its most important section, both numerically and politically-the Stalinists. For months the Stalinists have been clamoring for the achievement of organic unity with the Social Democrats. Following the conclusion of the pact between the Russian trade unions and the Amsterdam Federation of the Second International, the French C.P. took it for granted that now Blum & Co. would come along into the folds of the united party of the "proletariat and the people." Imagine their surprise and consternation, when the S.P. bureaucracy abruptly broke off negotiations at the end of November, using a speech of Dimitrov's as pretext, claiming that this proves the C. P. is dominated by a foreign govern-

This is the clearest expression of the Stalinist line that the Third International should never have been formed and thus there should be organic unity with the Second International-naturally, on a reformist program.

Role of C. P. in Strike Wave

Reports on the strike wave indicate that the Stalinists are supporting it; or, at least, not opposing it. There are two important reasons for this: (1) the membership of the C.P. is basically revolutionary in France. order not to lose the support of its following, and also to counteract the exposures of Barmine, etc., the C.P. is forced to go along now—the better to strangle the movement in the end, as Blum did in 1936.

(2) There has been a veritable campaign in the bourgeois press against continuing the Franco-Soviet Pact. "It is only a scrap of paper.... Russia is a dubious ally at best, etc." Thus, Stalin can very well use the French labor movement as blackmail against the French capitalists. He will sell it out-yes, but for a price! Namely, the continuation of the French-Soviet alliance.

The entirely new feature of the situation, therefore, is that the Stalinists appear likely to play a dominant role. They will no longer be able to escape the responsibility for their treecherous policies. The rank and file of the French proletariat is face to face with its most crucial experience. Inevitably, they will be forced to the conclusion that only on the road of the Fourth International lies their salvation.

Chile

The bankruptcy of Popular Frontism and Stalinism becomes more evident with each passing day. Recently, the reactionary general Caelos Ibanez del Campo who only a few years ago was driven out of power by the Chilean masses, returned to Chile. The Nacista Party, headed by Jorge Gonzales von Maree, promptly decided to support the candidacy of Ibanez in the coming presidential elections. And then.... the popular front coalition also decided to support Ibanez.

The Communist party issued a manifesto declaring itself behind General Ibanez and urged all leftist organizations to support that candidate against the openly reactionary, former Minister of Finance, Gustave Ross.

In that same manifesto the Communist party criticizes the Socialist Party for having its own independent candidate, Colonel Grove, and foams against Trotskyite tendencies in the Socialist party....

Mexico

British oil interests in Mexico reached new heights when they cept any government decision gating the financial status of a number of other exiles.

the company reported that the enterprise could easily grant 26,000,000 pesos annually in wage increase. The workers originally demanded 16,000,000 pesos.

The "anti-imperialist" Cardenas government which recently granted large concessions to the British Royal Dutch Shell, hesitates before the handing down of a decision. Incapable of fighting against imperialism and threatened by feudal reaction, the liberal bourgeoisie headed by Cardenas cannot afford to alienate working class support. The most likely result will be a compromise decision.

The American Smelting Co., largest imperialist mining interest in Mexico, bringing its American investors \$25,000,000 annually, refuses to come to terms with the Miners Union.

The conditions of the miners are deplorable. Working more than eight hours a day, under terrible hygienic conditions, their legs knee-deep in mud, inhaling poisonous vapors, the miners barely receive a subsistence wage.

Holland! What are the "great stakes for peace" which they hold in the Far East? These stakes are the colonial territories of French Indo-China and the Dutch colonies in Indonesia, where horrible oppression and exploitation of the native peoples prevails and where agitation against the imperialist overlords is punished with ruthless savagery. The French imperialists have, too, an uneviable record of oppression and plunder in Morocco, in Equatorial Africa and in Syria, where the bombing plane is no stranger. It was only a few short years ago that France fought a predatory war in Morocco, a war accompanied by all the frightfulness with which Japanese imperialism is now scourging

And our own very "peaceful" American imperialists? Can we forget the rape of the Philippines, of Haiti, Nicaragua and other Caribbean and Latin American countries, including Mexico? What, too, of the predatory activities of the Firestone Rubber Company in the little African "colony" of Liberia?

There is no need to go so far afield in order to expose the blatant hypocrisy of those "democratic" imperialist powers which now come forward to champion "peace" against the Japanese imperialist plunderers. Has not be the entire history of China during the past century been a story of the despoliation of a great country by these very powers, of the oppression and terrorization of the Chinese peoples?

Can we forget the Opium Wars in the first half of the nineteenth century, the suppression of the Taipings by the "ever-victorious army" of the American General Ward, the shameful international military expedition which ravaged Peking at the beginning of the present century? Coming down to more modern times, we might recall the Nanking Road massacre in Shanghai on May 30, 1925, when British imperialist police mowed down demonstrating students and workers, followed by a similar massacre at Shameen in Canton.

Should we forget the British naval bombardment of Wanhsien, Yangtze River port, in 1926? Or the bombardment of Nanking by British, American, Italian and Japanese warships in the following year?

Pacifists of every stripe help in the deception by creating the illusion that war can be avoided under capitalism. They sponsor such enterprises as the Ludlow amendment, which, by making a war declaration a popular decision through a referendum, seeks to insure American participation only in "just" wars.

The Stalinists brazenly line up behind the imperialist government at Washington and call upon Roosevelt "to move boldly forward, as the American people desire it, to join hands with the peaceful nations of the world...." for war against

We, too, wish to castigate the Japanese imperialists, to help drive them out of China, thus aiding the Chinese masses in the struggle for the independence of their country and for their social emancipation. PARIS, France.—The clandestine arming of the French fascist parties has never been a secret for anyone. The participation of the heads of the army in this enterprise has also been quite obvious. As to the complicity of the "People's Front" government in this conspiracy

against the working masses, that? has been just as patent, if not quite as avowed. Patent, because the arms depots have been exposed many times for more than a year (particularly by the Socialist Populaire and the Communist L'Humanite) without any government action; because the National (the federal police) has been kept well-informed in the matter, thanks to ify such a statement. Pure calumits stoolpigeons, spies and provocateurs-without any intervention on the part of the ministry; because fascist propaganda and organization have been developing in the army with the support of Daladier, the Minister of De-

French Press on Soviet "Election"—"Fathers" of Stalinist Constitution Now "Traitors" World's Mounting Armaments.

By John G. Wright **Echoes of Stalin's Fake Elections**

Stalin's plebiscite met with polite but pointed razzing in the editorial pages of the world capitalist ("democratic") press. The fraud was so brazen and crude that the bourgeois editors stood only to gain by understatement. It goes without saying that they did not let the opportunity slip to cover Marxism in general and Bolshevism in particular with the muck that Stalin pumps out of

The noteworthy thing is that the French partners of Stalin in the People's Front treachery have finally unbuttoned their lips. Even Le Populaire broke on this occasion its non-aggression policy toward Stalin, dropping its pretext of "diplomatic consideration" to criticize the electoral frame-up. The French social patriots had covered Stalin's judicial frame-ups with silence. Now that it is no longer expedient (or possible) to keep mum, Populaire virtuously declares that Stalinism has "succeeded quite convincingly in demonstrating to the populace the grave personal risk every citizen incurs by adhering to the opposition.'

They dare even to make reference (somewhat belatedly) to the frame-ups. Says Populaire: "The January trial of the so-called 'parallel center' (i.e., Radek-Piatakov trial-J.G.W.); the June execution of Tukhachevsky and seven other generals, the purge in the party, the trade unions, the Komsomol, the Comintern, the administration, the journalistic and literary circles; the havoc wrought in the so-called 'federated' republics-all this nips in the bud the very possibility of an opposition's crystallizing."

Concludes the Populaire: "...the system of Soviet (read, Stalinist) elections has nothing in common with democracy despite the fact that the Soviet government has had the gall to declare its electoral law 'the most democratic in the world.'

Now that they have broken the negotiations for unity with the C.P., the French social-patriots declare that they "cannot but view with disparagement the system of rule which is a complete denial of democratic principles.

Naturally, this cannot but widen the breach between Blum & Co. and Stalin-G.P.U.-Thorez & Co.

100 Per Cent for Stalin

The Stalinski electoral district in which Stalin himself chose to run was in the nature of things destined to set the record in getting out the vote. Nothing less than 100 per cent would do! When the zealous officials completed the count of the ballots, they were slightly embarrassed to discover that Stalin had been elected by more than 100 per cent. The official explanation is that voters in other districts seeking the "great honor" of voting for the beloved butcher flocked to the Stalinski district, where apparently the vote was so secret that ballots could be cast even by those who were not registered there.

Stalinist Constitution Work of "Spies" Etc.

In February 1935 a Constitutional Commission of 29 was appointed to draft the Stalin Constitution. Of these "Founding Fathers," five have been officially reported shot as "enemies of the people;" one (Cherviakov) committed suicide; two are presumably in prison (Radek, tried and sentenced; Bukharin, reported to have been sentenced and probably dead); one is reported a virtual prisoner (Litvinov); one is under a cloud (Petrovsky); nine are "missing"-leaving still to be accounted for, eight others (Molotov, Voroshilov, L. Kaganovich, Zhdanov, Kalinin, Mikoyan, Chibar, and Vishinsky) plus, of course, Stalin.

In other words, the notorious Stalin Constitution was drafted by a Commission composed two-thirds of Germano-Japanese-Fascist-Trotskyite-Bukharinist etc. spies, wreckers, poisoners, restorers of capitalism, etc-that is, if you believe Stalin.

Fate of Austrian Revolutionists in U. S. S. R.

Early in 1934 the heroic little army of 600 Austrian socialists, members of the Schutzbund, went to the U.S.S.R. In a feature article for December 15, the Daily Herald reports that "The men who went to Russia full of enthusiasm are now trickling back in a steady flow anxious to go home to Austria where prison awaits them." They are reported as leaving "of their own choice." Daily Herald also reports that "at least 10 Austrian Socialists are in prison" in the city of Kharkov.

'Cannon Balls, Cannon Balls, Jingle All Around!"

The League of Nations adds to the prevailing spirit of "peace and good will on earth" (hailed so graciously by the Daily Worker) by issuing its Armaments Year Book for 1937. The world military expenditure which in 1932 was estimated at 4,300,000,000 gold dollars reached in 1937 the staggering total of 7,100,000,000 gold dollars-with still greater expenditures in store. These figures are based on "official" budgets only, i. e., are far below the actual amounts invested in the impending war. The admitted amount is almost three times as much as the world military expenditure in 1913, on the eve of the first world slaughter. Europe's share is approximately two-thirds of this total. The plans of the imperialists in the sphere of war preparations may be gathered from the armament budget of "democratic" Britain which calls for:

1936-7 £188 million £278 million 1937-8

In 1913-14, Britain's war budget was £77 million. Browder and Co. strangely forgot to extend the greetings of the season to the greatest beneficiaries of Santa Claus, (and the G.P.U.).

In The California Labor World Left San Francisco Labor Council West Coast Labor Notes **Condemns Stalinist Frauds**

SAN FRANCISCO. - Indignation against the despicable attempts of the Stalinists to introduce the G.P.U. frameup methods in the American trade union movement is rising ever more loudly in the ranks of organized labor. Following on the heels of the decisive condemnation of the C.P.'s tactics by the official labor movement in Minneapolis, the San Francisco Labor Council struck another powerful blow against the Stalinist disrupters and slanderers in a resolution adopted by it on Friday, December 10, 1937. We reprint the resolution in full below:

Whereas, The brutal murder of P. J. Corcoran, secretarytreasurer of the Teamsters' Joint Council of Minneapolis was a blow at the labor movement of that city, as well as the general labor movement throughout the United States: and

Whereas, the Teamsters' Joint Council of Minneapolis has offered a \$10,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the assassin or assassins; and

Whereas, In order to protect the labor movement and its chosen officers from a terroristic murder campaign the most relentless efforts must be made to bring the assassins to deserved punishment; and

Whereas, An attempt is being made to attribute the murder of Corcoran to forces inside the labor movement, and to besmirch trade unions with the accusation that "gangsterism and racketeerinside labor's ranks is responsible for this murder, and this constitutes a foul slander on the bona-fide labor movement and its martyred officer and shields the real murderers and dark forces behind them; and

Whereas, The daily press controlled by the employers and the "Daily Worker" published by the Communist party have joined in a campaign to smear and discredit the martyred Corcoran and the trade union movement, with the charge that his assassination was caused by "racketeering and gangsterism" in the trade unions; and

Whereas, These same forces are active on the Pacific Coast in a like attempt to besmirch the bona fide labor movement, and are joining with the capitalist press in charges of "A.F. of L. and gangster plot" whenever any legitimate conflict arises within the labor movement; and

Economic Crisis and Ideologies

the present crisis should bring with manifest and encouraging about tremendous changes in the whole world and perhaps first of all in the U.S.A. The crisis of 1929 has already dealt a serious blow to the traditional ideologies of Americanism and created the

necessity for a new orientation. The economic revival of the past year has, it is true, somewhat damped theoretical searches and social criticism. Hopes arose that the process of economic growth interrupted by the crisis would again be re-established. But sooner than one could have expected the hour of a new crisis struck. It started from a lower level than the crisis of 1929 and is developing at a more rapid tempo. This demonstrates that it not an accidental recession nor even a conjunctural depression but an organic crisis of the whole capitalist system. That is why one can with assurance predict that in all fields of human ideology-in economics, politics, philosophy, literature, art—there will open an epoch of bold criticism, liquidation of old prejudices, searches for new systems, courageous creation.

Revolutionary thought in America, with immeasurably more stability and vigor than hitherto, will begin to study different social doctrines in order to resolve the question of the fate of the United States and of the capitalist system as a whole.

What to Expect from Other Publishers

"On the other hand, one can expect that the bourgeois publishing houses which from time to time printed radical works in the firm belief that the U.S. was immune to the actions of "destructive" ideas will in the coming years become more cautious; i. e., reactionary, and will completely bstracize revolutionary theoretic thought.

"It is impossible to place the slightest hope in this respect in the publishing activity of the socalled Communist Party. With time it becomes ever more hostile to theory. No wonder: every page of the revolutionary classics is an accusation against sent politics of the Comintern. Frame-up and falsification have become its basic method in all fields. It is impossible to trust any book, any article, any quotation issued by the Comintern press. Sooner of later all these works will be placed on a special Index under the general title, "The library of pseudo-Marxism and lies."

"As far as the Socialist Party is concerned one cannot in general speak about it in relation to the problems of theoretic thought. This party lives on vulgar commonplaces. Its leaders are ingrained with an organic aversion to scientific analysis. Concern over revolutionary theory appears to their eyes as an unmistakeble sign of sectarianism, if not a form of lunacy.

WORLD REVOLUTION

Memorial Day Massacre Akron Court Decision **Outlaws Closed Shop**

AKRON. Ohio, Dec. 26.-A uling which virtually outlaws the closed shop in Akron was handed down here last week by

Since the court's decision will be used as precedent, the ruling constitutes a blow not only to the working class of Akron and of Ohio, but to the working class nationally as well. Labor must unitedly fight this decision tooth and nail.

Essentials of Decision

The essential portion of the decision reads: "....a contract by the employer to employ only dollar fine and one dollar costs. union labor is contrary to public policy when it includes an entire industry so as to operate generally in the community, preventing workmen from obtaining employment without joining the

> "A contract against public policy is void and illegal.'

In other words, taxi drivers, light and power employees, cereal workers, fishing tackle workers, building tradesmen, and members of the newspaper guild and the typos are forbidden to have a closed shop, either because theiremployers have a monopoly in their field in Akron or because where the monopoly is split two ways, as it is in the newspaper shop at both plants. In both you see, a closed shop cases, would mean that it would prevent a workman "from obtaining employment without joining the mion.

The breadth of interpretation can be so great this ruling could easily be made to extend not only to the bakery workers, coal drivers, and other trades, but could be applied to the large rubber shops as well, on the basis that there are certain departments in each plant which are unique in the city, and that were a scab denied the right of employment in such a department he would be unable to obtain a job elsewhere in the industry.

Background of Decision

The decision is part of the poisoned fruit of the A. F. of L. bers of the old A. F. of L. union crisis in the next few months.

for street car operators and bus drivers, who had lost an election with the C. I. O. and who had been denied membership in the C. I. O. local of the Transport Workers of America, were fired, since the transport workers had secured a closed shop. They took their case to court and the decision was the result. The court, ironically enough, did not even recommend that they be taken back on their jobs.

The ruling beautifully exposes the role of the courts as the watchdogs of capitalism. Under the slogans of preserving the right to work, fighting monopoly, and defending the public's interests, which translated means preserving the "right" to work at slave wages, fighting unionism, and defending the interests of the capitalist class, the court has given labor a stiff blow.

Higher Form of **Deception**

Since by and large the old argument that the workers in a plant do not represent a majority and hence should not be granted recognition seldom holds any longer, the courts have to resort to a higher deception. As the struggle gets sharper they make up new rules. They outlaw the closed shop. They declare the sit-down "illegal, immoral, and revolutionary." They refuse to press laws invoked against the

That is why a struggle conducted on straight trade union lines alone can only lead up a blind alley. Such a condition has been reached in France, where magnificent struggles have led only to the breaking of contracts by the companies and a discreet averting of the head by the courts. The trade union problem becomes a political problem and can be solved only on the political field. This is the stage at which many unions in the United States, plagued by lay-offs, cursed with the problem of unemployment, beset with a rise in the cost of living, and harassed by the courts, have now reached.
