What was expected should cause no surprise when it

Borough President George U. Harvey of Queens has associated himself with Frank Hague, the Jersey Hitler. In two speeches delivered by Harvey last week, he

"I am for Hague 100 per cent. We need more like him . . . There are only two men in the East who think more of their country than they do of themselves. They are Frank Hague and myself."

Then, according to the New York Herald-Tribune (June 10, 1938), "he mentioned that in Italy 'they gave the communists a dose of castor oil in addition to the rubber hose' and reminded the veterans that he was among the first in New York to advocate using the rubber hose on communists."

Hague does not conceal his intention of keeping any and every working class organization he disagrees with from exercizing the right of free speech in Jersey City. and of using all the methods of reactionary mob violence to enforce his dictatorship.

#### An Admirer Of Mussolini

Harvey does not conceal his admiration for Mussolini's barbaric Blackshirts and their methods—castor oil and rubber hose-and his intention to emulate them

Tomorrow, fascist elements elsewhere will copy the Hagues and Harveys, if the workers allow them to get away with it now.

What is to be done to stop this fascist sore from spreading?

Whoever tells the workers to stand with folded arms, to appeal to the "courts of justice" or to the "impartial government," is paralyzing the labor movement in its struggle against these fascists.

In Italy, the socialist and trade union leaders confined their efforts to appeals to the "liberal government" and ended by spending their lives in fascist pri-

In Germany, the workers were brought under the heel of Hitler by the social-democratic leaders who kept pleading with the government "to act" against

All the wisdom of these leaders is concentrated in the idea of getting anybody and everybody to undertake the job which only the working class, by its own action, can undertake and carry through.

The Communist Party supports Roosevelt in the name of "democracy versus fascism." But Hague could not last a minute without the tacit support of Roosevelt and the National Committee of the Democratic Party of which they are both an integral part. The Communist Party supported LaGuardia for Mayor of New York in the last election—also in the name of "democracy versus fascism." But the same LaGuardia came out for the election of Harvey as the Queens Borough

#### Thomas Courts Reactionaries

Norman Thomas, leader of the Socialist Party, apparently believes that the struggle for liberty and against fascism can be won by allying himself with such arch-reactionary enemies of labor as Herbert Hoover, Alfred Landon, Owen D. Young and John W.

Their road is the road to disaster.

The *only* way in which the workers can protect themselves against the fascist dictators is by organized defense.

If the workers of Jersey City, especially the unions of the C.I.O., really mean to hold public meetings, in spite of Hague's mobsters, there is an easy way to do it: Surround every meeting with a strong Labor Defense Guard, sufficiently numerous, determined, disciplined and trained to ward off any attacks.

If the workers of Queens, who hate fascism and its petty dictators, are to answer the threat of castor oil and rubber hose, they must organize their self-defense

Nobody every gained his rights by begging for them on bended knee. Nobody ever kept his rights by pleading with those who are destroying them. The masses have a right to defend themselves from the fascists. And only by exercizing that right can they insure the preservation of all their rights.

Air Attacks On Canton **Take Immense Toll** Of Human Life

Under the leadership of its ewly-formed "War Cabinet, Japan is making a desperate ef-China to a rapid conclusion. The chief manifestation of the new drive was 16 days of unre mitting aerial bombardment of the thickly - crowded civilian quarters of Canton. Nearly 4,000 nen, women and children were killed by this merciless aerial offensive which continued without let-up while the powers delivered so-called humanitarian protests to Tokio.

#### Canton Unaided

Chiang Kai-shek left Canton to ts fate. Not a single Chinese airplane rose to repel these unprecedented attacks. There were only the feeble puffs of futile anti-aircraft batteries which were no menace at all to the attack-

Meanwhile in both Hankow and Tokyo new developments of the utmost significance were taking place, which clearly indicated that on both sides the war is entering into a new phase.

In Tokyo, along with the decision to carry out "unlimited" or "total" warfare in China, preparations were made to put in force most of the provisions of the National Mobilization Law which is designed to mobilize all the material and human resources of the country under the rigid control of a virtual military dictatorship. Effort is also being pushed to hasten plans for the immediate economic exploitation of North China in the hope of which the war has already placed upon the frail economic structure of Japan.

#### Repression Under Way

In Hankow, the increasing military difficulties on the Central China front were paralleled and against various left-wing intellectuals and organizations.

Following the collapse of the defenses around Hsuchow three weeks ago, the Chinese retreat sures are bad in a union, unless along the Lunghai Railway turned into a virtual rout. The situaton bore many distinct similarities to the conditions that existed November, when the Chinese Yangtse delta.

## **Committee Launches Fund To Assist Persecuted Revolutionists**

The desperate plight of revolutionary refugees who are denied all relief and the right to work, and who are threatened with deportation from France and Czechoslovakia, has called forth an organized effort to come to their aid. Last week the American Fund for Political Prisoners and Refugees was organized in New York City, with George Novack as Secretary.

The members of the Committee are: Martin Abern, James Burnham, James P. Cannon, Rose Karsner, Pearl Kluger, Harry Milton, Fannie Neff, George Novack, Lyman Paine, and Jac Wasserman. Since all the members of this committee have had a wide and varied experience in defense work, it is to be expected that energetic action, already too long delayed, will be forthcoming on behalf of the harried and persecuted victims of European reaction.

#### NOVACK AS SECRETARY

George Novack is widely known as the former secretary of the American Committee for the Defense of Leon Trotsky, one of the most efficiently conducted and successful defense activities seen in the United States. He will be assisted by Pearl Kluger, who was also associated with him in the work of that committee.

The growing tide of reaction in Europe has forced thousands of revolutionary workers to flee their homes. From Italy, Germany, Austria, Spain and other countries, they sought refuge in the lands of "democracy."

The "democratic" governments of France and Czechoslovakia have, within the last few months, made it virtually impossible for these refugees to rehabilitate their lives, to make new

homes for themselves. Laws have been passed denying them citizenship and making it impossible for non-citizens to obtain any work. Hundreds are in danger of being deported to Fascist countries, where concentration camps and death await them.

#### PLIGHT OF REVOLUTIONISTS

But it is the plight of revolutionary refugees which is the most tragic of all. Denied relief by liberal and Stalinist organizations and constantly harried by the government, they lead a precarious existence, in constant danger of being deported. Outright starvation is the fate of many of them. Some, driven to desperation, have already turned to suicide as the only alternative to slow starvation.

The American Fund for Political Prisoners and Refugees has been organized to raise funds for these revolutionists, to enable them to live and to fight deportation into the hands of the Fascist butchers. Plans are under way to form local bodies in all the main centers to aid the work of the American Fund

#### **Decisive Developments**

#### No Automatic Collapse

But it will not come about automatically. It will be assured and hastened only if Japan's invading armies meet with the aroused forces of the whole Chinese people. So far, under the leadership of Chiang Kai-shek and the Kuomintang, the resistance to the invasion has been confined to purely militarydefensive measures for which the great masses of the people, the workers in the cities and the peasants, have had to bear the chief burden. #### Progress In Akron

The report in last week's issue about the decision of various A.F. of L. and C.I.O. unions in Akron to establish a "United Labor Defense Council" on a permanent basis for the purpose of protecting the unions' right of picketing and guarding the civil liberties of labor, is a welcome sign of progress.

Coming on the heels of the murderous assault by company thugs and Akron police upon the Goodyear picket line, the action of the unions takes on additional significance.

The rubber workers of Akron, organized a few years ago, have already distinguished themselves by their militancy, fearlessness and determination to win. They are among the vanguard of American labor. They have now fortified their record by the important step of overcoming the division in labor's ranks and uniting A.F. of L. and C.I.O. unions into a common front. Nobody will quarrel with the aims of this front; on the contrary, every worker will salute it cordi-

Now that Akron labor has taken the first step; it should take the second. The United Labor Defense Committee needs the widest support from the ranks. If the rights to picket, to strike, to organize, to free speech and assembly, are really to be preserved from reactionary attack, the United Labor Defense Committee must have at its disposal hundreds, if not thousands, of courageous workers ready at a moment's notice to defend themselves from the reaction with every available means. The Akron labor movement has thousands of such workers, ready to respond to the first call.

A committee of a dozen or a score of persons, no matter how willing, cannot, by itself, protect the picket line or other labor rights. That job requires mass support. And by mass support, nothing else can be meant than selected, trained, disciplined fighters, properly organized and democratically led, who will know how to protect the union's rights from assaults of mobsters, uniformed or other-

Akron has already set the pace for American labor in many fields. Let it now take the initiative in organizing the first important Labor Defense Guard. Such a step would be an unforgettable service to the working class, and a terrific blow to reaction.

#### Thomas In Queer Company

Many are the crimes that have been committeed in the name of Liberty. But seldom has a more sinister burlesque on that mouth-filling word been perpetrated than is done by the movement just launched under the patriotic title of "National Rededication."

"We are not interested," announced its acting director, Mr. Hermann Hagedorn, in making public the names of the national committee, "in criticizing anybody or attacking anybody. Our purpose is to state the case for liberty and democracy as expressed in the Declaration of Independence and guaranteed by the Constitution of the United States."

In their statement, the sponsors of the National Rededication say: "Liberty has been destroyed in many of the leading nations. Openly or secretly, alien revolutionary forces are seeking the overthrow of free governments. The glorification of violence and the resurgence of racial and religious intolerance are everywhere endangering democracy. The only answer to militant autocracy is a democracy, informed, united, revitalized and aflame."

The organization will have among its purposes "to rekindle the public mind to the splendor of America's free institutions . . . to stimulate that faith which has been the nation's strength—faith in liberty, faith in man, faith in America and faith in God." And among other special observances during its six-month "educational campaign on the significance of democratic institutions" will be the Fourth of July and Armistice Day.

Who are the ladies and gentlemen so vitally concerned with guarding Liberty and smashing the "alien revolutionary forces . . . seeking the overthrow of free governments?" Among them we find such illustrious democrats as the reactionary gentleman from Virginia, Richard E. Byrd: the agent of the House of Morgan and former candidate for president, John W. Davis: the democratic Hero of Anacostia, Herbert Hoover; the late candidate for president put forward by DuPonts and the Liberty League-Alfred Landon; the red-baiting specialist of the A. F. of L., Matthew Woll; and the head of the General Electric Company, Owen D. Young.

That this collection of reactionaries should seek to pose as guardians of liberty, may be a fine piece of hypocrisy, but not entirely strange. Not at all strange is their eulogy of "America's free institutions," of the Constitution, of "faith in America and faith in God." Their dislike of "alien revolutionary forces" dates back to and is of a piece with their ingrained hatred of the Russian Revolution, of Marxism, socialism, communism, and all other doctrines and movements which they stamp as "alien." They are people who have regarded the mild reforms of Roosevelt, and Roosevelt himself, as a modified American translation of Bolshevism. Their whole public record shows them to conceive the term "liberty" to mean the untramelled freedom of reactionary capitalism to exploit the masses and to crush all those who oppose it. Nor can "liberty" have any other meaning on their lips.

For this perfectly obvious reason alone, the new movement is a cheap deception, a democratic, capitalist-patriotic mask for reaction.

But side by side with Hoover, Landon, Young, Woll, Davis and Byrd, sits—we rub our eyes!— the national chairman of the Socialist Party, Norman Thomas. Has his party approved his participation in this reactionary fraud or has he, as usual, committed the party without even consulting it? We are loath to believe that there is one man in the S. P. who takes the ideas of socialism seriously, who will not immediately repudiate Thomas' disgraceful and criminal collaboration with such arch-enemies of labor and liberty as he is now associated

When the Stalinist party proclaims itself the defender of American capitalist democracy and "the splendor of America's free institutions," this is universally recognized as the measure of its selfdegradation. #### Deport 'Em!

Last week's press reported a letter from the March Federal grand jury in the Southern District of New York, to President Roosevelt, urging him to take steps towards the deportation of all aliens on relief who have lived in the United States three years without obtaining first citizenship papers.

We are sure that the gentlemen of the grand jury had no objection when, years ago, agents of the big corporations of the United States cajoled workers and peasants from South, Central and Eastern Europe into coming to this country by painting attractive pictures of its unlimited possibilities and unrestricted freedom. That was when the big corporations needed big reserves of cheap labor to keep the profit-wheels moving.

Now, in the midst of the crisis, these same gentlemen are unwilling to continue giving these workers even that miserable relief which they are now getting and which constitutes only a tiny fraction of the profits they helped to pile up for the capitalist class in this country. Rather, they propose mass deportations on the grounds that . . . they are not citizens!

We wonder if this insolent demand was made on the assumption that it would be supported also by the Stalinist party, which recently disqualified from membership all "aliens" who are not 100 per cent American citizens?

## Noah London Reported Executed In Moscow!

A report has reached the United States that Noah London has been executed in Moscow, and there is good reason to believe that the report it true.

Who was Noah London?

He was a founder of the Communist Party of the United States and a leader of its Jewish Federation for years. A true proletarian, raised in the misery and poverty of New York's East Side. he devoted his whole life to the revolutionary movement. Speaker, organizer and writer, he was known to thousands of Jewish workers in New York and elsewhere.

#### HELPED FOUND THE FREIHEIT

Among the leading spirits in the foundation of the first Jewish communist daily newspaper—the Freiheit—he was a member of its editorial staff all during the early years of its existence. In addition he was a member of the Educational Committee of the party and one of the directors of the C.P. Workers School since its foundation.

Several years ago, he voluntarily gave up a well-paying position as engineer with one of New York's big corporations and went to the Soviet Union with his wife, to place his technical talent at the disposal of Soviet economy. He left for Russia with a recommendation from the American Communist party to the Soviet authorities.

Why was this old communist militant executed? To those who knew him and worked with him in the past—even to those who could not agree with his political acceptance of Stalinism -it is inconceivable that he should have committed any crime against the revolution or the Soviet Union to merit capital punishment.

#### STALINIST PRESS KEEPS SILENT

And the fact the official communist press has been absolutely silent about his case only strengthens the suspicion that Noah London was murdered by the Stalinist assassins.

We know that hundreds of foreign-born communists-leaders and rank and filers-well known in the German. Hungarian. Polish, Greek and other movements have been murdered on Soviet soil by the G.P.U. But this is the first case we know of which involves an American communist,

What has Moissaye Olgin, London's old friend, political colleague and collaborator on the Freiheit, to say about the case? What have his other old associates to say about it? Why is there no statement at all from the party of which he was a member? The labor public is entitled to a plain-spoken explanation!
