The Main Enemy In Latin America

Who is the main enemy of the peoples of the Latin American

The answer to this question is not to be found in the flowery rhetoric now issuing from the rostrum at the Lima Conference, nor in the elegant broadcasts through which the Conference was built up, nor in the shameless dispatches and editorials of the Daily Worker.

The answer is to be discovered in the hard, cold, sober statistics of investment and trade, and in the harsh facts of the political histories of the twenty Latin American countries.

And there is not the slightest doubt about the true answer: the main enemy of the peoples of the Latin American nations is the United States Government, its Yankee Imperialism.

It is Yankee Imperialism, guided by the gloved fists of "good neighbors" Roosevelt and Hull, that occupies the dominant position in Latin American trade. United States commerce with Latin America is more than twice the amount of its nearest

In spite of the difficulties in estimation caused by the fiscal chaos of the past decade, the figures prove that the United States capital investment in Latin America now totals far above that of any other power.

In the deep, stifling mines of Peru and Mexico, on the oil fields of Venezuela and Colombia, in the jungles of Central America, on the sugar plantations of Cuba and Puerto Rico, the starved and miserable people of Latin America sweat their lifeblood away for the great Wall Street corporations: for the United Fruit Company, Cerro da Pasco, Anaconda Copper, Standard Fruit, American Sugar Refining, Standard Oil of New Jersey, the Texas Company.

After suitable bribes to the puppet officials of the local governments, governments made and unmade at will by these same corporations and the U. S. State Department—aided when necessary by the Marines and the Navy-the dishonored profits find their way back into the coffers of America's Sixty Families.

Yankee Imperialism, which has only since the War moved into first place among the brigands, is not of course without rivals for so juicy a prize. The two important contenders are: British imperialism and German imperialism; the other powers, including the much talked about Italy and Japan, are altogether

In the total of capital investment, Britain is close behind the United States, and dominates several of the nations, especially the important Argentina. In volume of trade Great Britain and Germany have been running neck and neck during the past few years, with Germany now slightly ahaed—the trade of both together totalling less than that of the United States alone.

Control of the Latin American market is absolutely essential to United States economy. Deprived of this outlet, the U. S. capital economy would collapse overnight. U. S. capitalist economy can continue in operation only on the backs of the Latin American

To keep control of this market, essential to its existence. U. S. imperialism is prepared to employ any means: diplomacy, graft, the creation and destruction of local governments, armed intervention, intensive propaganda, and, finally, war against any and all imperialist rivals.

This is the real background of the Lima Conference.

All the talk about "democracy," "the American system," "peace," is so much bellywash. What Yankee Imperialism cares about Democracy and peace is shown by the record: by the ravaging of Puerto Rico, the armed robbery of Panama from Colombia, the U. S. troops scouring Mexico for Villa and the Navy bombing Vera Cruz, the bloody Cuban governments of Machado and Batista directed by the U.S. ambassador, the marines pillaging Nicaragua in their campaign to exterminate

What the native imperialist stewards, jockeying for the highest bids among the great powers, care about democracy and peace is shown with a grim enough irony by the fact that among the entire twenty nations, there are only two that approximate a democratic government and three others with a pitiful minimum of democratic rights; the remainder are bloody terrorizing dictatorships.

Yankee Imperialism, the main enemy of the Latin American peoples, is the same enemy that faces the workers of the United States in their struggle for a decent life. The Latin American peoples are the chief allies of the workers of the United States in the common struggle. The fate of the workers here is inseparably bound up with the struggle of the Latin American peoples for freedom, against the imperialist yoke.

We must expose relentlessly, day in and day out, the monstrous hypocrisy whereby Roosevelt and Hull, with the aid of their liberal and reformist and Stalinist allies, strive through such projects as the Lima Conference to enlist the Latin American peoples as pawns of Yankee Imperialism in its world contest with its imperialist challengers.

We must join forces with the Latin American peoples on the basis of the sole progressive perspective, the sole effective program: the struggle against the world imperialist system as a whole, and above all the struggle against United States imperialism, the main and direct enemy of the masses of the two Americas.

Even the capitalist press understands now that France is headed for a change in regime. It recognizes that Daladier is paving the way for the abandonment of the so-called democratic institutions and is speculating only on the time and method of the

Uneasy Interlude

The immediate situation in France is that of an uneasy interlude. In the Chamber of Deputies last week Daladier won a slim majority based exclusively upon the center and right. In a situation of crisis such as continues to exist in France, this tight parliamentary balance simply reflects the approach of momentous events outside of parliament.

That Daladier, the French Gen eral Staff, and the Fascist gangs are preparing for this change we know quite well. Whether the workers will be prepared on their part to meet this menace to their organized existence is the crucial question now. 300,000 Refugees Demand Entry Here; Storm Consulates

Victims of Nazi Persecution Plead in Berlin, Vienna, and Naples for Asylum in U. S.

Three hundred thousand Germans have registered at American consulates in Germany in Paris, Prague, Naples and other European cities. Three hundered thousand victims of Nazi persecution, pleading for asylum in America.

Those who, having managed to get out of Germany, thought they had found peace in Czechoslovakia and France, now find most of the remnants of Czechoslovakia completely Nazified, and the Daladier government conducting a veritable reign of terror against

'foreigners," i.e. refugees. Italy has ordered all foreign-born Jews to emigrate within three months; more than 3,000 Jewish refugees, most of them having fled from Austria after its annexation by Germany, are besieging the American consulate in Naples. Of 4,200 refugees applying there for

visas, only 420 have received them. Out of the depth of their despair, the refugees cry to us for help.

100 delegates representing 35 local C.I.O. unions at the Toledo Industrial Union Council tonight unanimously adopted a resolution calling on President Roosevelt and the State Department "to immediately offer asylum in the United States by lifting all restrictions and quota limitations to the refugee victims of Fas-

NEW YORK, N. Y .-- The strong solidarity of the truck drivers, who walked out in sympathy with 1500 platform men and checkers employed at the terminals and caused a virtual stoppage of all trucking to and from the city this week, resulted in a union

The strike was called last Thursday by the Motor Bus and Terminal Checkers, Platform and Office Workers, Local 21510, A.F. of L. after union officials had repeatedly failed to reach an agreement with the bosses Highway Transport Association.

With shipping completely tied up, the bosses were forced to sign a contract providing a \$5.50 daily minimum instead of the \$4.40 a ceived. The agreement also provided that the pay rate was to again increase to \$6.50 a day minimum after 10 and one-half

Although no strike of truck drivers was called, members of locals 807 and 816 of the Teamsters Union refused to cross picket lines into the terminals, thus demonstrating their sympathy

Mayor La Guardia, in his attempt to break the solidarity of the drivers with the striking terminal men, read the "riot act" to the truckmen with the hope that he could frighten them back to work.

"There is no truck strike and there should be none." the Mavor "The trucks are not in-

volved.' But the truck drivers held firm, and the trucks were involved enough to assure the union vic-

NEW YORK. - Progressive strength in the food workers very lucky to have two very union here showed a gratifying increase over the previous elections. The Stalinist administration in coalition with old-line office-holders rode into office again in the polling just completed in Cafeteria Employees John Brucker who has what it Union, Local 302.

Larry Phillips, Progressive candidate for Secretary-Treasurer, polled 1,258 votes as against his opponent who was re-elected with 3,301 votes. The Progressive vote represented an increase of 500 over the previous elections. The increased administration vote came from the newly organized chain cafeterias.

The workers in these cafeterias -where no minimum wages were established—had virtually no contact with the union because of a deliberate policy on the part of the administration to prevent the holding of membership meetings. Thus while the opposition was prevented from bringing adminisration mismanagement before these workers, the officials called 'private" meetings to instruct these workers in fighting-not the osses!—but the Progressives.

Another factor in the victory of the Stalinists was their ability to wield economic pressure against the workers. This included framing workers out of their jobs, usually with the assistance of the Bosses' Association, in clique control over the Labor Chief's office and discriminatory distribution of work to the union's unemployed

A minor victory was scored by the Progressives in the exclusion of Harry Lieben, Stalinist thug and Business Agent, from the "rank and file" (administration) slate. Lieben's exploits in framing and slugging workers in his territory have been mentioned in previous issues of the Appeal.

Ruth Querio Gives Points On Pushing Appeal Sales

ALLENTOWN, Pa. - The coming of the twice-weekly is just about the best news one could possibly receive, and a day for the grandest kind of celebration!

You ask how we in Allentown intend to get out the best newspaper that's printed? Um, that's easy-it sells itself, providing each comrade puts his shoulder to the task. The thing to do is to make each and every comrade, none excluded, automatically responsible for at least two copies. We in Allentown are responsible comrades, only 72 and 78 years old-Mother Kimmel, 72, who sells at least 5 Appeals every week, often more, and Comrade Wickman, 78, who sells the paper with me. Also

The most important thing to do is to watch the local papers for union meetings, mass meetings and all kinds of meetings where workers gather. Then two or more comrades cover the meeting with Appeals, and like the little newsie on the corner, CALL out the headline or the item nearest the mind of the worker attending the meeting.

Regularity Imperative

Of course, the mill gates are very important. That is regular, routine work. Comrade Wickman and I cover Bethlehem Steel every Thursday. We also cover two Spanish clubs and one Portuguese Club in Bethlehem on Thursdays. Do you notice the specified day? That is very important. Workers become used to you coming there on just such a day and just such a time. Now with the coming twice-weekly we are laying the ground work by telling the workers that the paper is soon coming out twice a week and at a lower price (3c).

We also have a route that two sons of a comrade cover weekly for regular customers. Then there is the important matter of getting out into the streets—especially the main street-where workers walkregularly.

If you notice, regularity is the keynote. I have regular places, regular times to go to them and we are getting regular customers. As soon as better weather conditions permit we will be covering more mills; there will be street corner meetings again; really concentrated STREET SELLING and then we will challenge anyone our

size to try and beat us! The only difference that the

twice-weekly will make is that instead of doing these regular things once a week, we will do them twice a week, and believe me, I expect that within a month's time after the lowerpriced paper comes out, we will have to increase the bundle. As summer gets under way, the bundle orders will go up and up and UP!

The whole thing just rests on getting out regularly to certain the Appeal doesn't worry me in the least—in fact I'm all pepped up, particularly in regard to the lower price. I really do expect to double my sales in no time at all when the price comes down. It takes time to build up the sales but it is really worth while. It forms a sort of friendly spirit with the workers. They read the paper and come back for more. They tell their friends about the Appeal and others buy.

There are plenty of places around here that are ripe for the picking; places where you can see the workers are looking for something they thought they had in the C. P. and where they will soon learn that it really is in the Socialist Workers Party.

How Shall We Fight Anti-Semitism -- By Felix Morrow

BLIND ALLEYS FOR THE JEWISH PEOPLE

THE END OF THE ASSIMILATIONIST ROAD

The meaning of assimilation, of identification with the bourgeois state, is clear. If bourgeois German Jewry were not bestially persecuted by Hitler, it would have to join him however reluctantly and squeamishly, in his bestial persecution of the German labor movement. Until yesterday anti-Semitism was not part of the fascist apparatus of Italy; and until yesterday Jewish diplomats, generals, financiers and industrialists, were members of the Fascist party of Italy; a Jewish general led one of Mussolini's armies against Loyalist Spain! In British South Africa, Jews are part of the white community which exploits the black natives and in innumerable humiliating ways maintains a system of racial superiority. As a matter of fact, one need go no further than the American South to see the same phenomenon of Jews Jim-crowing

Quite apart from anti-Semitism, therefore, the Jew must take his place: either with the persecutors or join with the persecuted in the struggle for liberation. There is no third category in modern capitalist society, whether fascist or democratic! Such is the structure of rotting capitalist society.

THE ROAD OF ZIONISM Theodore Herzl, founder of Zionism, typifies the leadership of that movement: disappointed assimilationists seeking their own (bourgeois) nation at a time when the productive forces of the world are strangling within the confining national boundaries.

But we, as revolutionary socialists, precisely because we are internationalists, stand for the unconditional freedom of every people. If only a small segment of Jewry, if only a million Jews, desired a Jewish Homeland, they would have the right to establish it. But under what conditions and by what methods can a Jewish Homeland be established? We declare categorically that it is only possible in a Socialist world.

For the Jews are not only dispersed and have no national state; the same is, in essence, true of the Irish, for every Irish nationalist knows that the government of "Eire" is a puppet of British imperialism. But the inhabitants of Ireland are Irish, while the inhabitants of Palestine are predominantly Arabs.

Under what conditions, then, can one envisage a Jewish Palestine? Obviously only two: (1) By agreement with the Arabs, who inhabit not only Palestine but the Near East; or (2) by driving the Arabs out of Palestine with fire and sword. There is no third real alternative. An ostensible third alternative, the proposal that Jews enter Palestine in such numbers that they will constitute the majority in the country, is merely a variation of either (1) or (2) for it means Jewish domination of Palestine.

The actual course followed by the Zionists has been a futile attempt to avoid these plain alternatives. The leaders of the Histadruth (Federation of Trade Unions) understood quite well in the early post-war years that to reach an agreement with the Arabs meant to unite the Arab peasants and workers with the Jewish agricultural and industrial workers against their oppressors, the Jewish and Arab bourgeoisie and landlords and the British overlords, the "mandate power." But the Jewish Agency and the Jewish National Fund were dominated by the Jewish capitalists, especially the American-Jewish capitalists-incidentally, dominated by the non-Zionist Jewish capitalists and financiers, who looked upon Palestine as merely one form of Jewish charity. The Histadruth adopted regulations providing for Arab-Jewish labor unions; but it remained a platonic gesture, for the Zionist leadership feared to antagonize those who held the purse strings. They

feared, too, a collision with the mandate power, Great Britain, which of course would have understood that Arab-Jewish labor unions would be a revolutionary force endangering imperialist hegemony in the Near East. They took the road of opportunism: class-collaboration with their own capitalists and with Britain.

While the Irish nationalists denounce collaboration with Britain as treason to Irish freedom, Ben-Gurion, head of the Histadurth, denounces opposition to collaboration with Britain as treason to Zionism. The result? Britain has been enabled to pit Jew and Arab against each other. The British have been helped in this by Zionists of every hue, including the "Socialists." It is enough to recall the shameful slogan, "Conquer Jewish Work," i.e., get the jobs for the Jews, which has thrown the Arab workers and peasants into the arms of their bourgeois-feudal leaders who, for their own reasons, are irreconcilably opposed to Jewish expansion in Palestine. The Jewish Fascists, Jabotinsky's Revisionists, are at least realistic when they draw the conclusion that the way to establish a Jewish state is to demonstrate their usefulness and indispensability to British imperialism and thereby secure a free hand to drive the Arabs out by armed force. Without British bayonets, the Jews today would be driven out of Palestine by the Arabs. Jewish colonization in Palestine continues only thanks to British imperialism.

THE PRICE WE PAY FOR ZIONISM

This is understood, and resented, by the other nations oppressed by British might. When Mahatma Ghandi, after solidarizing himself with the Jewish victims of Nazi persecution, goes on to speak bitterly of the Jews being imposed on the Arabs, he is undoubtedly expressing the feelings of the Hindu people. Leaders of the black peoples oppressed by Britain have expressed themselves similarly. When these people, the natural allies of the Iews-and who moreover understand their common cause with the Jews-speak out against Zionism in Palestine, every Jew

And to what end do the Zionists thus endanger the friendship of the colonial peoples of Asia and Africa for the Jews? Is it not clear that no matter how servile the Zionist movement will be to Britain it will not receive in return the right of unrestricted immigration into Palestine? That is excluded in advance. British imperialism weighs in the balance: 400,000 Jews in Palestine, backed by some part of the 16 million Jews of the world—against 50 million Arab-speaking Moslems backed by the whole Moslem world! Lest the Arabs seek freedom from Britain, the British ruling class diverts them from that path by preoccupying the Arabs with the Jewish problem. The Jew thus serves Britain as scapegoat in the Near East, as he serves Hitler and Mussolini and the Polish and Rumanian gangster-rulers as scapegoat in Europe. But in return for the collaboration of the most powerful Arab landlords and capitalists, Britain keeps a sharp rein on the influx of Jews into Palestine and never, under British imperialism, will the Jews be freed from that rein. No, it is too high a price to pay when the only result is perpetual civil-war in Palestine in which a small segment of Jewry faces the Arab masses.

In any event, it is abundantly clear, the salvation of most of the sixteen million Jews of the world cannot be sought in Palestine. Not even the Zionists contend that Palestine under the British Empire can absorb more than a small part of Jewry. We must look elsewhere than in Zionism for the solution.

James outlined the ebb and flow of the struggle between the militant workers of France and the Fascist reaction since the days of the street fighting of February, 1934. Clearly, unanswerably he showed that at all times the militancy of the workers has been ready to break out into open conflict against the bosses. It has been held in check only through the traitorous policies of the Popular Front, through the class-col laboration methods of the trade union leadership and the open social-patriotic line of the French Communist Party.

He pointed out that the last general strike was forced on the 'leaders" by the rank and file just as had been the magnificent sit down strikes of June, 1936 and the Clichy demonstration of 2,000,-000 workers that same summer.

Make the List Grow

After years of nauseating chatter about the great mission of the "people" in the fight for 'decency" and "liberty," events surrounding the persecution of Jews in Germany drive home the point that the working class is the only class in modern society capable of leading any progressive movement.

While frock-coated millionaires, big-shot rabbis and priests are making the welkin ring with cheap protest against Hitler and just as cheap sympathy for the Jews, the only real program of assistance for the refugees comes from the labor movement. The campaign for "opening the doors" of the U.S. to the victims of Nazi persecution has already been taken up by a considerable number of unions.

Local 544 of Minneapolis, the Harris County, Texas, C.I.O. Council, Local 10 I.L.G.W.U., Local 5 American Federation of Teachers, the Headquarters Branch of the M.F.O.W.&U. (Marine Firemen), a Federal Labor Union in Montana and an Office Workers Local in Boston have passed resolutions favoring the dropping of immigration restrictions to refugees.

While this list indicates the real sentiment of the American workers towards the refugees, it would be folly to say that it has more than skimmed the surface of the American labor

Where are the names of the C.I.O. and the A.F. of L. which have passed such defiant resolutions against Hitler-and whose leaders, Lewis and Green lose no occasion to make high-sounding speeches of "deep concern" for refugees?

Where is the name of the United Automobile Workers, which was in the forefront of the unions in the fight against war-and whose leader Homer Martin takes great pride in championing progressive causes?

Where is the name of the needle trades unions, whose leaders never fail to appear on public platforms to shed bitter tears about the misfortune of the Jews?

Where is the name of Local 22 of the I.L. G.W.U. or the Knitgoods workers local, both led by Lovestoneites whose political organization has publicly declared for the opening of the doors to the U.S.?

Where are the Stalinist-led unions, the Furriers, the Foodworkers, the National Maritime Union, etc., whose leaders make a profession out of violent anti-Hitlerite speeches-most of which is jingo pro-war agitation?

The workers in these and other unions should demand an accounting from their leaders. The labor movement least of all can tolerate the "sympathy" racket. It must act—and act at once -for admitting the refugees into the United States. United and concerted action of the labor movement can force Congress to "open the doors" at its coming sessions.

Refuge and Social Democracy

The powerful parties of the Second International in the Scandinavian countries play a leading role in the cabinets of all three countries. Premiers, ministers of state and foreign affairs, etc. etc.—these portfolios are held by the Social Democrats. We, of course, have no illusions about the real power: that remains in the hands of the capitalist class, in whose service the Social Democrats function as a liberal front. But the Social Democrats justify their role as one of actually securing, through their governmental functions, real gains for the working class.

Taking them at their word, then, why do they not open the doors of these countries to the refugees from the Hitler terror? Why do they not, at the least, try to do this? Their refusal to do so brands them as not even honest democrats, let alone Socialists.

Equally contemptible is the studied silence of their blood-brothers in this country, whether of the stripe of the Social Democratic Federation or the "Socialist Party" of Norman Thomas. These gentlemen wax indignant at the Stalinist regime for not opening the doors of the Soviet Union. But on the equally swinish conduct of the Scandinavian Social Democrats-on this they

QUESTION BOX

Question: How can the United States afford to "open the doors" to the thousands of German Jewish refugees, when there are already millions of unemployed workers in this country?-B. G., New York.

Answer: This is the argument that Hitler uses: "There is no room for the Jews in Germany!" Similarly, this objection says: "There is no room for the Jews in the United States!" Hitler says the Jews are taking away the jobs of good German workers; the "democratic" capitalists here say that the refugees will take away the jobs of good American workers.

Moreover, if the Jews have to be sent to Madagascar or Guiana because unemployment leaves no room for them elsewhere, is it not logical for the "democratic" statesmen to propose that the home unemployment problem be solved likewise? After all, it would be better than to let them starve!

In the earlier days of this country, the right of asylum for refugees was recognized in practice. Then the U.S. was comparatively poor. Today, when it is the wealthiest nation in the world, it cannot "afford" to admit the Jews! Why is it that the wealthier a capitalist country becomes, the less it can afford to admit persecuted people?

The answer to Roosevelt and Chamberlain is the same as the answer to Hitler. In Germany, it is not the Jews who have taken away the workers' jobs-it is German capitalism. it is Hitler himself. The same thing is true here: it is the bosses who take away the jobs from the workers!

In this country there is work and wealth enough not only for the millions of unemployed but also for the comparatively. small number of refugees who would be admitted. The Socialist Workers Party has the program which will aid both the victims of the Nazi terror and the victims of unemployment. We demand a 10 billion dollar federal public works program; a 5 billion dollar federal housing program; a wage scale which rises with the cost of living; reduction of working hours at the same weekly wage rate to give the right to a job to every worker; open the idle factories and let the workers operate them at union wages, under workers' control; make the rich pay for the ravages of their crisis!

To oppose opening the doors to the refugees is to endorse the policy of Hitler!

Stalinists Try To 'Smear' Grynszpan The case of Herschel Grynszpan has aroused the deepest sentiments of sympathy and solidarity among the widest variety of

people. Even representatives and spokesmen of the conservative wing of capitalist democracy came forward spontaneously in behalf of the young Jewish emigre who sought in feverish desperation to protest dramatically before the bar of world opinion against the savage torments to which Hitlerism subjected his family and his people. Public figures so far to the right, politically, as Dorothy Thompson, have expressed themselves categorically against the Nazis' demand that Grynszpan be guillotined for shooting Vom Rath.

We are revolutionary Marxists, and by virtue of our whole tradition, our doctrine, our daily behavior, we have nothing in common with the theory and practice of any kind of individual action, much less individual terrorism. At bottom, however justified it may be "morally," it has always been either a substitute for or a brake upon the action of the masses which, properly organized, is the ONLY effective method of struggle against reaction. Yet, although our movement has always persistently and patiently combatted individual terrorism, it is proud of the fact that at all times and in all lands it has never hesitated, when confronted with a choice between the misguided foe of tyranny and the despot who fell before his bullet

or bomb, to take the side of the former. We cherish the memory of William Tell and not of Gessler the tyrant. Not a shadow of infamy is attached in our minds to the epic traditions of the Russian terrorists who gave their lives in the struggle against the bloody Czars and Grand Dukes and their murderous police prefects. One would have to be devoid of the last iota

of hatred for oppression and despotism, to think or write otherwise. That is why it is so utterly revolting to see how the Stalinists in France have conducted themselves with reference to the Grynszpan case. At a time when even conservative writers put all emphasis on pointing out that the Hitlerites were only reaping the fruit of their vicious anti-Semitic campaign, and that the real anything at once so base, so unscrupulous, so vile, so offensive to responsibility for the crime rested on the shoulders of the Fascist bureaucracy, the Stalinist press leaped in to throw the mud of suspicion on the young Jewish martyr. On November 9, 1938, the Paris Stalinist daily, l'Humanite, wrote as follows:

"The police know as surely as we do that young Grynszpan was in constant relation with the Trotskyist circles, which swarm with agents of the Gestapo. Is it so improbable that one or more of these wretches said: 'Your family is being persecuted; its possessions are being stolen. That can't be tolerated. Avenge yourself, avenge yourself.' We firmly believe that there lies the truth."
