CALL FOR MASS RANK AND FILE BONUS FIGHT

Vets. Get Together With Jobless, Elect Delegates

The Central Rank and File Committee and Workers Ex-Servicemen's League yesterday issued the following call for a national conference of rank and file veterans to organize a nation-wide fight for the bonus. The conference will be held in Cleveland, Ohio, Sept. 23, 24, and 25th.

Comrade Veterans:

Hoover's slogan is: "Billions for Wall Street; Not A Cent for the Veterans and Unemployed." President Hoover drove us out of Washington with the army, using bayonets, sabres, gas bombs and fire. Hoover's police shot down our comrades, Huska and Carlson. Hoover thought by these methods to smash the demands of four million veterans, over half of whom are literally starving with their families, and leave us to our fate. At the same moment, Hoover and Congress hastily and gladly gave three billion dollars additional to the banks and corporations following the two billions given last January and spends huge sums for new wars. The slogan of Hoover and Congress is: Billions for Wall Street but not one cent for the starving veterans and unemployed.

The Fight for the Bonus Has Just Begun

But the fight has only begun. The rank and file veterans are learning through these experiences the reason for the vote against the bonus and the bloody evacuation from Washington. Only a greater organized power will force Hoover and Con-

Racketeer Truax Starts New Group to Split Miners

BRIDGEPORT, Ohio, Aug. 9.—William Truax, slinger of radical phrases, running for office on the ticket of the "Liberty Party" (linked with the Father Cox movement), is the latest recruit to the united front of coal operators, government and United Mine Workers of America officialdom, in their campaign to bind down the East Ohio miners to intolerable slave conditions.

Truax, at the present time reported to be a U.M.W.A. official at Shadyside, in the Bellaire section, has just formed the "Belmont County Relief Association," based on U. M. W. A. supporters in the mining camps and is trying to use his organization to break the miners away from the National Miners' Union and the Workers' International Relief.

Left Slogans.

At this opening stage of the fight, Truax is trying to pull in the miners by using the fighting talk that he knows they are hungry to hear. It is said that sometimes he even resorts to the use of some of the "Reds" fighting slogans. But, at the same time, while slinging militant phrases, Truax is in fact trying his best to entangle the men in a mesh of legalistic illusions, to get them to accept the policy of hanging on to the coat-tails of county and state authorities as a substitute for the fighting policy advocated by the N. M. U. to accept the policy of petitions instead of the policy of struggle. Above all, he is trying to divide and weaken the miners' ranks in their most vital fight today, the fight for immediate relief, the fight for bread.

Always for the Money.

Truax is not a new name in these parts. He has always had a way of

Clothing Bosses and Hillman Putting Through Wage-Cuts Under Cover of Stoppage

Workers Called to Fight New Attack; Picket the Association Shops

WARN TAILORS AGAINST TRICKS OF HILLMAN

Amalgamated Leaders Plan Strengthen the Bosses' Organizations

NEW YORK.—Workers in the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America must be on their guard against the new wage cut which the Hillman machine is preparing to put over, under the cover of the stoppage called a few days ago.

Hillman has called the strike for two purposes. (1) To build up and strengthen the clothing manufacturers' associations. (2) To put over a sweeping wage-cut in the industry.

Put Over Cut for 4,000

Although Hillman says the stoppage is called against wage-cuts and sweat-shop conditions, it is a well-known fact that he has already helped to put into effect a wage-cut for over 4,000 workers in the industry.

The workers in the Chas. D. Jaffe shop were given a cut amounting to 25 per cent. The J. J. Price shop was cut 10 per cent; the Goldie and Son workers were slashed 20 per cent. All these cuts were put over by the bosses with the aid of Mr. Hillman.

Now Mr. Hillman is preparing to

put cuts into effect throughout the entire industry.

Strengthen Bosses' Outfit

At the same time, however, he is attempting to strengthen the New York Clothing Men's Exchange and the Greater Clothing Contractors' Association. By directing the fighting energy of the workers against the independent contractors, urging the workers to only stop trucks working on these shops, Hillman is utilizing the workers to build the bosses' organizations. All this is done under the guise of "fighting against sweat shop conditions."

What Hillman fears is that the workers will direct their fight against the Contractors Association shops where the wage cut was only recently put into effect. There are over 4,000 workers in these shops who have not been called out.

Picket Contractors Assn. Shops

The workers, in order to defeat the Hillman betrayal, must do just that which Hillman fears. Direct the pick-

ets against the shops of the Contractors Association. Demand that the wage cut be taken back in these shops. Go in masses to the shops.

Fetch the workers out on a real strike against the wage cut. Refuse to go back to the shops until the wage cut is taken back. Stop the Association trucks.

NEW YORK.—The first three of a series of central election campaign demonstrations scheduled for the pre-election months in the various sections of New York City, at which the main state candidates will speak, will be held Friday, August 12, in the Upper Bronx, Brownsville and Lower Manhattan.

William W. Weinstein, candidate for the U. S. Senate, will be the main speaker at the lower Manhattan central demonstrations, to be held at Seventh Street and Avenue B. Israel Anther, candidate for Governor, will speak at the Brownsville demonstration at Hopkins and Pitkin Avenues, Moises Origlin, candidate in the 24th Congressional district, will be the main speaker at the Upper Bronx demonstration, to be held at 174th St. and Vyse Ave.

These demonstrations, to be held at eight o'clock, will be the rallying points to which workers will march from mobilization open-air meetings in various parts of the districts.

SEC'YSTIMSON IN WARNING TO JAPANESE

Imperialist Clash Grows Over Control of China

SITUATION TENSE

U. S. Prates of Peace; Prepares for War

Japanese officials are reported to have expressed sharp resentment over Stimson's speech on the radio Monday night. The Japanese Embassy at Washington has been instructed by Tokyo to send a detailed report on the speech.

In a speech over the radio on Monday night, U. S. Secretary of State Stimson attacked the present Japanese challenge against American dollar control of China as manifested especially in Japan's military preparations to invade and seize North China.

Stimson re-stated the American policy of the so-called "Open Door" in China. He threatened Japan with a re-opening of the whole question of the Japanese seizure of Manchuria, which the Wall Street government, together with the League of Nations, formerly supported on the basis that the Japanese would use Manchuria as a jumping-off board for armed intervention against the Soviet Union. He referred to the Kellogg "peace pact" which the Japanese have treated with the utmost contempt as "more than a mere gesture."

He spoke glibly of the "renunciation" of war while covering up the fact that the Wall Street Government is today engaged in war on the people of Nicaragua, Haiti and other Latin American countries, as well as against its unemployed workers and war veterans, while at the same time rushing gigantic preparations for a new world slaughter, directed mainly against the Soviet Union but aimed also at a revision of the world.

"A nation which sought to mask imperialistic policy under the guise of protection of its own nationals would soon be unmasked."

In his efforts to conceal from the American masses the real motive of Wall Street's opposition to the Japanese plans to seize North China, Stimson hypocritically presented the Wall Street Government as "defending" China's territorial integrity and "leading" the struggle for peace. He referred to his notification to Japan on January 7 that the United States would not recognize the Japanese seizure of Manchuria, but maintained discreet silence on the previous support given by the Wall Street government to the Japanese occupation of Manchuria. His speech is aimed to force the Japanese back to the original tacit understanding for an immediate attack on the Soviet Union and away from their challenge to American loot in North China.

NEW YORK.—Jones and Ferrari, arrested at the unemployed demonstration held in City Hall Park, April 21, are to be tried by Judge Morris Koenig, today in General Sessions Court 2, City Hall.

These two workers, who were part of the delegation sent to demand unemployment insurance for the unemployed, were beaten with several others by the police when arrested.

The International Labor Defense urges the workers to fill the court.

Labor Defense Obtains Reduction of Bail in Case of Sam Weinstein

NEW YORK.—Having succeeded in having the bail for Samuel Weinstein, held in the Bronx county jail on a frame-up manslaughter charge, reduced from \$50,000 to \$25,000, the International Labor Defense announced yesterday that it will press for a further reduction in the bond in order to bring about the worker's release.

Weinstein, leader of the Muskin furniture strike in Brooklyn, was arrested and charged with the murder of the wife of a scab, Weissglass, in the Bronx. The framed-up worker at the time was in Brooklyn, miles away from the scene.

Weissglass, who is taking an active part in the frame-up of Weinstein, has a bad record among the workers, causing dissension among them and fighting militant, united front actions against the bosses. Moreover, they charge that Weissglass who was with his wife at the time of the alleged attack, had frequently mistreated her. On several occasions, the workers declare, she was forced to leave him.

Although the trouble became known to the I.R.T. at 9:26 a. m., the company permitted trains to proceed south from 14th St. into the danger zone for hours thereafter.

Even before "investigations" were under way, officials of the I. R. T. were quick to excuse themselves from all responsibility by announcing that a "careless workman's pick" had caused the short circuit which resulted in the fire.

The choking smoke in the trains drove hundreds of passengers to emergency exits through black-gas-filled tunnels, as gasping for air — they struggled to safety.

Women screamed and children wept as the trains, filled with the deadly fumes, crawled at a snail's pace to the stations. Scores bitterly denounced the I.R.T. for its criminal action in permitting the trains to proceed into the danger zone.

Partial service on the line was resumed only after three and one half hours.

The entire metropolitan press yesterday was filled with official press "handouts" of the I. R. T. seeking to evade responsibility for the fire and the suffering which resulted.

LAWRENCE, Mass., Aug. 9.—

The second time since he opened his campaign tour, William Z. Foster, Communist candidate for president, was arrested when he attempted to speak here last night from an automobile at the City Hall Plaza, where 3,000 workers gathered to hear him.

He was charged with "obstructing a highway" and "disturbing the peace." Later he was released on bail.

The meeting last night followed the action of the Lawrence mill owners in exerting pressure against the owner of the Colonial Theatre to close the place to Foster who was to have spoken there last Saturday night. A protest meeting attended by more than 500 was at once held in another meeting, and the workers told that "permit or no permit" Foster would speak in the city Monday night.

Go to City Council.

A delegation was selected which yesterday morning created a stormy session at the City Council by demanding a permit for the meeting at the City Hall Plaza and exposing the role of the mill owners in barring working class meeting in the city.

Samuel Bramhall, for whom 1,200 workers voted when he ran for mayor in the last election, was the spokesman of the workers' committee. He is now a candidate for the city councilman and head of the wcl.

Von Papen Threats Death Penalty As Cabinet Meets to Deal with Emergency

Armed Nazis Spread Terror Throughout Reich, Kill Communist, Socialist Workers in Homes

DENY HITLER WILL BE GERMAN PREMIER

Moves On to Include Fascists in Government With Centrist-Socialist Support

BULLETIN. BERLIN, Aug. 9.—An emergency decree establishing the death penalty for those responsible of acts of terrorism and increasing all other repressive measures against "rioters" was adopted by the Reich Cabinet. The decree received the telephonic approval of President Hindenburg who is out of Berlin.

A special meeting of the German Cabinet was called by Chancellor Von Papen for the purpose of adopting "draconian measures" against terror, dispatches from Berlin indicated yesterday.

Among the measures contemplated is the death penalty for anybody "found with a gun wherever a disorder occurs resulting in a killing. Special Courts to deal with political offenders will also be established.

Intensify Fascist Terror. Fascist terror in the meantime is being intensified throughout Germany. National Socialists (fascists) arrested are later released, indicating that the measures to be adopted will not be directed to curb fascist terror but to suppress the Communist Party and prevent the workers from fighting back the attacks of the Nazis.

Rumors that Government's representatives offered the Chancellor's seat to Adolph Hitler were denied by spokesmen of Von Papen at his office. "The Chancellor does not intend to resign," they said.

Hindenburg Arrives Today. President Hindenburg is expected in Berlin today to decide the fate of the present Von Papen Government. It is reported that he does not intend to dismiss Von Papen. Several reasons are advanced for this. First of all it is argued that the President intends to keep the Government "above political parties" second, Hitler as Chancellor would create international "apprehension" by conferring a governmental seal on the fascist militia, which at present is not considered as part of Germany's armed forces.

Ready to Include Nazis in Cabinet. The Center Party, headed by former Chancellor Bruening, is reported ready to support a new cabinet including Nazis. It is stated therefore that although Hitler may not be the Chancellor of the Government, he and three or four of his associates will hold important offices when the Cabinet will be re-organized.

Socialists for "Strong Government." The socialists are silent and their silence is interpreted as indicating that they will support "a strong government" which, as Hindenburg claims, will be "above parties" and will restore order.

The fact that the socialists joined the Nationalists in demanding emergency measures "against terror," which in reality is part of the drive to suppress the Communists, is also considered as meaning that they will support Von Papenism.

VICTIM OF FORD MASSACRE DIES

Williams, Negro, Was Clubbed and Gased

DETROIT, Aug. 9.—Arrangements are being made for a mass funeral, for Curtis Williams, a Negro worker who was gassed and clubbed in the Ford hunger march on March 7 and who died Sunday as a result of the gassing. Williams was born in Kentucky 37 years ago and lived in Detroit for 22 years. He was a former Ford worker and also worked at the Cadillac, Hudson and Chalmers plants. He was arrested twice, once for distributing leaflets and once for turning on the electricity for an evicted family. Comrade Williams was an ex-soldier. He had been in the hospital since March 13.

The body will lie in state at Ferry Hall, from where it will be taken for burial on Saturday.

SHOE STRIKERS WIN ONCE MORE

Victory at Riverside in 3 Weeks' Struggle

NEW YORK.—The strike at the Riverside Slipper Co., conducted by the Shoe and Leather Workers Industrial Union was settled yesterday. This was an organized shop before the strike. The boss maneuvered to break the ranks through all sorts of provocations. The climax was reached when one of the firm's agents created disturbances in the shop by fighting and intimidating the workers. Though a worker like the rest and a member of the union, this individual was trying to break up the organization to suit his own ambitious ends.

The boss was forced after three weeks of strike to admit his defeat and recognize the shop committee. One of the main conditions in this settlement was that this very individual who was the cause of the strike shall not go back to work before his case is taken up with the union's executive who will decide whether he is to go back on the job or not.

Three Strikes Remain. Three more strikes are now carried on by the union. The Princely Slipper Co., 5-Star Shoe Co. and Werman and Son.

Elect Delegates Now for Unemployed Conference on Monday!

WORKER ORGANIZATIONS SHOULD SEND THE MOST ABLE, ACTIVE MEMBERS

Delegates Will Lead Struggle for Jobless Relief After the Conference

Session Will Plan and Start Organizing for Huge Bread Parade on September 10

NEW YORK.—A city conference representing all workers' organizations to which unions, both of the A. F. of L. and of the Trade Union Unity League, also workers' fraternal, sports, defense, ex-servicemen, mutual and benefit organizations are invited to send delegates, will meet Aug. 13 at Manhattan Lyceum to plan a huge Bread Parade.

The Unemployed Council, calling this conference, specifies that delegates also should be elected from block committees, bread lines, flop houses and relief agencies.

Elect Active Fighters
And these are not to be just delegates who attend one meeting and do nothing more. The organizations are to choose as their delegates active fighters, who will take over leadership of the struggle for unemployment insurance and immediate cash relief, no evictions, no discrimination, no more red tape questionnaire system, no forced contributions from those still working, etc.

Other demands the conference will probably make are that children of the jobless be fed in the schools, that armories and vacant buildings be opened to the jobless, that public work in the form of construction of workers' dwellings be started at once.

No Wage Cut
The Unemployed Council, and doubtless the conference also, are strictly against raising this money by any "voluntary wage cut" such as Mayor Walker proposes. "The Unemployed Council demands the money be raised by turning over to the \$200,000,000 city funds now slated to be given the bankers for "debt service" to unemployed relief instead.

The Unemployed Council demands the salaries of Walker and his highly paid officials be cut to \$3,500 a year. Walker now gets \$40,000, besides gifts from Block and others. Ten dollars a week cash relief to each jobless family of two, with \$3 additional for each dependent, and at least \$1 a day for single unemployed workers, is demanded.

Payment of the soldiers' bonus and better government work funds to the unemployed relief are some of the demands that will be made on the national government in addition to demands on the city government.

Parade Sept. 10

ENTIRE NANKING CABINET RESIGNS; CENSOR NEWS

Rats Flee Rising Tide of Communism

The entire Cabinet of the Nanking government resigned yesterday afternoon, following an unbroken series of victories by the Chinese Red Army and a new upsurge of mass anger against the government's refusal to resist the Japanese invasion of Jehol while waging war against the Chinese workers and peasant Red Army. Chiang Kai-shek, Wall Street tool, is also "threatening" to resign. George E. Sokolsky, bourgeois "expert" on the Far East, told the Institute of Politics yesterday that the success of the Communist movement in the Yangtze Valley was inevitable.

The Nanking Government yesterday clamped down a military censoring on news of the terrific battle raging in Hupeh Province, where the Chinese Red Army is attacking the main Nanking army, under Chiang Kai-shek, on a front of more than 200 miles. The battle has been going on for more than a week. The latest reports from Hupeh stated that the Nanking line was cracking at several points, and that many Nanking soldiers were throwing down their arms while others were going over wholesale to the Red Army.

Russell Owen, Shanghai correspondent of the New York Times, in a dispatch to his paper yesterday on the rapid growth of Communism indicates that the battle is still going in favor of the workers and peasants Red Army. He reports Nanking officials as admitting that the growth of the Chinese Communist Power "cannot be stopped by armies."

356 Delegates Vote Support to Struggle Against Imperialist War

Jeer Down Trotskyite Attack on World Congress, Expose Renegade Attempt at Sabotage

NEW YORK.—Packing the auditorium of the Labor Temple, 356 delegates, representing 200 labor and fraternal organizations of New York State, voted overwhelmingly at a conference Monday night to support the World Congress Against War.

The conference, held under the auspices of the American Committee for the World Congress Against War, elected the following four delegates to the World Congress, which convenes in Europe on August 27: Johnson, a Negro ex-serviceman and member of Post 2 (Harlem) Workers Ex-Servicemen's League; Joseph Roth, a metal worker of Ithaca, N. Y., a member of the Socialist Party and also a member of the Ithaca branch of the Friends of the Soviet Union; J. MacFarland, a member of the Marine Workers Union, and S. J. Stamba, of the Workers Ex-Servicemen's League.

Trotskyite Attack
A resolution offered by Trotskyites attacking the World Congress as "pacifist" and advocating the convocation of another congress which would include the Second (Socialist) International, the Amsterdam (Labor Reformist) International, and the Anarcho-Syndicalist International (?), was jeered down by the conference and overwhelmingly defeated. It was regarded by the conference as an attempt to sabotage the Congress Against War and cover up the treachery of the socialist officialdom on the question of the struggle against war.

The resolution adopted by the Conference called upon the World Congress to unify all those who are sincerely opposed to war into a world-wide front against imperialist war. It called upon the workers to prevent the manufacture and shipment of munitions against the Chinese people and the Soviet Union.

McGRADY TRIES TO HERD SCABS IN FUR SHOPS

Furriers Mass Meet at Cooper Union Tonight to Hit Plan

NEW YORK.—The dogskin fur strike, involving close to 1,600 workers, has so completely paralyzed this section of the trade that the bosses are now practically on their knees before the workers of the Industrial Union.

The effectiveness of the strike was revealed yesterday following a meeting of the Fur Trimmers Association. At this meeting the fur bosses drafted a letter to McGrady, head of the International Furriers Union, advising him that if he did not supply scabs at once to work the struck shops they (the bosses) would cancel their agreement with him and settle with whomever they saw fit.

McGrady has been busy throughout the day attempting to herd scabs into the struck shops and to stop the Industrial Union from forcing the bosses into a no wage-cut agreement. The task of the furriers now is to hold their ranks solid and prevent McGrady's scabs from entering the shops. The picket lines must be strengthened in front of all fur
