



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

> Third-A general truculent attitude toward the American Federation of Labor, overlooking the fact that the trade unionist, with a limitation of soundest thinkers in the Socialist apprenticeships and other protecting walls, is in the enjoyment of what society; hence, is bourgeois, and opsociety. LECTURE ON ASTRONOMY

(From Everett Evening Herald)

A large and attentive audience was given a lecture at socialist party headquarters on California street last night, when Maynard Shipley presented an intensely interesting talk on astronomy and the economy of the planetary constellations swinging through space. The lecture was illustrated by a fine set of stereopticon pictures, slides made through the most powerful telescopes in the world, and revealing a great many things concerning this and other planets and their relations to one another and cooperating influences.

By means of drawings the comparative distances between the earth and planets around the sun was made plain. An especially interesting photograph was one showing the makeup of the surface of the moon, and another gave an explanation of the ocean tides by showing how the moon revolving about the earth by its attraction draws the water of the oceans after it.

The evolution of planets from gases was explained in detail by the speaker, so far as known.
