SHOWING THEIR HAND.

Republican and Democratic Anarchists Order out troops against the Miners.

THAT WHITEHOUSE CONFERENCE.

On Wednesday Oct. 1, the President Invited Mitchell, of the Mine Workers, and the coal presidents to meet him in conference to discuss a proposition for settling the strike.

On Thursday Oct. 2, a prominent Wall Street broker sent on private wires, the following message:

"I have information that the coal strikewill end in five days and in favor of the operators. This arbitration by the president is only a FAKE so that they can put it through quick." = ==

It matters not whether the Presidentwas a party to the trick, or whether the telegram was simply a Wall Street gambler's lie to force the "market" or not. Be that as it may:

THE CONFERENCE WAS A SHAM.

But why was it called? WE WILL OVER LOOK THE FACT THAT THE PRESIDENT HAD LOST THE CONFIDENCE OF THE PEOPLE BY HIS CHANGING ATTI-TUDE TOWARD PROMINENT QUESTIONS, INCLUDING THE TARIFF: AND GRANT THAT HE CALLED THE CONFERENCE IN ALL SERIOUS-NESS, AND HOPED THAT HE MIGHT PUT AN END TO THE BITTER STRUGGLE, AND CONSIDER WHY HE SHOULD WANT THE STRIKE

From pulpit, press and platform men were demanding the "government"

THAT WAS GIVING THE SOCIALISTS ACHANCE TO POINT OUT THE FACT THAT NOTHING BUT THE WORKING CLASS OWNERSHIP OF THE MINES, TOGETHER WITH ALL THE OTHER NECESSARIES OF LIFE, CAN SOLVE THE LABOR PROBLEM.

Such information was getting too general. Socialism was becoming a topic of every day conversation.

And that was disturbing the capitalist class, which controls the government, not only at Washington, but everywhere.

Something had to be done to suppress the spirit of the working class. So the President called upon the representatives of the coal mines to said to the President:

John Mitchell delivered this message, ordered by a majority vote of the United Mine Workers:

Confident of our ability to demonstrate to any impartial tribunal the equity of our demands for higher wages and improved environment, we propose that the issues culminating in this strike shall be referred to you and a tribunal of your own selection, and agree to accept your award upon all or any of the questions involved

Following the miners' offer, WHICH WAS SO CONCILIATORY AS TO THE HANDS OR THEIR ENEMIES-THE CAPITALIST CLASS-PRES! DENT BAER, THE MOST SUCCESSFUL INCARNATION OF CAPITAL ISM THAT EVER CAME TO EARTH, HISSED THESE WORDS INTO PRE-SIDENT ROOSEVELT'S FACE:

"The duty of the hour is not to waste time negotiating with the fomenters of this anarchy and insolent defiance of law but as was done in the war of rebellion-restore the majesty of the law, the only guardian of a free

people, and to reestablish peace at anycost. The next was a little advice to the President by John Markle, an inde-

pendent operator, who claims to represent the men he has robbed: "If you desire anthracite coal to be placed in the market quickly take the necessary steps at once and put the federal troops in the field and give to those desiring to work proper protection. You do this (the citizens of the United States, whom I represent, seem to feel that they have a right to ask this of you) and I will assure you that anthracite coal will be rapidly placed in the market to relieve the seriousness of the situation."

Another one of the anarchists who wanted the miners shot into submisn was W. H. Truesdale. He told the President his duty:

"It is first and foremost our duty and we take this occasion to state it and press it upon your consideration and through you upon that of the aua, to insist upon it that the existing conditions of anarchy and lawlessness, of riot and rapine, a condition which has been raging with more or less violence throughout the anthracite regions during the past five months, be immediately and permanently suppressed.
