More Military Training For Workers' Children

THE Gugenheim Foundation for the Promotion of Aviation, an organization controlled by one of the biggest bosses in the United States, has called a conference of 15,000 school superintendents for the purpose of introducing compulsory training in aviation in the Public and High Schools.

I was confidentially informed by one of the Lieutenants that the commander told him to organize the Guards immediately so as to counteract "such un-American organizations as the Children's Committee for Miners Relief, the Young Pioneers and the like." Also that the "children must be tought to be loyal and fight against lazy strikers." These were the instructions of the commander to the Lieutenants.

Already over 30 children left the Guards after they were told by Pioneers what the Guards are and what their purpose is. We are going to fight this strike-breaking scab organization to the finish

Our Fight Against Unemployment

CHILDREN of the unemployed! Workers' and Farmers' Children of America!

Nearly four million workers are out of a job today in the U. S. A.

Millions of families are suffering from hunger, cold and worse because the fathers and mothers cannot find jobs. Millions of children have to go to school ragged and hungry, have to suffer sickness and disease, because their parents are unemployed and get no wages.

Why is there this unemployment? Because the bosses have had so much prosperity, they have squeezed so much profit out of the workers that now they cannot sell all the workers have produced, so they fire the workers and let them starve. Because the workers have produced so much food they must now go hungry; because they have produced so much clothes they must now go ragged; because they have produced so much good things they must now be miserable. This is because we have in America a bosses system, where everything is for the benefit of the bosses and where the workers always get the worst of it. And yet many teachers have the nerve to tell us that there is unemployment because the workers are "lazy" or "obstinate", that it is the fault of the workers that they can get no work.

There are hundreds of thousands of little children in this country working at the jobs that grown-up workers should work at. These children work at wages below the wages of grown-up workers. In this way the poor children are being squeezed for the profit of the bosses and the older workers are out of jobs.

Conditions are becoming worse and worse. The children of the unemployed, the children of all workers and farmers, must get together to fight to help the children whose parents are out-of-work. The government cares nothing about the poor children because the government is for the rich we must put up a big fight against the government if we expect to get anything.

The Young Pioneers of America propose that all the children of the unemployed, all workers and farmers children, should get together to fight for the following things:

- 1. All child labor must be abolished and the children supported by the government.
- 2. Stations for giving out free food and clothing to the children of the unemployed must immediately be set up in the schools. These stations must be under the control of labor and parents.
- 3. The schools must be made into recreation centers for the children of the unemployed so that they won't have to stay in their miserable cold homes while their fathers and mothers are looking

for work. These recreation centers must be under the control of children, the parents and labor.

- 4. There must be free medical treatment for the children of the unemployed in the school.
- 5. There must be no teachings or propaganda against the unemployed or against the workers in the schools.

All together to fight for these things! Remember: Only by fighting all together can we defend our interests.

AL SMITH THROWS SOME BULL

By I. S., New York City ▲LFRED SMITH, governor of the state of New York and candidate for president, was the "guest of honor" at a dinner given by the Guggenheim Foundation at which 1200 newsboys were present.

The chief point made by the governor in his speech was that a newsboy in the U.S.A. has the best chances becoming millionaire. He a "forgets" that millions of children go to school hungry because their parents get such low wages or are out of work altogether. He "forgets" that there are over three and a half million child laborers in the U.S. A.

Governor Smith also "forgets" that these same newsboys who are going to become millionaires make about 40 cents a night. They are often forced to stay out as late as three o'clock in the morning to get their measly pay. The governor of our "glorious state" also knows that the poor children are forced to go to overcrowded schools, schools that are fire-traps.

These are the "opportunities" that the children have in the U.S.A. For these "opportunities" we should all be "grateful" — yes by joining the Young Pioneers and fighting against child labor, against bad school conditions.

THE "POOR" TRACTION MILIONAIRES

THE poor traction millionaires feel they are starving and not making enough money for a few more Rolls Royces and country homes and therefore they decided they must raise the fare on I. R. T. in New York to 7 cents.

The I. R. T. subway and elevated have the worst service in New York. The trains are always packed so that you can't even breathe. In the summer it's always too hot and in the winter it's always cold altho the law says they must have a temperature of 68 degrees. The dogs of the traction magnates are treated better than the people.

The I. R. T. workers are also treated terribly. They are not allowed to have a union of their own. The I. R. T. has a fake "union" called a company union; if the workers don't want to belong to it but want to belong to a real union they are fired.

The workers in New York will support the subway workers who want a real union and better wages and conditions.

My father didn't draw more than \$30 to \$35 in two weeks. But some workers don't even work at all.

Here in this small town one worker had six children and didn't have any work. So he asked the city for help but he didn't get it. So he went crazy and killed himself and his wife. And his six poor children are left to starve.

But even the conditions are bad here we are trying to help the children of the striking miners.

CLUB & SCHOOL PAGE

There are many kinds of organizations of workers children in the U. S. A. There are workers schools for children, like the Finnish workers schools, or the Jewish Non-Partisan Workers Schools, or the Lithuanian schools. There are children's clubs connected with workers organizations. There are clubs of the children of union members connected with the unions, as for example, in New York, the children of the Window Cleaners, the Bakers; in the mining region, the Children's Strike Clubs; and so on. Then there are sports clubs and athletic clubs and many other kinds of clubs.

These clubs, schools and organizations are very important because there are many thousands of workers children in them. Lenin's Rules for Pioneers say: "A Pioneer organizes the children around him. He takes part in the life and interests of these Children." Wherever there are workers children the Pioneers must be; wherever there are workers children the Pioneers must lead.

POLICE BREAK UP MEETING OF STRIKERS CHILDRENS CLUB

THE children of the mining region have formed clubs which they call Strikers' Childrens' Clubs. The children in these clubs learn how to help their fathers in the strike. Anything wrong with that! No, in fact its quite a good idea. However the policed don't seem to have the same opinion. Of course not! The police are the servants of the bosses and they don't want the children to organize.

When 200 children of striking miners of Avella, Pa., came to hold their meeting on Saturday, March 10, the police came along and broke it up. Their excuse was that an injunction had been issued prohibiting all mass meetings. Childrens club meetings are not mass meetings but the police are only hired thugs of the bosses and since the strikers' Childrens' Club meetings are likely to harm the bosses, that excuse is as good as any other.

But the miners' children will not be frightened. We will continue to organize Strikers' Childrens' Clubs.
