PIONEERS TAKE PART IN DEMONSTRATION AGAINST WALL ST.

ROSE PLOTKIN JAILED

On July 3rd just before the anniversary of the independence of the American colonies from British rule, the Pioneers took part in a demonstration of the All American Anti-Imperialist League held on Wall Street. Wall Street is to-day the center of the American imperialists who are oppressing the workers not only of America, but of China, Nicaragua and other American colonies.

Pioneers Clubbed

The Pioneers sure took an active part in the demonstration, carrying posters But very soon down came the signs, clubs falling on the heads of workers and the Pioneers present. And then the arrests began. Fifteen workers were packed off to jail.

Rosie Plotkin Dragged To Jail

Rosie was distributing leaflets and a great big husky policeman dragged off Rosie to jail. It is nearly a whole week now and Rosie is still being held at the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children—a very fancy name for a jail.

Pioneers of New York Protest

Rosie Plotkin is one of the most active Pioneers in the New York District and is a member of the District Executive Committee. It is only because Rosie is a Pioneer that was fighting for the good of the workers that the courts are holding her in jail.

The courts are going to jail Rosie so as to prevent all workers' children from taking part in demonstrations or holding meetings.

We demand the right for workers' children to take part in labor struggles and demonstrations.

We demand the abolition of the "Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children"—an agency of the bosses to jail workers' children.

BILL HAYWOOD

A comrade, who stood for the true revolutionary spirit, died early last month in Moscow after a severe illness of several years duration.

William D. Haywood was a leader of the American workers in historical struggles and always carried on his work in the face of danger and imprisonment. A proof that he was not afraid is the fact that he spent many years of his life in American jails and a twenty four year sentence was pending when he left for Russia.

He was a true worker, his parents having been workers and himself was forced to go to work in a coal mine at the age of 9 to help support his family.

At first he was a member of the Industrial Workers of the World and was one of the pioneers in the revolutionary movement, but later on he became a Communist. Six years ago he left for Russia where he remained until his death early last month.

"Big Bill" fought for the workers. He led them thru many important strikes and struggles. He suffered for them having been sentenced to innumerable jail terms all because he dared to raise his voice in defence of his class,

The capitalist class is still in power. The workers are still being oppressed. Let us carry the fight of Bill Haywood against the bosses, our oppressors, and free the workers from their chains.

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FERRY BOOTBLACKS SLAVE

I am a Pioneer working as a bootblack on a ferry. The bootblacks are about 14 to 16 years old. We begin to work at 7:00 A. M. and finish at 8:00 P. M. We have no lunch hour but have to eat when there is nothing to do. We work seven days in the week and get from \$1.00 to \$1.50 a day. The porter comes at 10.00 A. M. and that means that we have to sweep the boat every trip for three hours. When the porter comes, he begins cleaning and mopping the upper deck. This takes about two hours and during that time we have to keep on cleaning cabin. Every other day we have to mop the floor and clean the windows.

The ferry bootblacks must demand a union, more pay, less hours of work, one hour for lunch and no extra porter work.

THE LIFE IN UNION CITY

RENTON, Pa.—Our lives in the barracks are very hard. We have gone thru many hard struggles. When men attend some special meetings they get beaten up by the yellow dog state troopers.

We children don't have any fun in the barracks. We have no place to enjoy ourselves. The space between the barracks is very narrow and the owner of the ground on which we live, doesn't allow us to play in the fields, because he uses them for pasture. We can't play on the roads, and we children, as Pioneers, don't want to play with no yellow dogs.

In the winter we were very cold. In the summer it is terribly hot. All different kinds of bugs crawl thru the cracks in the barracks dirty the clothes, bite our hands, faces or bare feet (most of us don't have shoes).

We have only one good pump for all Union City. The pump usually goes dry every Monday and Tuesday unless there's rain. We don't have very much place to hang our clothes to dry either.

Our rooms are small and we are all crowded together like in chicken coops and lots of children are sick.

We soon will be starving to death. But we have only one hope. That is—that the workers and the workers' children will come to our help. We are fighting hard, as hard as we can. But you must help us fight until we win!

MAY DAY ACTIVITIES IN OUR SCHOOL

York Children's When the New Conference raised the slogan "Out of School on May Day" we, the Pioneers of "61" were the first to carry out this slogan. In order to do this the Pioneers of "61" and the Pioneer District Committee issued many different leaflets and stickers. The Pioneers of this unit got about 150 stickers to be posted about the school. When the Pioneers stuck these about the building the next day, the teachers began to gossip about the Pioneers, and tried to persuade the children to come to school on May Day. So we also gave out leaflets telling why workers' children should stay out of The children were eager to read the leaflets. Many leaflets were confiscated by the teachers and moni-

The next day the Principal declared in the auditorium that very important tests would be given next Tuesday, May FIRST. Every person absent willfully would be unconditionally failed for the month of April. So on Monday the Pioneers distributed a leaflet showing the children that the tests were only a scheme to keep the children in school and that the tests would not count anything. That afternoon, at 4:15, we were to have an open air meeting, but, as usual, it was broken up by the loyal monitors and members of the Honor League.

May first, the Pioneers gathered before the school at 8:30 A. M., picketed the school with slogans, and wried to persuade the children to stay out. We gave out many leaflets, and the child-

ren grabbed them. The police stationed around the school, took the leaflets, and took the pioneers distributing them to the Principal. We were brought to the Police Station and one of the Pioneers was lodged under \$100 bail. The next Friday the case was tried and the Pioneers were freed with a warning to the head culprit who was under bail, "If I was not feeling so durned purty today I would instertute deportation proceedings agin ye!" he chewed out. At least that was what it sounded like.

But we didn't care at all. We brought more than 100 children down to Madison Square Garden where the big May Day demonstration was taking place and we felt that we had proven that we are "Always Ready"—


And do you know that the Socialist Party is against the workingclass government in Soviet Russia!

Big pot bellies, bass drum bellies roll in in private cars and gorgeous limousines to Kansas City. There's prosperity in America—there sure is for the rich!

The chief figures, the biggest bosses pull the wires. Andy Mellon—the big financier! Ask the starving miners 'children. They know Mellon—he who owns numberless coal mines but starves hundreds of thousands of children,—he, whose gunmen have clubbed to death men, women and children. He's the big boss at this convention. And ask the New Bedford striking textile workers—they know William E. Butler—the textile magnate. He, who feeds on the blood of the children and fattens on 10% wage cuts, he's the chairman here.



The Democrats

On to Houston! But what a terrible sight. The body of a negro worker lynched by a bunch of half crazed negro hating Democrats within sight of the Convention Hall.

The same pot-bellies, the same bass drum bellies. No one pays any attention to the needs of the workers or the poor farmers.

But back in Wall Street the big bosses sit and feel proud and calm. "Al's our pal", they say. It makes no difference who gets into office,—the Republicans or the Democrats.

And they nominate Al Smith. And he cries—"No corruption in government. No graft!" But the workers know Al Smith's record! They know the sewer graft in Queens, they know the milk grafts, the street cleaning grafts and all the dirty dealings of Tammany. And they know the injunctions issued in Democratic New York against the furriers and cloak makers—and they know the brutality of the "Democratic" police.

The Workers (Communist) Party!

"I sure had a hard time getting here. I hitch-hiked most of the way and even rode the freights, but I'm glad I'm here, because the Workers (Communist) Party is the only party that fights for the workers" said a Negro worker from Seattle, Washington.

Workers from all over the country—striking miners, striking textile workers, exploited young workers, poor farmers, negroes, working women and the Young Pioneers—all are here.

Delegate after delegate speaks about the suffering and misery of the workers, about the fight against the bosses ,about the struggle for freedom.

The convention adopts a platform. Every line of it is for the interests of the workers. The Workers (Communist) Party issues the call for the workers to rally round the fight against the bosses.

The convention nominates Foster for president and Gitlow for vice-president, the banner carriers for the party. A mighty wave of applause!

Cheering for Foster, the leader and organizer of the steel workers, organizer of the fighting left wing in the trade unions, one of the leading comrades of the Party. Gitlow, leader of the needle trade workers—he who served a jail sentence because he fought for Communism. And more cheering—cheering for the Workers (Communist) Party the leader of the workers and poor farmers in America. And still more cheering—for the struggle of the workers until victory.

And a Pioneer yells—Long live the workers' government of Soviet Russia! For a workers 'and farmers' government in America!

All the delegates have a good time. But for about five minutes they listen to the speech of the representatives of William Green (president of the American Federation of Labor) who has come to beg them and to implore them. The workers can get nothing by begging. We must fight if we are going to win anything from this horde of grafters!

And they nominate Hoover—he who smashed the revolution of the Hungarian workers with his "relief", he who left the poor and the negroes and their children in the flood areas uncared for. But he's a good boy! He'll obey the orders of the real bosses! He'll make just as good a job for them as Cal Coolidge did. There will be lots more of Teapot Dome scandals—millions and millions of dollars robbed from the workers—lots more strikebreaking lots more plundering and robbing of the workers.

If any workers or poor farmers had hoped that the Republicans would do anything for them, this convention should teach them the truth.

FIGHT TO FREE PORTER!

Last week, Comrade John Porter, the 19 year old leader of the textile strikers of New Bedford was arrested for leading a picket line and now he is being held for court martial as a deserter of the army.

Comrade Porter is the organizer of the Young Workers (Communist) League in New Bedford. Comrade Porter knew the police were after him because this was the fifth time he was arrested and each time the police warned him that they would "get him if he didn't stop leading them picket lines". But this did not stop Comrade Porter from doing his duty to his fellow workers and comrades.

Now they have thrown our brave comrade into jail and have put him at hard labor ten hours a day for 7 days a week. But the government with its jails cannot break the spirit of Comrade Porter as this message which he sent back from prison shows:

"I deserted the U. S. Army because I discovered that it was against the working class and controlled by the capitalists. I now regret that I did not remain in the army to win over my fellow soldiers for the working class. For a working class army fighting for the freedom of the workers, I am ready to give my life."

Comrade Porter is threatened with a sentence of life long imprisonment. The bosses want to break the strike of the textile workers and so they are trying to railroad our comrade to jail. The workers of New Bedford are organizing a defense committee to save Comrade Porter from the bloody paws of American "justice".

BOSSES' "JUSTICE"

Recently in a New Jersey watch factory there arose a situation which exposed "justice in America".

Five girls, workers in a watch factory are slowly dying. They were poisoned by radium which they used in the making of watches. This happened because they had to point the brushes, which had on them this poisonous substance by putting the brushes in their mouths. They cannot live longer than one year. They are suing the company for \$250,000 each, but the greedy bosses don't care for workers' lives. They refuse even to pay the workers when they give up their lives so that the bosses can make profits.

The matter has been taken to court but since the bosses control the courts, the court has delayed the trial. By the time the court takes action the five girls will have died.

This is what happens in the land of capitalist justice.

OBREGON — WALL STREET'S FRIEND

General Obregon was elected President of Mexico with no one running against him in the elections. Two other candidates who ran against him were "conveniently" killed. The American bosses are happy over the election.

The U. S. Ambassador Morrow, the agent of John P. Morgan, is a good friend of Obregon, the newspapers report. The Mexican workers and peasants can only expect more suffering and oppression under his rule.

LOLLY POPS TO FOOL THE WORKERS CHILDREN

LENIN AND THE CHILDREN

N her "Reminiscences of Lenin" the great German Communist, Clara Zetkin, tells of a talk she had with Lenin in 1922 and how at that time Lenin received a letter from a group of children. Here is the story as she tells it.

"A few days before Lenin had received a letter from an out-ofthe-way little village. About a hundred children wrote to him:

Dear Granddaddy Lenin; We want to tell you that we have become very good children. We are studying hard. We are already able to read and write and are doing many good things. We wash ourselves every

morning and wash our hands when we eat. We want to make our comrade teacher pleased with us and it is not good to be dirty.

"You see, Clara, said Lenin, "we are making successes in all fields, big successes. We are learning lot of things we have to know. We are even washing ourselves every day! See, children in the little villages are taking part in building Soviet Russia. When such things take place how can we question that victory will be our side?

"And here Lenin laughed joyfully, and in this laughter there was assurance of victory."

"I don't object," thoughtfully said the principal. "I don't object but..." He looked at the teacher. "But that can not be done without permission of the school board. Fifteen of them! That seems to be too many to be expelled because of some magazine.!"

Press shook his head.


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
