

SMASH THE BOY SCOUTS

The Boy Scout Organization, a capitalist breeding ground for good servants, is arranging to celebrate its 21st Birthday. A great 'jamboree' birthday party, in which scouts from over thirty nations will entertain, is to be held at Arrow Park, Birkenhead, England.

Of the 50,000 Scouts to be present, 1,500 will represent 'American Boyhood'. They will be in charge of Mr. Lowe W. Barclay, Director of the National Department of Education.

The reason for the Jamboree, which of course the Scouts are not told, is to make the public and the boys believe that the

organization is for international brother-hood and world peace. This will make parents proud to have children join. But the great war showed this to be a lie. The Scouts of the U. S. Imperialist Government, among other things, sold over \$400,000,000 worth of 'Liberty Bonds' to carry on the war against their foreign 'brothers'. The Jamboree will also give the Scouts much newspaper advertising.

The Capitalists of all nations know the value of these misguided tools. They are all joining in the party, as in the end they will all get a big piece of cake out of it.

Labor Government is for Bosses

A few days ago we all read in the papers about the election of MacDonald by the Labor Party of Great Britain to the office of Premier of the new government. And a few days later we see that this same premier supposed to represent the workers puts into his cabinet not workers who supported him thinking that a labor government would better conditions, but such fellows who are of no use to the world, such as dukes, lords, knights and a couple of more people who we know are not friends of the workers but their enemies.

For one thing, the capitalists all over the world were not so scared and they needn't be because they know that this government will serve them as well as the old conservative government. know that this government will make sure that the capitalists will go on preparing for war, that this government will be no different from the other bosses' governments. The labor government will not stop sending troops to India to shoot at workers who are out on strike for better conditions and fighting against the miserable exploitation by British capitalists in India. The labor government will say it has already done that, they are against wars while behind the backs of the workers they will make preparations as all the other capitalist countries are doing.

The Communist Party of Great Britain took part in the campaign. They had not forgotten the struggle of the coal miners not so long ago, or the attack on the trade unions in India, neither had they forgotten the attack that was being prepared by the British government on the USSR. They showed the workers that only a revolution and the complete overthrow of the capitalist system in Great Britain would put the workers in power as in the Soviet Union. In the Soviet Union they did not put lords and other useless individuals in power but put Communists and workers who would be able to fight for the interests of the working class.

The workers children of America must learn once and for all that the only time that there will be a real workers' government is when the workers take over the whole government in their hands, drive out the capitalists and their lackeys and establish a government of, by, and for the workers.

The workers' children now more than ever can point out that these labor governments are false—that they have only the purpose of lulling the workers to sleep while the bosses are busy preparing for new wars against the workers themselves.

It is the Birkenhead Corporation that is loaning the 450 acres of Arrow Park which they purchased from Lord Leverhume for 65,00 pounds to scouts. The Trunk Line Association in the United States is giving the scouts very special rates for their trip to the port. The railroads in England have also well lowered their prices. They are willing to aid the cause of 'brotherhood', especially now that another war is loaning.

The money to be used for the 1,500 American Scouts for their little party from July 30 to August 13, amounts to \$42,500. Add to this the money Scouts will spend themselves, and we can say

\$50,000 altogether. We wonder what the children striking in the Southern Textile Mill who are driven from their homes might think of this \$50,000 'birthday' appropriation.

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FIGHT THE GASTONIA

The Loray mill strikers are gathered for a meeting. They are preparing for a mass picket demonstration at the Manville-Jenckes mill. Scattered throughout the crowd are a large number of workers children, fighting side by side with their parents in this strike. There are also many child workers, forced into the mills at a very early age, who are militantly fighting against the bosses.

But the bosses will not allow such a



huge meeting to take place. They are out to break the strike and to drive out the Union. They have hired a large number of thugs, and have gotten the aid of the American Legion. With these gangsters, they invade the demonstration, which was held on the strikers grounds. Well-armed with rifles, they fire into the crowd.

But the workers were expecting something of this sort. And they had organized a Workers Self-Defense Guard, and these workers were armed with any weapons that they could get hold of. These workers bravely fought back and defended themselves, and in the fierce fight that followed, Police Chief Aderholt was mortally wounded.

Right after this, the police arrested all of the leaders of the strike. Among these were Fred Beal, Vera Bush, Joe Harrison, and many others. But the bosses did not overlook the organizers of the children. Sophie Melvin, Edith Saunders, who had organized the workers

children to help the strike, were arrested and charged with intent to kill. Clarence Miller, the organizer of the Commun ist Youth League, and Sophie Melvin are further charged with direct murder. Comrades Sophie and Edith had led a children's picket line right after the shootings. They were seized by the police and company gangsters and choked until they were black in the face. An old woman of 65 was thrown onto the street. A child was hurled 25 feet onto the street.

Not only the meeting hall was invaded—but the tent colony in which the workers lived ever since they were thrown out of the company houses was invaded and destroyed.

In answer to this attack the workers of Gastonia, are pulling out more mills, are spreading their strike. The workers throughout the country under the leadership of the International Labor Defense are preparing to defend the strikers, to prevent the boss class of Gastonia of sending them to the electric cnair and to long terms in jail.

Workers' Children! This attack is an attack against the whole working class. We must fight back with all our power. Solidarity must be our motto! Everyone of us must put our shoulder to the wheel and carry on the fight here by RUSH-ING RELIEF!



CHICAGO PIONEERS GET REPLY FROM PATRIOTS

CHICAGO, Ill.—On the occasion of Boys' Week, established by the bosses in order to fill the workers' children with patriotic bunk, the Young Pioneers of America, local Chicago were wide awake and distributed hundreds of leaflets to the workers' children gathered at the Soldiers' Field, on May 24th.

The leaflet pointed out what Boys' Week means to the workers' child and how to best combat the patriotic bunk that they are fed on, especially during this week. The most active and reliable Pioneers of Chicago were organized for this distribution, and as reported by the Pioneers, was well received by the boys and some of the students even risked a leaflet.

However, this leaflet did not please the Patriotic "United States Flag Association" which is sponsored by the Hearst Newspapers and the following letter addressed to the Young Pioneers of Chicago was received with a flag contest circular inclosed:

"Here you Communist b.....

Take a good look at this flag and like it or we'll find ways to make you or blow you to hell where you belong.

If you know whats good for you stop handing out circulars like you did at Soldiers' Field.

You d.... Ignorant Fools."

The Chicago Pioneers are determined to answer this threat by more extensive distributions, by calling more childrens' mass meetings, by drawing in more Negro children into the organization and in general by an increased activity on the Party of every single Pioneer.

The arrested Pioneers were held in the House of Detention. The I.L.D. got them out and the case is to come up this Friday.


The Young Pioneers arrested are Benny Weiss, Nathan Dicov, Isabella Feinstone, Bella Miller, Vivian Cohen, Silvio Tisi (also a striker's child) Caroline Glass, Albert Bailen.

Also on June 10 a Pioneer, Hyman Center, was arrested while speaking in Bethlehem charged with disorderly conduct. Hymans was speaking at a meeting protesting the attack on the May First Demonstration.

The police can never break the fighting spirit of the workers' children!

FOR THE CAFETERIA STRIKERS

On June 6, three Young Pioneers were arrested for joining the picket line of the New York Cafeteria strike. The Pioneers are in jail under the custody of the Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Children and the courts are threatening them with a 6 months prison sentence. The Pioneers are Leo Shapiro, Morris Rosenblatt, and Sam Sliptzen. The International Labod Defense is defending them. The New York Pioneers have answered this arrest and confinement of our comrades by mobilizing all the Pioneers not only for the cafeteria picket line but also for the furriers strike. They will rally in hundreds for mass picketing in spite of the police brutality and their terrorist methods and show their solidarity with the young and older workers.

THE SOVIET PIONEER MEET

We have received the following schedule of the meet from the Moscow Pioneers which we know all the children will be interested in learning about.

The Pioneers will all be concentrated in one of the District camps in Moscow. The evening before the meet, the Pioneer clubs will hold meetings and entertainments so that the guests may get acquainted with the Moscow Pioneers. The meet will last 10 days and will be divided up as follows.

The first day there will be a parade and meeting on Red Square. At the parade and meeting there will be present representatives of the Communist Party of Russia, the Central Pioneer Buro, and the Central Committee of the Labor Sports Union. There will be present 5,000 Pioneers participating in the meet, 10,000 Moscow Pioneers, 5000 Pioneers representing Pioneer camps, children's homes, schools etc., and 500 representatives of adult workers from factories and other organizations.

On the second day the general conference will take place at which there will be reports from the government, the representatives of the Communist Party of Soviet Union, the Central Pioneer Buro and from Pioneer organization of the various Soviet republics and of the international representatives.

On the third day will take place the Spartakiad, which will consist of contests between teams of the various republics in games, physical culture exercises, dance, exhibition of Pioneer work, living newspapers, orchestras and choirs, Punch and Judy shows.

On the fourth day there will be various excursions to factories and museums, zoological gardens and the Kremlin.

On the fifth day there will take place some form of mass action on Lenin Hill. On the seventh day the Pioneers will take part in the International Youth Day demonstration together with the Communist Youth League.

On August first, Red Day, the day of struggle against imperialist war, our delegation of five workers' children with a leader will arrive in the Soviet Union. Our delegation will be made up of the most basic sections of the working class. We will have on the delegation a Negro child, a child worker from Gastonia, a miners child and an auto workers' child.

THREE GATHERINGS

This summer there will be held three children's delegations. The International Boy Scouts Jamboree to which tens of thousands of Scouts are being brought and which marks the 21st "birthday" of the Scout movement, is particularly important now. This Jamboree symbolizes the attempts

on the part of the capitalist class to prepare the workers' children for war and especially for the attack against the Soviet Union. From America alone 1500 Scouts are going to the Jamboree. The Congress of the U. S. has passed a bill permitting the War Department to "loan" to the Scouts 1600 cots and tents and blankets for 1600 Scouts going to the Jamboree. This is because the Boy Scouts' organization is a part of the machinery of the U. S. government for training the workers' children for the coming war.

In Vienna, Austria, there will also be a meet of children this summer. Thousands of "Red Falcons" and "Friends of the Children" will come from Austria, Germany and Czecho-Slovakia. This meet will talk "peace" and "brotherhood" but these phrases are only to put the workers' children to sleep so that they should not take an active part in the struggle of the workers' against the bosses' preparation for war and an attack on the Soviet Union.

The meet of the Pioneers of the Soviet Union, the largest children's organization throughout the entire world,, to which workers' children's delegations from the entire world are invited, will be the answer of the workers' children against the coming war and for the defense of our Soviet Fatherland.

The Soviet Union Pioneer meet is our meet. It represents the struggles of the workers' children. It represents the fight against misery and child expolitation and for a workers' and farmer's government.



When the Pioneers saw the cops tearing down the sign we raised such a protest with hissing and booing and finally filed down stairs where we again took up the protest. Of course the police didn't like that much and they arrested 9 Pioneers and 3 leaders.

Even though some of our leading comrades were in jail, the convention went on just the same with the reports as had been planned. There was a report on the tasks of the Pioneers in the coming period, and our past work, the Children's Delegation of the Soviet Union, the fight against the war danger, Summer work, Sports work, Child Labor and School work. In the discussion many Pioneers from the school groups took an active part. Many of the shortcomings and achievements of our work were discussed. The convention went on record to do more work among the Negro children, child horers, and continue our work in the school with more spirit than ever before.

Our new District Executive Committee drew in new types of workers' child ren. We have on the D.E.C. a Negro Pioneer, an Italian Newsboy and Pioneer whose father is a longshoreman and all are workers children who have been active in the Pioneer movement.

Resolutions were adopted some of which were to send a Children's Delegation to the USSR, against police brutality, for the support of the Gastonia

strikers. We decided to send a greeting to the German Pioneers in regard to their recent struggle in Berlin on May 1. We adjourned our convention with a hearty singing of the International.

★ ON THE SPORT FIELD ★

Only a very short time ago two people were trampled to death and many were hurt at a panic at the Yankee Stadium. Many of these severely hurt were workers children, out to enjoy a baseball game on a Sunday afternoon. Why were these workers children injured? Why were these two people, one a worker, killed? All because Mr. Ruppert who owns the New York Yankees did not want



to call the game off when he saw that it was going to rain. He let the game continue until more than 4½ innings had been played. Then he did not have to give the crowd of 50,000 any rain-checks, in this way making about \$50,000 for himself—and sacrificing two lives and maiming many others.

That should be a good lesson to us. Professional baseball is played for the profits of a few rich owners. It serves also to take the mind of workers off their own fight and to dope the minds of workers children. We have nothing in common with professional baseball. We stand for workers sports. That is why every workers child must do his utmost to build the Childrens' Section of the Labor Sports Union.

The bosses, who are preparing to plunge the workers of the world into a new war, are getting busy. One of their first jobs is to line up the workingclass children with them. They use sports overtime for this purpose. Only a few short weeks ago the American Legion, a strike-breaking organization that is actively helping the bosses prepare for war, together with the Everlast Sporting Company and the New York American, gave out about \$5,000 worth of sport goods free to about 10,000 workers children. They are building baseball leagues with about 200 teams-in New York City alone. They are doing this with one purpose -to fill the heads of workers children with patriotism for the bosses and to win the children away from the workingclass. We must fight this. must win the children for the workingclass. Against the American Legion baseball leagues we must build Workers' Children baseball leagues.

THE BIG

A STORY BY BONCHI FRIEDMAN

HEN ANNA WATT, a blonde girl ten years old, came near the gate of Public School No. 4, of East Pittsburgh, she noticed a red lettered circular swinging up and down in the air as if directing her thru the fog to the proper entrance. She thought abruptly: "its like a flagman on the railroad." But soon she discovered that instead of a flagman it was a browneyed youngster with a daring chin and tightly closed mouth distributing circulars. To avoid being noticed by school authorities he had hidden himself by the side of a huge trunk of a tree. The usual heavy morning fog of Pittsburgh protected even the outstretched arm of the boy, while at the same time he could easily see the approaching well-fed school principal, the nervious teachers, and the children.

Anna Watt's father was a tool-maker in one of the steel mills of the Gary Trust in Mellon's City. There were six children in the family all of whom where born and raised in the brick-red, clap-board house which did not belong to the Watts, but which was rented. The tool-maker was growing old daily. He was a conservative type of a worker. America was his country; he could vote "in" or "out" even a president of the United States. The government builds schools for his children, and charitable societies build hospitals for the sick, and to him it seemed a great thing that America was the richest country in the world. As an expert in his trade he worked ten months in each year—more than any worker in his department had worked since the war. Because of this privilege that he "enjoyed" his children were never in want.

Anna, as taught by her father, teacher and minister, knows this is a country of great opportunities. With other children she had heard the teacher's story of the rise of Andrew Carnegie from poverty to wealth. Her childish mind fancies grand palaces she so often sees in the movies where bejewelled princesses live in luxury. Why shouldn't her brother James make a fortune like Carnegie? It is possible; of course it is possible.

The red-lettered circular handed to Anna April 30th, 1926 was not the first of its kind. The tenth of November, she recalls, on the eve of Armistice Day a similar leaflet was distributed which bore slogans, "Down with War!" We don't want our fathers and brothers killed for Bosses profits!" Then there followed something about Chicago which preceded a word she did not understand. "Martyrs" it read. Even her all-knowing teacher couldn't explain the connection between Chicago and that mysetrious word, Martyrs, killed in 1886, the "Armistice," and the signature, "Young Pioneers of America."

Anna was sensitive to words like all humans are when touched by or reminded of something very hazy or painful. She remained unmoved when the Pioneer with the funny nose approached her to join their groups; but she ignored them until the last circular with its sharp slogans about hungry children, unemployment, disabled fathers, handed her by the youngster. This leaflet reminded her that her father had lost his job four months ago after he had lost his right arm from an accident. The court had awarded her father a compensation of \$10 a week for a period of three years. Mary Watt, the mother was given employment in the mill at \$15 a week and after three years, Mellon's Court said—James will be able to shift for himself

and also Anna will have graduated from public school. Anna figured "James may begin to lay the path for his Carnegie fortune by then." But now mother goes to work at seven in the morning. Father speaks of suicide. He loved his work, his family and his country. Now he can't work; his family suffers and the court of his country decided in favor of the Steel Trust when his case for compensation came up. And what hurts most—that Polack Nozinski told him before the accident: "Boss like you ven you strong—ven you sick, boss no like you no more. He trow you out and laf from you like fool."

April 30, 1926 when Anna returned from school she did exactly as ordered by the boy who gave her the circular: "Give it to your father." For

the first time she saw tears in his eyes as old Watt read the circular.

Below the outstanding slogans: "Out of School on May Day! Down tools on May Day!" he read that the Pioneers demanded social insurance for unemployed, disabled, widowed and orphaned members of the working class. "THE COUNTRY IS RICH, BUT THE WEALTH IS STOLEN BY THE CAPITALISTS. WE BUILD PALACES AND WE LIVE IN DINGY SHACKS. CHILDREN OF THE WORKERS STARVE—CHILDREN OF THE RICH DROWN IN LUXURY. DOWN TOOLS!"

In her childish bewilderment Anna grasped nevertheless the whole meaning of these words as she asked: "May I go tomorrow and march with these

Pioneers! We too are poor now."

May First. The sun conquered fog and railroad steam. Working class children marched from the Lyceum to the Ukrainian Hall increasing their numbers. Anna was among them. Shy, silent. As the refrain of the Internationale resounded in the air she opened her mouth to say—"my country." But soon she heard that different words were sung and the music was so different from the National hymn. "This is the proletarian, the working class hymn, comrade, whispered a Pioneer to her. "What, Comrade?"

A party was given. Speeches about the workers' misery were made. Anna wanted to run for her father. The speaker who had never been to her house, how did he know what had happened to the Watt family? When he concluded, Anna and other children responded to the appeal and joined

the Young Pioneers of America.

Three years of meetings, a Pioneer school, circulars, struggle and terrible poverty found Anna in possession of a letter written to the point: "THE PIONEER DISTRICT EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF PITTSBURGH HAS DECIDED THAT YOU BE ONE OF THE DELEGATES TO THE SOVIET UNION. PREPARE TO SAIL JULY 1."

Old Watt had become a reader of the Daily Worker. James worked in a steel mill, and was a member of the Communist Youth League and the mother worked 50 hours a week. The family accepted the letter as a matter

of fact and Anna was preparing to sail.

July 1st in New York, Saturday morning. The streets of the giant metropolis were burning in the terrific heat of the sun. Multitudes crowded the streets, in an effort to spend the pennies earned for a week of hard toil. The outside windows of the Communist Party building on Red Square (Union Square) were decorated red. The clatter and the chatter of hundreds of Pioneers, all with hammer and sickle emblems filled the busy square with youthful happiness.

Child Workers Back the Delegation

Children of the South are doing everything in order to help win our strike. They are fighting right beside their parents. They are organizing all the workers' children.

Children from 10 up have to work in the mills to support their family. The bosses have more children than grown

ups working, because they think they are green and know nothing. The children never get farther than the 4th grade and are never taught anything but to work for the bosses. They never heard of a strike or a union until the Union came now.

Must Pay For Books

The teacher makes you pay for the books and all the school supplies. At the end of the term you are promoted if the teacher wants you to be. You have to pay for an examination paper and if you don't you never pass your grade. At the end of each school term the teachers give you a work card and if

you are passed the 4th grade you can stay on and work without going back to school.

The work in the mills is terrible. I worked for three months in the mill before the strike. I worked from 6 in the morning until 6 at night for 6 days a When I first began to work, I got 25 cents for the first two weeks and and two days. The most I ever made in one week was \$4.00 but that was the highest I ever got. I've got a brother of 17 and he makes from \$10 to \$12 a week and the both of us have to support our family of 5 and our mother. There used to be 6 of us but one brother of 19 died of tuberculosis that he got from the cotton dust after working in the mills for two years. That's what happens to lots of the children in the mills.

Help Us Fight The Frame-Up

The frame up in Gastonia is terrible bad. The bosses are trying to have every striker they can get put in jail and charged with the murder of Chief Aderholt. They are trying everything they can think of to break the strike.ey have our children's organizers Edith and Sophie in jail. They have our relief workers in jail and are starving everyone thinking they can drive them to work, but they are still out.

For The Soviet Union

Edith and Sophie told us about the workers' children's delegation to the Soveit Union. I sure hope hat someone from Gastonia will go across in the delegation (they sure will!—editor). Down in Gastonia we children heard the truth about the Soviet Union for the first time when this strike broke out. And now we know what Bolsheviks are and we're for them and we'll fight for Soviet Russia—which is our fatherland, too.

International Red Day FIGHT AGAINST IMPERIALIST WARS!

S the war danger looms ever nearer, the preparations by the bosses for war become ever greater. The bosses are trying to use August 4th this year for the glorification of war; the Socialists, the agents of the capitalists are trying to palm off August 4th as "Peace" day. But the workers must not forget the last world war and must fight against the danger of a new world slaughter and especially the danger of an attack against the Soviet Union. For this reason August 1st has been set aside by the Communist International, the leader of the working class throughout the world as International Red Day for struggle against Imperialist War.

The workers' children are in this rush for war also being militarized in the schools and outside.
