

It was the revolutionary socialist youth that first raised the red banner in 1915 after the shameless betrayal of the international working class movement by the leaders of the second (socialist) international. When the dignified and highly erudite theoreticians and political fakers of the international went over bag and baggage in the "defense of the fatherland," when they donned knee breeches, silk hose and the badge of treason in the governments of imperialism, only a small band of rebels remained to hold aloft the banner of class struggle. Only the Russian Bolsheviks and the Italian, Marxists, together with tiny groups in the Bulkans, the Scandinavian countries, and isolated individuals here and there in England, France and Germany, remained true to their revolutionary W.W.
