Clothing Workers Toil Under Terrible Conditions

TRENTON, N. J.—The Simpson Clothing Company of 116 Factory St .. occupying the second and third floors of that building, having forced upon their employes the following unbearable conditions now have a strike de-clared against them by the workers property owners have more in comtion to treat the workers like human organized by the Amalgamated Clothing Workers.

Normally there are employed approximately 165 workers, mostly young girls who fear to enter the cloak-room, it being infested with large sewer rats. These figures are the wages of the men; the wages of the girls are considerably lower barely sufficient to provide the necessities of life. When a new season commences, after being employed two weeks and having received only one week's pay, the workers note that their wages have been reduced without being notified. And when they pleman, the manager, replies that with the installment of new equipment and alterations being made about the factory, he is not in a positien to pay the former wage and politely refers the workers to the door telling them that if they are dissatis-

SHANGHAI, China, July 20-The strike pickets at British wharves here today were dispersed by British marines firing five velleys over the heads of a great growd who came to the wharf to demand the release of coolies held by the British and forest

Firing also broke out at Chengtufu. where the British warship Teal opened fire on Chinese troops after rescuing some beleaguered missionaries and business people.

Four-Fifths of Hawaii Soldiers Sympathize With Communists

AUTHORITIES HOLD UP MAIL

The arrest and imprisonment of the ommunist soldiers, Paul Crouch and Walter Trumbull, for the crime of name their brains, has aroused much indignation among the young workers, but the courage of the two comrades in the face of heavy prison terms has also inspired much enthusiusm. A letter received by the Young Workers League of Buffalo revealed that the two young rebels are subjected to brutal treatment on the part of their imprisoners, and that their rights are being disregarded.

The Buffalo League had sent an air mail letter to Crouch and Trumbull, extending to them the greetings of the young workers of Buffalo, and congratulating them on the splendid fight they are putting up against the enslavers of the colonial people of Hawaii, and their servants, the milltary officer clique. The reply from the Red soldiers disclosed that thinking is so abborred by the rulers of this domicile of democracy that the most brutal treatment and annoyances have been inflicted upon the prisoners in an effort to break their spirit, and to frighten others who may fight imperialism. That neither of these purposes have been achieved is evident when one reads the letter. and sees the pthusiasm it evokes among the young workers. The communication is well fitted to make the "spectre of Communism" seem a little more real to the capitalist owners of America, and their numerous retainers. It follows

This letter is sent out from prison by "underground" methods. Several letters written to friends, and "mailed" thru official channels were never received by them. A large part of the stall sent to us fails to reach us. Cond tions may or may not be better in Acatraz, where we are to be imprisoned



PRINTING TRADES WORKERS: JOIN IN THE FIGHT FOR THESE DEMANDS

Each one of these demands touches upon a vital issue in the industry. effecting the conditions of the older workers as well us those of the young have been enjoying for years. workers. If you want better organization of the industry and the better conditions that this means, join with the Young Workers' League in the fight for these demands:

1. Organization of the Unorganized Young Workers.

There are thousands of unorganized young workers in the printing industry in Chicago. The big plants which operate strictly as open shops do so by employing mostly young workers whom they try to keep unorganized and force to work for the lowest wages. Even certain large "so-called" union shops, shops which carry the union isbel and have a few skilled union men working there, have five unorganized young workers to one union man, and sometimes the ratio is an high as 8 to 1.

2. Acceptance of any young worker working at the trade into the union (Typographical or binders) with full privileges and at lower initiation fee than the older workers.

At the present time, with printing developed from a handicraft into a huge industry, employing more than 35,000 workers in Chicago, a large per centage of whom are unskilled, effective organization in the industry is closely bound up with the problem of organizing the many unskilled and ufforganized young workers in the innever be accomplished unless besides dustry. However, this huge task can conducting an intensive campaign to organize these young workers, the union makes it casy for them to get in by lowering the initiation fee and accepting them directly into the union with full privileges as members. At the present time there is usually only one or two union men on a machine and perhaps one apprentice, all the rest being, considered outside the jurisdiction of the union. However, the union cannot expect to contro the job until all of these helpers in the founderies, press rooms and print shops are organized, and instead of only a small percentage in the shop being organized we will have 100

per cent organization. 3. Equal Pay for Equal Work. All young workers doing the same work as older workers should receive the same pay which is often not the case in the printing industry. Also the apprentices should always receive the same pay as the helpers when doing the same work. Sometimes they have to start at a lower pay if they

BAD CONDITIONS AT CUNEO EXPOSED

Workers in All Departments

Doing a huge business and paying their workers low wages, the Cuneo-Printing Co. manages to make bigger profits each year. By employing many young workers who they keep unorganized, the bosses manage to keep the average wage even lower than ready the boss is to fire one of us and they would otherwise.

The Low Wages:

The young workers in the Cuned Printing Co. plant at Arthington and at wages far below the living level, dollars a week. The inserters do not Spauling get very low wages. The few union men working here get higher wages, but there are eight unorganized young workers to every union man, so it is more with the conditions of the other unorganized young workers like myself that I will deal. Most of us get 50 cents an hour or less. The press helpers get forty or fifty cents an hour and few of the helpers get more than \$24 a week.

Rotten Conditions for Night Work. The night work here is very hard. Not only are the hours long, but the machines go so fast that it is no joke trying to keep up with them. instead of decreasing as you get more tired, the speed of the machine continuously increases as we work. The only relief you get is when the machine breaks down because of the fast work or when you run out of work.

Tho the bosses make such big profits that they could easily give us decent hours for night work, and set could easier keep up with, of course, they only thing of their profits and more profits, and we have to put up with it because we are not strongly enough organized, and only a few of the skilled workers here belong to proportion of the young workers are unorganized.

In the Binderies.

In 1923 the number of students rone schools to 96; in 1924 the number of students increased to 140,000, while he number of schools remained at 98. The schools became overcrowded, and this necessitated the . loption of retrenchment. The result of this policy was that in the summer of 1924 he number of superior schools were reduced to 87, and the number of students to 120,000, so that better facilitien could be afforded both to professors and students.

The material basis of superior eduration has considerably improved in recent years. The grants for superior To revive the child labor campaign education in 1922-25 amounted to 11,-500,000 roubles, in 1923-24 to 15,300. 900 roubles, and 1924-25 to more than 27,000,000 roubles. In the course of last year remuneration of professors was increased by 60 per cent, and the state funds for students' stipends by 50 per cent. A series of emoluments was introduced which improved the material position of professors and scientific workers by 200-300 per cent. In this manner there are now receiving state stipends amounting to 20 roubles monthly in the industrial centers, and to 15 roubles elsewhere. Furthermore, there have been provided adequate facilities for students in the shape of hourding houses, medical aid, laboratory equipment and so on.
