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Young Worker Expelled from Military Training Camp for **Opposing Scab Education**

(Special to the Young Worker)

CAMP CUSTER, Michigan.—Joseph Plotkin has been expelled from the Citizen's Military Training Camp here, charged with being a member of the Young Workers League.

There was no basis for the expulsion except the suspicions of the officers that Plotkin was a radical. Their suspicious were aroused first when Plotkin took the side of evolution against that of religion in an argument with students in his company. These students told the officers

of his wild ideas, and as a result he was carefully watched from then on. They decided to take action against Plotkin when he objected to certain statements of the officers in the Citizenship Training Courses. In these statements the officers had called upon the recruits to fight against the trade unions "which must be smashed" and had made many other appeals to the students of a definite anti-working class and strikebreaking character.

Once they found that Plotkin was hurting the effectiveness of their lying propaganda, they decided to get rid of him as quick as they could, and in their haste did not even bother to take the necessary legal steps.

He was called before a Major Andrews and a colonel, with lieutenant Evans and Krutheur acting as prosecutors. This "court" decided to expell Plotkin from Camp Custer because he 'against capitalism" and "for the convenience of the government."

Lieutenant Evans told the court that he believed in the constitution but that "free speech is going too far." The only evidence that the officers had to show was a personal letter to Plotkin which they had stolen after searching his baggage. Plotkin was discharged from the camps

without even the customary statement being handed him, as is the customary procedure. Joseph Plotkin was a member of Co. B. 2nd Infantry, and we are printing a story of his expulsion which has been sent in to us by another recruit in Company B.

WARSAW, Poland.-Forty members of the Young Communist League have been arrested in the raid here, charged with carrying on agitation in the army.

The raids, in which more than 1,000 Communists and sympathizers were arrested, occurred immediately after an attack on three Communists in the streets of Warsaw by agents of the Polish secret police. The three Communists, Gibner, Kniewski and Rutkowski, fell wounded and several of the police were also injured in the fighting. The Communists were immediately arrested and are being held for trial by court martial under paragraphs 51 and 453 of the old Czar Regime Criminal Code. The sentence is death and the trial has been set

for August 19th. The raids which followed were made in the working class sections of Warsaw, and have surpassed the other brutal raids which have made the Polish white terror so infamous.

Immediately after the raids the Polish Communist Party issued a manifesto that says in part:

'The fight against the provocateurs and the bourgeois terror will not cease. In the place of the three heroes shot down today thousands of new ones will arise. On the other hand, the offical organ of the Socialist Party, "Robotnik," condoned these acts of the Polish White Terrorists and called for more energetic action against the Communists."



PERRY TRIES TO BREAK STRIKE

But Pressmen Keep Up Picket Line at Cuneo's

Offering the scabs every inducement from taxi rides to and from work, free lunches to police protection, the bosses at the Cuneo company have not succeeded in keeping the presses going The strikers are holding their front staunchly, in spite of the betrayal of the international officers. The bindery has cut its force at least fifty per cent; the entire night shift having been laid off and a large portion of the day shift. The little work that does come up has a large amount of spoilage. Spoiled forms is the result of hiring workers not knowing how to properly run catalog presses. Soon coalheavers and rook pounders will be running the presses and be made holy and absolved from scabbery by the holy water of Berry's cards.

Saturday, August 15, 1925, the Pressmen's Union No. 3, and the Franklin Union No. 4 in conference decided upon a closer relationship in the present crisis and in all future activity between the two unions. Several speakers who hoped that the present step would be the beginning of a trade-wide movement for amalgamation into a printing trade industrial union taking in all the workers, attached to the trade wether bindery, press or typographical, were loudly and long applauded.

I spoke to many workers on the picket line and asked them about organizing the packer boys and the packer girls. The packer boys should immediately be organized, that was the opinion of the strikers. Every picket when questioned enthusiastically declared that he was in favor of such a move. The shop steward promised that in the advent of such an attempt he would encourage and try to persuad ethe union to help this

The packer boys who at present are working with scab men, are not having a grand and glorious time of it. They are required to wipe the rollers which is not their work, and are kept generally busy with the hustlers' work and even the assistants' work is sometimes done by them who have bene there for a longer period. Three or four should take immediate steps to encourage a walkout of the packer boys and help organize these boys and fight for the league's demands for the printing trade workers.

LOS ANGELES, Cal.—Recognizing the importance of the Y. C. I. statement on the necessity of a thorough Leninist education, we have been concentrating our summer activities on educational work. Courses will, be given as follows: History of the Labor Movement, by Levin; Public Speaking, by Schneiderman; Marxian Economics, by Baker; History of the Socialist Movement, by Kaplan.

These courses will be ... in the only time an active Communist has free (sometimes), on Sundays. Beginning September 13th, the four onehour courses will be given every Sunday from 2 to 6 p. m., for six Sundays. We think that more of the Young Workers League and Party branches should make use of these week-end schools.



CAMPAIGN CONTINUES

The speaker must be sure to turn up and must be well prepared. To avoid victimization, the speaker should not be a member of the Factory Group. Particularly must the speaker be well informed regarding the conditions in the industry and factory. The meeting must be short. If possible a resolution should be passed at the end of the meeting. The best time for Factory Gate meetings is the Dinner Hour, or the end of the working day. (In many cases the best time is Saturday dinner time, the week-end).

12. As the International experience proves, an exceedingly important form of agitation of the Y. C. L. are Conferences of Young Workers of a given area or industry (Young Miners Conference in South Wales, or General Conference of Young Workers of Sheffield). The delegates for such conferences are to be elected by meetings of all young workers in the factories. Altogether it can be said that the success or failure of a conference of young workers depends entirely upon the work of the factory groups. These must carry through a strong preparatory campaign organize the election of the delegates and popularize the decisions and slogans of the Conference after it has taken place.
