

NEW YORK CITY.—The young workers of the Teleradio Engineering Corporation were myetified one morning by a leaflet which appeared seemingly from nowhers. When looking for work the radio worker in many cases is forced to pay outrageous fees to so-called Labor Agencies to get the job and then stands the chance of being fired for little or no reason at all after the time of one week has elapsed. 




