



According to this report the total dues paying membership of the I M. W. A. on January first of this year was 273,407. Lowis gam the figure of the votes cast in the ecent elections as a total of 233,6% (60,000 for Brophy and 173,000 for Lewis). Yet, in face of these facts, the first figures sent out by the Lews machine claimed that the total vote cast was 280,000 or 17,000 more than the actual membership.

The brazeness of the "packed convention" can be seen in the following tacts (1) The report of Kennedy proves that Dist. 31 West Virginia in the last six months has an actual membership of 377, yet there are 166 delegates present with 225 votes from this district. (2) Dist. 17 has it delegates representing 58 members. (3) Dist. 19 Kentucky, has only & local unions up to Jan, 1, according to the report, yet it appears in the convention with 48 delegates representing 48 locals, having a total of 60 votes. (4) Dist. 28, Kentucky, up to Jan. 1, had 4 local unions, yet this district comes to the convention with 30 delegates from 30 different locals to cast 49 machine votes. These are the methods pursued by the Lewis machine to rule the convention.

Highlights of Sixth Y.C.I. Plenum By Herbert Zan

From the Fifth to the Sixth Plenums.1 etc.

AT the Fifth Enlarged Plenum of the Young Communist International, a very thoro analysis was made of the position of the Y. C. L and of its various sections. A balance sheet was drawn up; the relations of the leagues to the manses of the young workers, the internal activity of the leagues, their methods of workthere questions were discussed and the general conclusion reached was that the leagues had been far too narrow in their activity, they had not established sufficient contact with the non party youth thru intermediate organizations, thru activity on the basis of the immediate interests of the young workers, and jast, but not least, the inner life of the leagues was not mails anticiently attractive for the young workers. We had the phenomenon in practically all countries that, whereas the political influence and prestige of the leagues had inereared tremendously, the growth in membership did not keep pace with this political development, and that the turn over in membership was very large. The remedy for this sitnation laid down by the Fifth Plenum was: We must cease regarding the so-called non-political organizations of the working youth as our enemies, and must consciously endeavor to win them for us; these include trade union youth sections, sport and cultural organizations, etc. We must, when the circumstances permit, create specla!" organizations "for the winning and lead no the non party youth"; we must make our work so concrete as to tie R up with the actual needs of the young workers at the particular moment; we must be highly flexible in our tactics, and each league must endeavor to adapt itself to the pecu Har conditions within its own country.
