Worker-Addictes Break Fifty Records in Soviet Union Meet

MOSCOW, Sept. 11. - The All-Russian sports meet, which had representatives from eighteen nationalities in the Soviet Union, many coming from such distant places as Vladivestok, Archangel and Tashkent, finished this week. More than 2,500 worker-athletes participated in the events, 22 per cent. being girls.

Fifty records were broken, which marks a large improvement, when considering that the athletes are all workers from the factories, mines, offices, and peasants who work on the land. In addition, it is also necessary to take into account the relatively poor technique, lack of experienced trainers, and bad conditions of the tracks. The records set at this meet are still below the American "records" but the American records are set by people who have specialused in athletes all their lives, and have had every opportunity,


